

1 **CHAPTER 809. CHILD CARE SERVICES**

2
3 **PROPOSED RULES WITH PREAMBLE TO BE SUBMITTED TO THE TEXAS**
4 **REGISTER. THIS DOCUMENT WILL HAVE NO SUBSTANTIVE CHANGES BUT IS**
5 **SUBJECT TO FORMATTING CHANGES AS REQUIRED BY THE TEXAS REGISTER.**
6

7 The Texas Workforce Commission (Commission) proposes the following new sections to
8 Chapter 809, relating to Child Care Services:

9
10 Subchapter C. Eligibility for Child Care Services, §809.50 and §809.51

11
12 The Commission proposes amendments to the following sections of Chapter 809, relating to
13 Child Care Services:

- 14
15 Subchapter B. General Management, §§809.13, 809.19, and 809.20
16 Subchapter C. Eligibility for Child Care Services, §§809.43, 809.44, 809.46, and 809.48
17 Subchapter D. Parent Rights and Responsibilities, §809.74 and §809.75

18
19 The Commission proposes the repeal of the following sections of Chapter 809, relating to Child
20 Care Services:

22 Subchapter C. Eligibility for Child Care Services, §§809.50 - 809.52

31 **PART I. PURPOSE, BACKGROUND, AND AUTHORITY**

32 The Commission proposes to amend Child Care Services rules, Chapter 809, to address:

- 33
34 --a legislatively mandated increase in reimbursement rates for child care providers that obtain
35 Texas School Ready!™ certification (TSRC) or meet the Texas Rising Star Provider criteria;
36 --child care for a parent's extended temporary medical incapacitation or temporary cessation of
37 work, education, or training; and
38 --continued eligibility for wraparound child care--i.e., care provided before and after a child care
39 program's designated hours--for children who are receiving Commission-funded child care and
40 are enrolled in Head Start, public prekindergarten (pre-K), or a school-readiness integration
41 program.
42

43 The Commission also proposes to make several technical corrections and clarifications to
44 Chapter 809 by:

- 45
46 --changing incorrect citations;

- 1 --using common phrases and language throughout the rules; and
- 2 --providing clarifying language that aligns the rules with Commission intent and current practice.

5 **PART II. EXPLANATION OF INDIVIDUAL PROVISIONS**

6 **(Note: Minor editorial changes are made that do not change the meaning of the rules and,**
7 **therefore, are not discussed in the Explanation of Individual Provisions.)**

8

9 **SUBCHAPTER B. GENERAL MANAGEMENT**

10 **The Commission proposes the following amendments to Subchapter B:**

11

12 **§809.13. Board Policies for Child Care Services**

13 Section 809.13, relating to Local Workforce Development Board (Board) policies for child care
14 services, requires Boards to:

- 15 --conduct fraud fact-finding; and
- 16 --establish policies regarding personal responsibility agreement (PRA) sanctions.

17
18 Section 809.13(d)(7) changes the reference from §§809.48, 809.50, and 809.51 to §809.48 and
19 §809.50 to reflect the correct provisions setting forth the minimum activity requirements for
20 parents.

21
22 Section 809.13(d)(11) changes the reference from §809.71(b)(2) to §809.71(3) to reflect the
23 correct provision for transferring a child from one provider to another.

24
25 Section 809.13(d)(13) changes the reference from §809.92(b)(3) to §809.92(b)(4) to reflect the
26 correct provision for attendance standards and procedures.

27
28 Section 809.13(d)(15) is amended to clarify that Boards are required to develop procedures for
29 fraud fact-finding--not to investigate fraud--by replacing the term "investigating" with the term
30 "fact-finding" to reflect the language used in §809.111. This change also aligns with current
31 practices and principles from the January 2007 rule amendment, which states that it is the
32 Commission's responsibility--not the Boards' responsibility--to determine if a person has
33 committed fraud, and it is the Boards' role to research facts, not to investigate whether fraud has
34 occurred. This policy is contained in WD Letter 59-06, Change 1, issued February 2, 2007, and
35 entitled "Requirements for Reporting, Fact-Finding, and Prosecution of Fraud, Waste, Theft, and
36 Program Abuse Cases, and Collection of Overpayments: *Update*."

37
38 New §809.13(d)(16) requires Boards to establish policies regarding sanctions imposed when a
39 parent fails to comply with the provisions of the PRA as referenced in §809.76(c). Because a
40 Board has the flexibility to terminate child care when a parent fails to comply with the provisions
41 of the PRA, this sanction policy could affect the provision of workforce services and, therefore,
42 as required by Commission rule §801.51(f) and as detailed in WD Letter 10-07, issued February
43 2, 2007, and entitled "Adoption of Local Workforce Development Board Policies in Open
44 Meetings," Board members must adopt such policies in an open meeting.

1 New §809.13(d)(17) requires Boards to establish a policy concerning continued child care for
2 children enrolled in Head Start, Early Head Start, or a public pre-K program as provided in
3 §809.50(g). The decision to allow continued child care for children enrolled in early education
4 programs is left with the Boards based on local workforce needs and circumstances. To facilitate
5 local public input regarding this decision, Board members must adopt such policies in an open
6 meeting as required by Commission rule §801.51(f) and as detailed in WD Letter 10-07.
7

8 **§809.19. Assessing the Parent Share of Cost**

9 Section 809.19(a)(2)(C) is amended to allow parents who have children receiving protective
10 services child care pursuant to §809.49 and §809.54(c)(1), to be exempt from the parent share of
11 cost--unless the Texas Department of Family and Protective Services (DFPS) authorizes a parent
12 share of cost.
13

14 This subparagraph clarifies that a parent's exemption from the parent share of cost is applicable
15 when a child's eligibility for child care is determined by DFPS for a child currently or formerly
16 receiving protective services. The exemption from the parent share of cost applies to children
17 receiving DFPS protective services as well as children formerly receiving protective services for
18 whom DFPS has determined that child care is integral to that service need as provided by
19 §809.54(c)(1). The current rule language does not specify that a parent of a child who formerly
20 received protective services is exempt, but it is current practice and the intent of the
21 Commission.
22

23 **§809.20. Maximum Provider Reimbursement Rates**

24 Section 809.20(b) replaces the term "graduated" reimbursement rates with the term "enhanced"
25 reimbursement rates to describe the minimum five percent increase in rates for certain providers.
26 The term enhanced is intended to mean higher. Enhanced rates may also be graduated, but this is
27 not a requirement. Use of the term enhanced aligns with language used in Article IX, §19.111 of
28 the General Appropriations Act, 80th Texas Legislature, Regular Session (2007), which requires
29 the enhancement of reimbursement rates for child care providers that obtain certification under
30 the TSRC system or meet Texas Rising Star Provider criteria.
31

32 New §809.20(b)(3) requires Boards to establish enhanced reimbursement rates for child care
33 providers that obtain certification under the TSRC system. This new paragraph implements the
34 direction of the Texas Legislature as provided in Article IX, §19.111 of the General
35 Appropriations Act, 80th Texas Legislature, Regular Session (2007).
36

37 The Commission emphasizes that although Boards must establish enhanced reimbursement rates
38 for infants, toddlers, and preschool children attending a certified Texas School Ready!™ facility,
39 Boards have the flexibility to establish enhanced reimbursement rates for school-age children
40 enrolled in such facilities.
41

42 However, an enhanced reimbursement rate must be applied to all age groups and classrooms for
43 Texas Rising Star Providers and child care providers participating in a Texas Early Education
44 Model (TEEM) school readiness integration project developed by the State Center for Early
45 Childhood Development at the University of Texas Health Science Center (State Center).

1 School-age children or other TWC-subsidized children in the TEEM facility are not excluded
2 from the enhanced reimbursement rates.

3
4 **SUBCHAPTER C. ELIGIBILITY FOR CHILD CARE SERVICES**

5 **The Commission proposes the following amendments to Subchapter C:**

6
7 **§809.43. Priority for Child Care Services**

8 Section 809.43(a)(2)(B) clarifies that a child is included in the second priority group if the parent
9 is a qualified veteran "or qualified spouse." The phrase "or qualified spouse" is added to align
10 with the definition in §801.23 of the Commission's Local Workforce Development Boards rules.

11
12 **§809.44. Calculating Family Income**

13 Section 809.44 clarifies that income sources listed are used for determining both eligibility and
14 parent share of cost. The section also states that family income does not include any income
15 sources specifically excluded by federal law or regulation.

16
17 Section 809.44(a) adds the phrase "and the parent share of cost" to make the list of income items
18 also applicable to determining parent share of cost. This change aligns with Boards'
19 longstanding practice of using the income inclusions and exclusions both for determining
20 eligibility and for determining parent share of cost.

21
22 New §809.44(b)(11) adds a comprehensive exclusion to cover any income sources specifically
23 excluded by federal law or regulation. Allowing a comprehensive exclusion for family income
24 sources that are specifically excluded by federal law or regulation forgoes the need for a
25 Commission rule change any time federal legislation or regulation is amended to exclude a
26 specific income source from being counted toward eligibility for a federally funded program.

27
28 **§809.46. Temporary Assistance for Needy Families Applicant Child Care**

29 Section 809.46(c) changes the reference from §§809.50 - 809.52 to §809.50 resulting from the
30 repeal of §§809.50 - 809.52 and the proposal of new §809.50.

31
32 Section 809.46(e) changes the reference from §§809.50 - 809.52 to §809.50 resulting from the
33 repeal of §§809.50 - 809.52 and the proposal of new §809.50.

34
35 **§809.48. Transitional Child Care**

36 Section 809.48 is amended to incorporate the allowable reduction of work and education
37 requirements for At-Risk child care into Transitional child care.

38
39 Section 809.48(b) replaces the phrase "children in families at risk of becoming dependent on
40 public assistance" with "At-Risk child care" as set forth in new §809.50.

41
42
43 New §809.48(f) allows a Board to reduce the work, education, and job training activity
44 requirements if a parent's documented medical disability or need to care for a physically or
45 mentally disabled family member prevents the parent from participating in the activities for the
46 required hours per week.

1
2 New §809.48(g) specifies the education credit-hour equivalences for meeting the required
3 education activity hours per week, specifically:
4 --§809.48(g)(1) states that each credit hour of postsecondary education counts as three hours of
5 education activity per week; and
6 --§809.48(g)(2) states that each credit hour of a condensed postsecondary education course
7 counts as six hours of education activity per week.
8

9 **§809.50. Child Care for Children Living at Low Incomes**

10 Section 809.50 is repealed and the common provisions of §§809.50 - 809.52 are consolidated
11 into new §809.50, At-Risk Child Care.
12

13 **§809.51. Child Care for Children with Disabilities**

14 Section 809.51 is repealed and the common provisions of §§809.50 - 809.52 are consolidated
15 into new §809.50, At-Risk Child Care.
16

17 **§809.52. Child Care for Children of Teen Parents**

18 Section 809.52 is repealed and the common provisions of §§809.50 - 809.52 are consolidated
19 into new §809.50, At-Risk Child Care.
20

21 **§809.50. At-Risk Child Care**

22 New §809.50 consolidates and streamlines the rule language contained in repealed §§809.50 -
23 809.52 by combining similar provisions into one section rather than three.
24

25 New §809.50 also addresses eligibility for wraparound child care--i.e., child care provided before
26 and after a child care provider's designated hours--for children who are receiving Commission-
27 funded child care and enrolled in Head Start, public pre-K, or a school-readiness integration
28 program.
29

30 Regarding wraparound child care for children receiving Commission-funded child care and who
31 are enrolled in Head Start, which includes Early Head Start or public pre-K, the Texas
32 Legislature--as provided in Texas Human Resources Code §72.003, Texas Government Code
33 §2308.3165, and Texas Education Code, Chapter 29--has placed increased emphasis on local
34 coordination among early childhood education programs in order to support integration across
35 these programs. The continued provision of child care services assists in the extension of early
36 childhood education program hours to full day and full year.
37

38 However, the varying eligibility periods among Commission-funded child care services, Head
39 Start, and public pre-K have been identified as barriers that may prevent a child in Commission-
40 funded child care from completing a Head Start or public pre-K program during the school year.
41 Head Start and public pre-K eligibility are determined prior to the school or program year.
42 Children are deemed eligible to remain in these programs regardless of changes in a family's
43 work or income status. However, children in Commission-funded child care who are receiving
44 wraparound care while enrolled in a Head Start or public pre-K program lose eligibility for
45 Commission-funded child care during the school year when a family's income or work hours
46 change. These early education programs have identified the Child Care and Development Fund

1 (CCDF) eligibility period as a barrier to a child's ability to continue participating in the early
2 education program.

3
4 The Commission proposes this amendment with the intent of removing this barrier and to further
5 the intent of the Texas Legislature in Texas Human Resources Code §72.003, Texas Government
6 Code §2308.3165, and Texas Education Code, Chapter 29.

7
8 New §809.50(a) establishes the eligibility requirements for At-Risk child care. Section
9 809.50(a)(1) sets income limits--as established by the Board, and §809.50(a)(2) sets forth the
10 work, education, and job training requirements for a parent to be determined eligible for child
11 care.

12
13 New §809.50(b) allows Boards to reduce the work, education, and job training activity
14 requirements if a parent's documented medical disability or need to care for a physically or
15 mentally disabled family member prevents the parent from participating in the activities for the
16 required hours per week.

17
18 New §809.50(c) specifies the education credit hour equivalences for meeting the required
19 education activity hours per week and states that teen parents attending high school or the
20 equivalent shall be considered as meeting the education requirements.

21
22 New §809.50(d) states that when calculating income eligibility for a child with disabilities, a
23 Board must deduct the cost of the child's ongoing medical expenses from the family income.

24
25 New §809.50(e) allows Boards to establish a higher income eligibility limit for teen parents than
26 those specified in §809.41(a)(2)(A).

27
28 New §809.50(f) states that a teen parent's income is based solely on the teen parent's income and
29 size of the teen's family as defined in §809.2(8).

30
31 New §809.50(g) states that a child receiving child care services under the Board's initial
32 eligibility requirements in §809.41(a)(2)(A) who is enrolled in Head Start, Early Head Start, or
33 public pre-K is eligible to continue receiving child care until the end of the school year as long
34 as:

35 --the family's income does not exceed 85% of the state median income (SMI) for a family of the
36 same size;

37 --child care is required for the parent to work or attend a job training or educational program for
38 a minimum of 25 hours per week for a single-parent family or 50 hours per week for a two-
39 parent family; and

40 --the parents continue to comply with the parent responsibilities described in Subchapter D.

41
42 Allowing child care to continue for a child enrolled in Head Start, Early Head Start, or public
43 pre-K assists in the availability of full-day child care pursuant to §809.14(b). The continuation
44 of child care under these provisions is allowed on the basis of the child meeting the federal
45 requirements described in §809.42(c)(2) as long as the parent is able to meet the Board's initial
46 eligibility requirements. With the federal requirements establishing the eligibility income limit

1 at 85% SMI, this rule only affects Boards whose initial income limits are below 85% SMI and
2 whose work requirements are set higher than those set forth in §809.50(a)(2).

3
4 **§809.51. Child Care during Temporary Interruptions in Work, Education, or Training**

5 New §809.51 addresses child care during a parent's:

- 6 --extended temporary medical incapacitation; and
- 7 --temporary cessation of work, education, or job training activities.

8
9 Extended temporary medical incapacitation and temporary cessation of work, education, or
10 training are not addressed in current rules. In both circumstances, a parent remains employed, in
11 school, or in training but is temporarily unable to meet the weekly work or attendance hour
12 requirements, thereby causing the parent to become ineligible for child care.

13
14 New §809.51(a) applies to the temporary cessation of work, education, or job training activities.
15 This situation may occur when an individual remains employed but is temporarily not working,
16 such as with public school employees and students who may no longer be meeting the hourly
17 work, education, or job training requirements during semester or summer breaks. Section
18 809.51(a) states that if a parent has a temporary cessation of work, education, or job training
19 activities and is unable to meet the requirements described in §809.50(a)(2), child care may be
20 suspended for no more than 90 calendar days from the documented effective date of the
21 cessation of these activities. During the suspension of child care based on the temporary
22 cessation of work, the parent will not be receiving subsidized child care, but the parent will also
23 not be required to reapply for child care services or be subject to the child care waiting list when
24 they return to their work, education or job training activities resume pursuant to their work and
25 attendance hour requirements described in §809.50(a)(2).

26
27 New §809.51(b) applies to temporary medical incapacitation. This situation may result from a
28 health impairment that necessitates an employed parent, or a parent in education or job training,
29 to have an extended temporary cessation or reduction in work or attendance hours causing them
30 to be unable to meet the requirements described in §809.50(a)(2). The parent remains employed,
31 in school or in training, but cannot work, attend school or training for an extended period of time,
32 though the parent intends to return to their employment, education or job training following their
33 temporary incapacitation. Section 809.51(b) states that if a parent has a documented temporary
34 medical incapacitation and is unable to meet the work, education, or job training requirements
35 described in §809.50(a)(2), the following shall apply:

- 36
37 --Child care may be allowed to continue for no more than 30 calendar days from the documented
38 effective date of the temporary medical incapacitation; and
- 39 --Child care may be suspended for no more than 60 calendar days after the end of the 30-day
40 calendar period following the documented temporary medical incapacitation.

41
42 The following new provisions apply to both the temporary cessation of work, education, or job
43 training activities and medical incapacitation:

44
45 New §809.51(c) states that upon the parent's return to work, education, or job training activities,
46 a Board is not required to resume child care at the same provider used prior to the documented

1 temporary cessation of these activities or medical incapacitation. The Commission believes that
2 requiring the provider to hold the slot open for the child places an undue financial burden on the
3 child care provider. Additionally, the parent is not required to reapply for child care services or
4 return to the child care wait list.

5
6 New § 809.51(d) states that prior to any suspension of child care a parent must provide
7 documentation from the employer, educational institution, or training provider stating that the
8 parent will be returning to work, education, or job training activities following the temporary
9 cessation of these activities or medical incapacitation. Even if a parent becomes incapacitated
10 because of a sudden illness or medical emergency, the 30-day maximum period where child care
11 services may continue allows the parent adequate time to provide the documentation. The Board
12 may determine what is considered acceptable documentation which for example could include
13 registration documents or a signed note from the school indicating that the parent will be
14 returning after the break.

15 16 **SUBCHAPTER D. PARENT RIGHTS AND RESPONSIBILITIES**

17 **The Commission proposes the following amendments to Subchapter D:**

18 19 **§809.74. Parent Appeal Rights**

20 Section 809.74(a) is amended to include Choices caseworkers and FSE&T caseworkers and to
21 add the suspension of child care as an action for which a parent has the right to request a hearing
22 pursuant to Chapter 823 of the Commission's rules. The Commission believes the suspension of
23 care as described under new §809.51 is an adverse action, pursuant to 823.2(2), similar to the
24 currently appealable denial, delay, termination or reduction in child care services and, therefore,
25 it is eligible for appeal by the parent. However, as described in the following section--
26 §809.75(b)--child care must not continue during the appeal.

27
28 Sections 809.74(d) and (e) are removed because the information is contained in §809.74(a).

29 30 **§809.75. Child Care during Appeal**

31 Section 809.75(b)(7) removes the term "parent fees" and replaces it with the term "parent share
32 of cost" to align with terminology used throughout this chapter.

33
34 New §809.75(b)(9) states that child care shall not continue during the appeal if the appeal is due
35 to the suspension of child care services pursuant to §809.51 (related to Child Care during
36 Temporary Interruptions in Work, Education, or Training). If for example the Board's child care
37 contractor determines that the length of the suspension period for temporary work cessation or
38 medical incapacitation should be 30 days rather than the maximum allowable 60 or 90 days,
39 parents may appeal the length of the suspension period. However, because child care services
40 will be suspended for only a limited amount of time with the understanding that services will
41 continue following the brief suspension period, allowing child care to continue during any appeal
42 would essentially nullify the suspension period.

43 44 45 **PART III. IMPACT STATEMENTS**

1 Randy Townsend, Chief Financial Officer, has determined that for each year of the first five
2 years the rules will be in effect, the following statements will apply:

3
4 There are no additional estimated costs to the state and local governments expected as a result of
5 enforcing or administering the rules.

6
7 There are no estimated reductions in costs to the state and to local governments as a result of
8 enforcing or administering the rules.

9
10 There are no estimated losses or increases in revenue to the state or to local governments as a
11 result of enforcing or administering the rules.

12
13 There are no foreseeable implications relating to costs or revenue of the state or local
14 governments as a result of enforcing or administering the rules.

15
16 There are no anticipated economic costs to persons required to comply with the rules.

17
18 There is no anticipated adverse economic impact on small or microbusinesses as a result of
19 enforcing or administering the rules.

20
21 **Economic Impact Statement and Regulatory Flexibility Analysis**

22 The Agency has determined that the proposed rules will not have an adverse economic impact on
23 small businesses as these proposed rules place no requirements on small businesses, including
24 child care providers.

25
26
27 Mark Hughes, Director of Labor Market Information, has determined that there is no significant
28 negative impact upon employment conditions in the state as a result of the rules.

29
30 Laurence M. Jones, Director, Workforce Development Division, has determined that for each
31 year of the first five years the rules are in effect, the public benefit anticipated as a result of
32 enforcing the proposed rules will be to:

33 --meet the requirements of the 80th Texas Legislature regarding enhanced reimbursement rates
34 for child care providers;

35 --allow greater flexibility for Boards to design child care services to meet the needs of the local
36 workforce development area; and

37 --allow greater flexibility for parents to continue receiving child care services.

38
39 The Agency hereby certifies that the proposal has been reviewed by legal counsel and found to
40 be within the Agency's legal authority to adopt.

41
42 **PART IV. COORDINATION ACTIVITIES**

43
44 In the development of these rules for publication and public comment, the Commission sought
45 the involvement of Texas' 28 Boards. The Commission provided the concept paper regarding
46 these rule amendments to the Boards for consideration and review on December 18, 2007. The

1 Commission also conducted a conference call with Board executive directors and Board staff on
2 January 4, 2008, to discuss the concept paper. During the rulemaking process, the Commission
3 considered all information gathered in order to develop rules that provide clear and concise
4 direction to all parties involved.

5
6 Comments on the proposed rules may be submitted to TWC Policy Comments, Workforce

11
12 The rules are proposed under Texas Labor Code §301.0015 and §302.002(d), which provide the
13 Commission with the authority to adopt, amend, or repeal such rules as it deems necessary for
14 the effective administration of Agency services and activities, and the Texas Human Resources
15 Code §44.002, regarding Administrative Rules.

16
17 The proposed rules will affect Texas Labor Code, Title 4, particularly Chapters 301 and 302, as
18 well as Texas Government Code, Chapter 2308.
19

4 **SUBCHAPTER B. GENERAL MANAGEMENT**

5
6 **§809.13. Board Policies for Child Care Services**

- 7
8 (a) A Board shall develop, adopt, and modify its policies for the design and management
9 of the delivery of child care services in a public process in accordance with Chapter
10 801 of this title.
- 11
12 (b) A Board shall maintain written copies of the policies that are required by federal
13 and state law, or as requested by the Commission, and make such policies
14 available to the Commission and the public upon request.
- 15
16 (c) A Board shall also submit any modifications, amendments, or new policies to the
17 Commission no later than two weeks after adoption of the policy by the Board.
- 18
19 (d) At a minimum, a Board shall develop policies related to:
- 20
21 (1) how the Board determines that the parent is making progress toward
22 successful completion of a job training or educational program as described in
23 §809.2(1);
- 24
25 (2) maintenance of a waiting list as described in §809.18(b);
- 26
27 (3) assessment of a parent share of cost as described in §809.19, including the
28 reimbursement of providers when a parent fails to pay the parent share of cost;
- 29
30 (4) maximum reimbursement rates as provided in §809.20, including policies
31 related to reimbursement of providers ~~that~~who offer transportation;
- 32
33 (5) family income limits as described in Subchapter C of this chapter (relating to
34 Eligibility for Child Care Services);
- 35
36 (6) provision of child care services to a child with disabilities up to the age of 19 as
37 described in §809.41(a)(1)(B);
- 38
39 (7) minimum activity requirements for parents as described in §809.48 and

39 (4) Taxable capital gains, dividends, and interest. These earnings include capital
40 gains from the sale of property and earnings from dividends from stock holdings,
41 and interest on savings or bonds.

43 (5) Rental income. This includes net income from rental of a house, homestead,
44 store, or other property, or rental income from boarders or lodgers.

- 1 (6) Public assistance payments. These payments include TANF as authorized under
2 Chapters 31 or 34 of the Texas Human Resources Code, refugee assistance, Social
3 Security Disability Insurance, Supplemental Security Income, and general
4 assistance (such as cash payments from a county or city).

- 6 (7) Income from estate and trust funds. These payments include income from estates,
7 trust funds, inheritances, or royalties.

- 9 (8) Unemployment compensation. This includes unemployment payments from
10 governmental unemployment insurance agencies or private companies and strike
11 benefits while a person is unemployed or on strike.

- 13 (9) Workers' compensation income, death benefit payments and other disability
14 payments. These payments include compensation received periodically from
15 private or public sources for on-the-job injuries.

- 17 (10) Spousal maintenance or alimony. This includes any payment made to a spouse or
18 former spouse under a separation or divorce agreement.

- 20 (11) Child support. These payments include court-ordered child support, any
21 maintenance or allowance used for current living costs provided by parents to a
