<sup>1</sup> For Fiscal Year 2018, the Commission is exercising its authority as provided in TWC Rules [§800.51(f)] that, notwithstanding any other provision of the rules, the level of funding allocated to a workforce area may be determined, modified, or reallocated by the Commission to ensure full utilization of the funding, to ensure compliance with State and federal requirements applicable to the State, or to respond to unforeseen demographic or economic changes, and [§800.51(e)] that funds available to the Commission that are not otherwise allocated under this subchapter may be used by the Commission for purposes authorized by State and federal laws and regulations. The Commission has determined that the level of funding for a workforce area for aggregated TANF Choices, Employment Services, SNAP Employment & Training, and Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act should not be lower than the average of the 20 percent of workforce areas that comprise the smallest allocations among all workforce areas.
