15	We're back in session. Les, has anyone signed up for public
16	comment?
17	MR. TROBMAN: No, sir.
18	CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: Thank you.
19	AGENDA ITEM NO. 8
20	CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: Item 8, Discussion,
21	Consideration and Possible Action Regarding an Order to
22	Adopt Program Fiscal Year 2018 and 2019 Allocations. Randy
23	Townsend, good morning.
24	MR. TOWNSEND: Good morning, Chairman and
25	Commissioners. For the record, Randy Townsend, Chief
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Financial Officer.

Under your tab 8 in your notebook this
morning we have -- we've received notice that we've been
awarded the Adult Education and Literacy funds for this
upcoming program year '18 and so this morning I have for you
for your consideration the adoption of Program Year '18,
Fiscal year '19, Adult Education and Literacy allocations.

This information was included previously as part of the larger packet previously and it was listed as a planning estimate. The dollar amounts have not changed, so the exact same amounts as we had expected them to be. So, each area, each local workforce area, the amounts remain unchanged from what was previously presented for your consideration as a planning estimate.

The packet includes the high-level summary by board area. It also includes a breakout of the different funding sources on page 2 and then included on page 3 would be those four workforce areas that will have multiple service providers and how we have provided the breakout of the funding for each of those providers once they're finalized.

And then the last two pages of the document just simply outlines the funding amounts that were available and -- for determination of the allocation.

And with that Commissioners, unless you have Verbatim Reporting & Transcription, LLC 281.724.8600

questions, I would move that -- or propose that you adopt 1 2 the allocations for the Program Year '18, Fiscal Year '19, 3 for the Adult Education and Literacy. 4 CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: Commissioners, any 5 questions or comments? Commissioner Hughs? 6 COMM. HUGHS: I move that we approve Program 7 Year 2018 Fiscal Year 2019 allocations as discussed and 8 recommended. 9 COMM. ALVAREZ: I'll second that. 10 CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: We are unanimous. AGENDA ITEM NO. 9 11 12 CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: Item 9, Discussion, 13 Consideration and Possible Action Regarding Fiscal Year 2020-2021 Legislative Appropriations Request. Randy 14 15 Townsend. 16 MR. TOWNSEND: Good morning again, Chairman 17 and Commissioners. Again, for the record, Randy Townsend, 18 Chief Financial Officer. This morning, Commissioners, I'm 19 presenting for your consideration the first look at our 20 fiscal year 2020 and 2021 legislative appropriation request 21 Wanted to walk through briefly the -- just the -amounts. 22 the information that I've briefed with you individually. Also, would need to -- would like to go over some of your 23 24 thoughts on the GR reduction and schedule that we have to

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prepare for this appropriation request. And then finally,

get some direction as to how you'd like to proceed with exceptional items.

So, I'll first begin with just a high level or just walking through the documents that were included in your notebook this morning. Used a similar format as was presented for the fiscal year '19 operating budget. I have added the 2020 and 2021 base request columns to the document, so the first -- well, it's page 2, the schedule 1 is a method of finance, so it's breaking it down by federal funds, general revenue or other funds, listing the years in the columns for you.

And again, just by way of kind of looking at the bottom line totals, you're looking at for 2020 about 1.87-billion in total appropriated funds and in 2021 would be about 1.86-billion thereabouts as an estimate. About 85 percent of the budget would be -- would be funded with federal funds, 10 percent would be general revenue. That general revenue total is about 190-million there as you can see on the subtotal line, and the other point I'll make is that out of the general revenue, 190-million, almost 80 percent or 150-million, is either matching or satisfying maintenance of effort requirements for the Agency.

So that's a high-level look at the method of finance for those five years that would be included in our appropriation request. We have yet to report '17 actual,

'18 estimated, and then the '19 budget, along with the requested amounts for '20 and '21.

Page 3, Commissioners, would be the same information, just organized a little differently. As far as strategies go, this will be similar to our bill pattern.

The only thing I will point out is rather than listed numerically by strategy, it'll be listed in high dollar to low dollar.

One thing I did add to this schedule different from the operating budget at the very bottom of the page on page 3, there's a summary of the largest strategies, just so you can kind of see more quickly how these -- how our largest programs, childcare, vocational rehabilitation, and WIOA, unemployment insurance, the Choices and Adult Ed, which make up over 85 percent of the state's -- or the Agency's budget, how those totals look when combined at the -- at the -- because we have multiple strategies in a few of those cases. So, thought that might be a little easier to see the breakout of the largest amounts.

And then page 4 is going to be a sched -Schedule 3 is going to be fulltime equivalents, FTE staffing
by strategy again, I did the 2020 and 2021 columns to -like you had previously seen. Schedule 4 is going to be the
breakout of the divisions and departments organized it by

the -- whether it was capital or non-capital for your -- and it's -- and it's also sorted on the 2020 column from the high dollar to the low dollar. So, you can see there on page 5 that local workforce development areas, LWDA, is over one billion, 1.1-billion almost in 2020, as just a -- kind of a reference there. And then of course, the next biggest division would be the vocational rehabilitation program at 263-million. And from there, it has additional details for the remaining divisions and departments.

And then page 8 would start -- be Schedule 5, would be the division departments, but this would be the additional -- would be the detail broken out by the fulltime equivalents, the staffing levels, so that you can see how the division and departments are organized there. And again, this is sorted on the 220 column from high -- the largest number of staffing in the agency by division to the smaller FTE levels.

And again, that's all divisions and departments for the staffing. And then -- maybe I should wait a second and just see if you have any questions about what I've presented so far that there's been -- kind of walking you through the organization of the schedules there.

CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: Any questions,

Commissioners?

COMM. ALVAREZ: No questions, Chairman.

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1 COMM. HUGHS: No.

CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: Let's keep going ahead.

MR. TOWNSEND: Schedule 6 is going to be your look at the type of expenditure, it is sometimes referred to object of expense, OOE, and then we've actually summarized that at a little higher level just org -- internally here so that you can see how that -- how that breaks out between salaries, grants, client services, which are the three largest types of expenditures.

And then there is additional detail that we also internally at our -- at our object level or object description level, that we've included there so that -- for example, other operating expense on row 4's -- 4 through 12, that just gets lumped into other operating for the object of expense, which is not particularly insightful. And so, we do capture internally additional detail so that you can see what makes up that -- that type of expenditure.

That Schedule 6 on page 10, is -- all our capital and non-capital. One of the things I think I mentioned to you individually in briefings is that that -- there's some odd trends because of how we actually or would appear to be odd trends in terms of ask for the appropriation for some of our capital projects, all in 2020. And so, page 11 and page 12 will split that out between the non-capital and the capital so that you can see the trends a

little bit more easily. The non-capital will make a little bit more sense I think when you look at those trends.

And then kind of continuing on the capital trend on page 13 which will be Schedule 7, this would be the capital budget. This will only for 2020 and '21 on this schedule include the base request. And we'll have a page for that exceptional item capital budget. But this would be the -- the detail for the -- by the type of capital budget project and additional details that we do not have about specific projects. We would -- normally would stop at the approp -- what is the column -- second column there, appropriation description column, would be how that would be organized in our bill pattern.

But I think this is maybe an easier way to see what makes up some of those individual line items, particularly on page 14, which is going to be our building repairs, where you can see what we've listed there, specifically is the project.

And then page 15, which is Schedule 8, would be -- and I think you've see this before a couple of times, is the exceptional item request for capital budget, namely, the -- let's see the type over there -- we have an unemployment insurance system replacement project for the 40-million, the Workforce Case Management Project for 18.8-million, and then the Eligible Training Provider and Career

School Database for 1. -- almost 1.2-million.

So, a total of 60-million in capital projects for exceptional items.

I did want to point out a highlighted -there will be general revenue for roughly 700,000 that would
be required for the -- for these capital budget projects to
be included. So, the vast majority is federal funds. There
is a little bit of SNAP, E&T that we're receiving from
Health and Human Services Commission as other funds, but
it's really federal funds that the State of Texas is pulling
down.

But that would be the exceptional items for capital budget that I think you previously had discussed.

And then beginning on page 16, this is

Schedule 9, there's several -- or a few schedules here,

dealing with the statewide initiatives. And again, you've

looked at some of this for nin -- well, looked at all of

this for '19. What is new this time around is that 2020 and

2021 has been included. I've tried to highlight for you

there the -- the items that are in reserve at this point and

then if there's, you know, other I'll highlight a few cases

here in a minute I'll get to as well.

One of the things that I did want to point out that we've included for childcare, for example, on page 16, what had been requested for the '18 initiatives,

childcare initiatives.

assumed to be included individually for the '19 forward, but you do have, as you can see on that first row there under quality reserve, you've got a pretty sizable balance over 40-million. And so I would presume that at some point in the future, Commissioners, that would be something you would consider for the upcoming year in '19 and possibly going forward. But not needing to go into that necessarily today, unless you just want to point something out on that, that we should consider from a staff perspective.

And that'll actually be the case for several of these other ones as well. So that's the childcare on page 16.

Page 17 is going to be your WIOA funded initiatives and again, the Commission reserve balance is highlighted there for what we have currently identified, along with the initiatives that we dis -- that you discussed and approved for '19 previously. And then again, for 2020 and 2021, there's a reserve balance, but there is not -- those -- some of those initiatives are not showing as continued. That doesn't necessarily mean they're -- they -- that you wouldn't approve those for later being continued, or you -- if it's something I need to reflect for the record today. I'm happy to, you know, for you to consider that as

well, but did want to show you what that looks like at this 1 2 point. 3 On the page 18 --4 CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: Before we leave this 5 page, there's two items here; the externship program that 6 Commissioner Hughs had asked for some estimates. I guess 7 that's still being worked on for you, Commissioner? 8 COMM. HUGHS: Right. I don't know that we 9 have any new numbers to consider at this time. 10 CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: We don't have any new 11 numbers yet. 12 COMM. HUGHS: But I suspect that we may be 13 looking at higher numbers if we're going to distribute it 14 across the state. I'm not sure that we're ready to -- do we 15 have any new numbers that have been provided to staff at 16 this point? 17 CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: Still working on that? 18 COMM. HUGHS: So we'll leave that as a placeholder. 19 20 CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: And then on this page 21 also, I think there's an examination being undertaken by 22 staff in terms of College Credit for Heroes, the portal. I think it might be a good idea to budget a number and then 23 24 ultimately decide on how we move forward. I don't know what 25 the right number is in terms of discussion there,

Commissioners, but we just need to resolve how we move forward with what we currently have in place and what the best options are for continuing to have a centralized place for our veterans to go to.

COMM. HUGHS: Right. So, the question would be the 300,000 is the existing contract that goes until the end of August.

CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: Right.

COMM. HUGHS: Would an extension of that contract be 300,000? To keep it where it is, while we identify whether or not this is the right way to have a centralized system?

MR. TEMPLE: Well, we understand that their attorneys are advising them that they have to re-procure their management system, so at a minimum that 300 -- it's gone up every year we've worked with them. So, I would be surprised if it came in at that. Plus, they're having to do a re-procure. So we're thinking somewhere in the 7 to 800 range we think.

COMM. HUGHS: That may change whether that continues to be the system we work on, but I don't think that we are ready to state that we are not going to have one, so should we put some kind of placeholder for 2019 that we are committed to spending a certain amount to have a centralized system at this point?

1	CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: I think I would agree
2	that we have promoted the fact that we have a centralized
3	place for our veterans to go to, and not understanding what
4	the amounts may be moving forward, I think as a placeholder,
5	just keeping it flat for now just to indicate our interest
6	in coming up with a solution where all veterans can go and
7	note that that is a placeholder amount and doesn't signal an
8	increased commitment or a lower commitment, but for now, we
9	will find a way to come up with a some sort of task force
10	recommendation in terms of how we move forward.
11	MR. TOWNSEND: Commissioners, I'll I can
12	include that 300,000 for `19, similar to the `18, and just
13	reduce the reserve balance if that's your desire to on
14	this particular page here.
15	CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: Commissioners?
16	COMM. HUGHS: I would agree with that.
17	CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: I would be inclined to go
18	with that. Commissioner Alvarez?
19	COMM. ALVAREZ: I would be okay with that.
20	CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: Okay. So just put it at
21	300 with an understanding that some sort of task force
22	discussion will occur. Larry, I don't know how best to
23	bring that, but if you could think about it. Again, it's
24	the the original intent and the benefits that have
25	derived from that are unquestionable in terms of its current

1	whether or not it continues to achieve the possibilities,
2	that's something we need to consider. But the idea behind
3	having a centralized location for our veterans to go to and
4	have a benchmark for how they do how they can then
5	interact with the other colleges and universities is
6	something that we probably need to bring together some of
7	our college leaders and think about how that might might
8	look.
9	Okay. Any other guidance to staff,
10	Commissioners?
11	COMM. HUGHS: No.
12	CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: Would that work?
13	COMM. HUGHS: Yeah, uh-huh.
14	CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: Okay.
15	COMM. ALVAREZ: So I have a question. Is the
16	300 biennium or
17	MR. TOWNSEND: I believe, Commissioner, that
18	would be for '19 at this point we would just leave 2020
19	and '21 I believe as they are currently if that's okay.
20	CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: And, you know, the
21	commitment to welcoming our heroes and to making sure that
22	we are maximizing the their prior learning and credit for
23	hours earned remain the same. The question is, how do we
24	enhance the product and the outcomes moving forward? And I
25	think that's what we are asking staff to work on. Thank
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1 you. 2 MR. TOWNSEND: Uh-huh. 3 CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: Thank you, Randy. 4 page? 5 MR. TOWNSEND: Yes, sir. Page 18 is going to 6 continue the statewide initiatives. This will be the TANF 7 funded initiatives and again, I've highlighted the reserve 8 balance there. And I don't have anything else to add on the 9 TANF unless you have comments to offer or questions. 10 CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: Are there any questions on this? 11 12 COMM. HUGHS: No. 13 CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: Commissioner Alvarez? 14 COMM. ALVAREZ: No, Chairman. 15 CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: I think we're good, 16 Randy. 17 MR. TOWNSEND: Okay. CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: Next one? 18 19 MR. TOWNSEND: Page 19 is wrapping up the 20 statewide initiatives will be Adult Education and Literacy 21 Act. I would point out that we made a slight change in the 22 formatting of this just to make it a little easier to see the total initiatives, so what I'm -- how I'm organizing 23 24 this is the, for example, rows one and two are going to be 25 the Accelerate Texas initiative with a subtotal on line 3,

where we are proposing to fund it with two different funding sources. That happens in a couple of different cases there; professional development, and then the leadership excellence down in rows 13 and 14.

Really, it's the same program Adult

Education, we are just trying to keep straight on the type

of funding we have. So, I did just make that -- I don't

think it makes -- will make you any difference from your

perspective of approving initiatives, but I just want to

point that out to you.

If you would like to go down toward the bottom of the page there to see there's a 1.1 reserve balance for Adult Education and Literacy in '19. We don't -- we're not estimating any reserve balance in '20 and '21 at this point. And that's Adult Education.

CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: Any questions?

COMM. ALVAREZ: No, sir.

CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: Thank you.

MR. TOWNSEND: Page 20, I've made a couple highlights there. On pa -- on row 1, the Veterans, the Red, White and You, the veterans job fair, under the '19 column that was increased to 400,000 as approved by the Commissioners. I wasn't clear on whether that was intended to also continue forward. It would make sense that it would in '20 and '21, so I did want to ask for your guidance this

1 morning if you were comfortable with that being reflected at 2 400,000. Of course, we'll make the corresponding changes as 3 well. 4 I assume that's probably what you meant, but 5 I don't think I got specific direction --6 COMM. HUGHS: 7 MR. TOWNSEND: -- from you last time. 8 COMM. HUGHS: Yeah, it was our intention to 9 support staff's recommendation going forward with that 10 additional amount. 11 MR. TOWNSEND: Okay. 12 CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: I would agree. 13 MR. TOWNSEND: I will make that change. 14 COMM. ALVAREZ: I'm fine with that. 15 MR. TOWNSEND: And then, Commissioner 16 Alvarez, I did want to just point out that on the -- and 17 Commissioners, on the -- on row 2 there for the 18 apprenticeship, the WIOA funding, again, I understood it to 19 be one million six hundred fifty thousand was approved on 20 WIOA funding for apprenticeship in '19. I did not make any 21 changes to the 2020 and '21 amounts. And again, if there's 2.2 -- if I've not -- if that is not correct, then you can let 23 me know this -- at this point. 24 COMM. ALVAREZ: Chairman, if I may add, since 25 we're on row 2 now, to discuss '20 and '21, through WIOA

,	founding T would only Dougle, that
1	funding I would ask Randy that so that we can keep close
2	to the \$4.4 contact hour rate as we did a couple of weeks
3	ago when we took action on this, that for '20 and '21, for
4	both of those, that we add \$1.3-million to stay consistent
5	with the 2019 budget. And I'm asking my commissioners to
6	CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: Commissioner Hughs?
7	COMM. HUGHS: My recollection of the
8	discussion was we would see what this how this played
9	out. There wasn't a commitment about the sustainability
10	because this probably should be something that is more
11	sustainable through GR and other means. So I think my vote
12	kind of remains the same as before on whether we continue to
13	expand this through this particular funding stream,
14	although, I am supportive of the effort.
15	So I would note vote to increase it at this
16	time. And instead, see where we are this time next year in
17	anticipation of the future and funding requirements and
18	restrictions.
19	CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: And with these actions,
20	Randy, we still have a significant WIOA reserve.
21	COMM. HUGHS: Correct.
22	COMM. ALVAREZ: 13-million.
23	CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: Yeah, 13-million.
24	MR. TOWNSEND: Yes, sir.
25	CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: So can can we defer

action on this, Commissioner, until you see how the contact hours are playing out through the fall and --

COMM. ALVAREZ: Well, the only reason I state that is because this is what they'll be looking at in the upcoming legislative session. And so it's -- I think it's appropriate at this time that we start somewhat finalizing what we would like to see. That's a significant decrease in funding. I'd like to take action or at least come up with some agreement today, since we're talking about the budget.

Again, I'm looking at -- believe me, we've been working on this for some time now.

CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: Uh-huh.

COMM. ALVAREZ: Since we have WIOA -- since we do have WIOA balance, a reserve balance, I think it's appropriate, Chairman, that we take action on this today. So we can go ahead and continue promoting apprenticeship.

I do want to make it clear, though, when we're out there talking about apprenticeship, I want to make it clear for the record, because I know there are many people that are listening today, that -- that apprenticeship is not just union/non-union, it's just apprenticeship training. And so, I ask that we understand that it's a growing model, we still like -- where we would like to be in the state of Texas and also in Florida. Anything that we can do to promote it. I understand that we have some issues

here when it comes to -- when it comes to talking about the budget, Chairman, but I'm also looking at the reserve balance that we have through WIOA funding and as I recommended two weeks ago, I asked that we not only include it for 2019, but for 2020 and 2021.

And if I may for the record, yesterday, we were in Dallas where we promoted first ever registered apprenticeship program for veterans that are going through drone operating pilot. First ever in the country, not just — so our meeting yesterday with Dr. Hayes with Dallas Community College and the folks at Cedar Valley made this possible, along with the Department of Labor. So, these are the kind of projects that are going to continue to expand and I'm going to need funding for that.

CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: And again, my -- and our support for apprenticeship has been strong. That's why we consistently have had money for this. You know, what we need to keep in mind is while apprenticeship is a good option, there are so many different approaches that are -- that employers embrace, OJT, internship trainings, other certification models that don't require a rigid approach to training. And so at the end of the day, I'm willing to support this. I do think, though, that we need to have a comprehensive posture in terms of how we work with our veterans, which is what we have in place. The -- the fact

that we'll be investing significantly in externships in the next week or two and -- and that we do have some flexibility, I will agree to support this, but I think we need to understand that we can possibly be investing in internship and other applied -- apply learning opportunities that are just effective in terms of connecting our students with a world of work and in some -- and in many cases are actually more effective than some of these models that we have in place.

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What we need to do is work with our federal partners to really relax the approach to doing this and to -- and I know that there's talk at the federal level about developing these new models, but we actually need to see them play out a little bit more consistently than what they have over the past year in terms of how we move forward with these sort of investments, because the numbers given this kind of effort should be significantly bigger than what they are in terms of the number of people that are being served through these investments. But having said that, Commissioner Alvarez, I know that we're making good progress here and for that reason I'm voting to support adding the additional 1.3-million over the two year period, which leaves us with sufficient balances to do some of the other things that we're working on. But I would again, really hope that we focus on these other high learning models

moving forward.

COMM. ALVAREZ: Chairman, I totally agree with you. I've -- again, I appreciate the fact that you've taken these stakeholder meetings to the rural communities and these are exactly the words that are coming directly from those that we had met with and also employers who continuously call the office of opportunities. Last TWIC meeting, one of the questions that was brought up to us by a member of the TWIC board was what were some of the advantages of an apprenticeship training model, what were some of the incentives, and were able to provide that.

And so again, my focus is the adult learner, career and technology and apprenticeship, so again, I thank you for agreeing to that.

MR. TOWNSEND: All right. Commissioners, moving on to the last page, 22, is the Schedule 12, is a summary of performance and incentive awards. And again, you had made a decision last -- last time on the '19 operating budget for three initiatives; the Texas Rising Star Award, the Foster Youth Award, and the HireAbility award. And again, that's reflected there in the '19 as you had approved it. And again, I wasn't -- I was unclear as to what your preference would be for '20 and '21. If you're good with it as presented, that's fine of course, but I did just want to highlight that for you this morning.

CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: Commissioner Hughs?

COMM. HUGHS: I don't see us not continuing to support it. I'm not clear if we need to currently commit to it. I mean, if the rest have historically gone through 2021, then that's fine by me. Certainly, we want to be mindful of the balances that we grow in these areas, but I think we've seen the value of these awards throughout the years and so I continue to be supportive of the effort. But it sounds like for accounting purposes it would be better to know now that we do anticipate proceeding with these awards, not just next year as we discussed, but beyond that.

MR. TOWNSEND: That would seem like it would make some sense and then if you decide as a Commission to change the award itself in advance so that, you know, the criteria is clear, then obviously you have that. You still -- you're not -- you're not locking yourself in necessarily to that, I just -- I mean --

when times have gotten tough reduced in the year that they did get tough these grants in half as we did several years ago. So we do maintain that flexibility moving forward to adjust these now and the year before, before we set these contracts into place.

So it sounds like Commissioner Hughs,

Commissioner Alvarez, are you comfortable adding these

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1 amounts in? So --2 COMM. ALVAREZ: Yes. 3 CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: So Randy, I guess we 4 would add another 100,000 and 120,000 per year from WIOA and 5 300,000 per year from childcare and taking these out for 6 each of the two years of the biennium. 7 Okay. Thank you. MR. TOWNSEND: 8 CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: Yeah, I think we're all 9 in agreement? 10 COMM. HUGHS: Yes. 11 COMM. ALVAREZ: Yes, sir. 12 CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: We're all in agreement. 13 COMM. HUGHS: And then I don't think he's 14 asked about the performance awards or is that next? 15 MR. TOWNSEND: I'm sorry? 16 COMM. HUGHS: Including the -- I think you 17 just mentioned the top three, but the whole six that were 18 highlighted on that page? 19 MR. TOWNSEND: Well, I'm sorry. I should 20 have explained the schedule better. The top, they're the 21 same of awards, I just -- and the -- on the top part I'm 22 identifying it by the funding source and at the bottom, it's 23 just the funding is collapsed if you will. 24 COMM. HUGHS: Oh, sorry, right. 25 MR. TOWNSEND: So it's the same --

-	COMM HINGING. This share

3	COMM. HUGHS: awards. Got it.
4	MR. TOWNSEND: Yeah.
5	COMM. HUGHS: Sorry. Thank you.
6	CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: All right.
7	MR. TOWNSEND: That was all the schedule. I
8	do have a GR reduction page I need to hand out to get some
9	direction on that. I know this is the fun part of the
10	process.
11	CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: Okay.
12	COMM. HUGHS: I was waiting for the fun part.
13	COMM. ALVAREZ: Thank you.
14	COMM. HUGHS: Thank you. Is it my eyes or
15	does the font just keep getting smaller?
16	CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: Oh, my gosh. It's not
17	your eyes, Commissioner.
18	MR. TOWNSEND: I apologize.
19	CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: I had to turn the
20	microphone off.
21	MR. TOWNSEND: Trying to fit this on one page
22	is always tough. Maybe I should go to a second page.
23	At the what I've passed out is the at
24	the very top well, top two-thirds of this page or maybe
25	top three-quarters is the jus a re is a summary for
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the -- for the 2020 year for the general revenue -- well, and all funding sources are by strategy. And what I've attempted to do is try to collapse that down to the -- to the general revenue column which I've highlighted there in yellow. And then there's the maintenance of effort general revenue, which is in the childcare strategy and the TANF Choices strategy, and then I've included all the GR matching in the strategies where they belong. Primarily this is going to be found in the childcare strategy and the Vocational Rehabilitation and the Adult Education and Literacy. And then we do get -- still have some GR match that is for the SNAP E&T program.

And there's a little bit more of general revenue match just depending on how we're cost allocating, I need to take a look at that and make sure that's correct.

The career schools is a gen -- it's considered general revenue by the Legislature, but as you know, that's collected revenue from our career schools, there's a fee schedule for that. So I just want to put that in a separate column there.

And the general revenue dedicated is primarily either the -- what we call the fund 165, the collections from the penalties and interest, that's primarily labor law, and then we do have a couple of strategies now for the vocation -- for the Business

Enterprise of Texas, the BET program, that makes up some of the other general revenue dedicated there.

And again, just by way of just a control total for the amount we're looking at, so the -- the instruction is this, that each agency must identify 10 percent, and it is a schedule that you complete, 10 percent of your state funds, general revenue or general revenue dedicated. And how you would actually organize that is put in four different increments at two and a half percent each to come up with a total of 10 percent for the biennium.

What I've done here is -- is -- is averaged this out over an annual basis, so the total that TWC, the commission has to come up with, is about 19.7-million each year, close to 40-million for the biennium, to total the 10 percent. So that's about 4.9-million in each increment that we have to come up with for each year.

What I've put at the bottom is just a scenario. The way I organized that was just looking at the general revenue and again, the -- the total for the general revenue, pure general revenue each year is about 38 and a half million. Some of that's in -- is in capital, little is in indirect. Primarily, there are three strategies; 114 is the employment community services. That includes a rider 30, \$4-million rider of the community organizations and partnership riders included in that.

The skills development for 27-million, there's 20-million of that -- or 25-million of that is -- is for grant pass-thru funds out of that 27-million, most of that's grants. And then the apprenticeship strategy 1.1 -- 1.18, for just a little over 3-million is general revenue portion of the apprenticeship. And again, most of that 2. - almost 2.9 million of that is actual what we consider grant pass-thru to fund the apprenticeship apprentices out there.

So that all totals up for the grant portion of that out of that 38-million about 32 of that is in some form of grant in the general revenue. And so what I simply did is in that first increment of two and a half percent is identify the -- the rider 30 amount \$4-million and then essentially the proportional split between skills and apprenticeship is 90 percent skills, 10 percent apprenticeship, and so the remaining math on that is -- is reflecting that 10 percent and 90 percent.

And so in the first increment, the 4-million, comes off if the rider 30 would be the first to come out, 95,000 apprenticeship and 837,000 skills. After that, it's just there's -- a split was made between apprenticeship and skills in this scenario, just laying this out to kind of see some numbers here, half a million in apprenticeship in each increment and 4.4-million in skills.

And so if you took it to the logical conclusion of the 10 percent each year, it would be the 4-million rider 30, that would be a 1.6-million -- you have to do the 10 percent reduction -- 1.6-million reduction in apprenticeship and a 14-million reduction on skills under

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this scenario.

I should have -- I'm sorry, I should have started with this fact because this is a difference I believe. In the past in this exercise, the Commission has always considered childcare match as being in play as part of the exercise of a GR reduction. With the rate with this latest appropriation, Congressional appropriation for the childcare program, they increased the -- the childcare block grant for Texas, our share went from about 290-million to 520-million. Part of that appropriation language included language that said that, you know, shall be used -- the additional amount shall be used to supplement, not supplant, state funds. And so, maybe there's a couple different ways to read that. I took it literally that the expectation was we wouldn't reduce general revenue. Perhaps there's a different reading of that. But I did not include that as an option for the childcare under this scenario. And so that is a pretty big departure from how we've taken -- how the Commissioners in the past have considered this exercise.

So with that --

MR. TEMPLE: Randy, and explain the -- then we put additional match requirements on the boards. MR. TOWNSEND: we --MR. TEMPLE: And then what that would go up to if we did just so for the discussion. And that is right. MR. TOWNSEND: course, the -- at that point, I think the local match requirements for the boards was probably in the 30-million I think we're now in the mid-40s at this point. So they did not say the boards couldn't do it, but they certainly their match requirements have increased. But the -- that is actually right, Larry.

But the other point was that appropriation language, which seems to be -- or it's new for this -- that I'm familiar with anyway, at this point, so -- so that's what I just lay out there for -- I mean, we have to complete the schedule just like every other agency. We traditionally come to you, Commissioners. Unfortunately, this is not the most pleasant part of the exercise we have to go through to try and figure out what is our -- of all our high priority funding, what's the -- the lowest of the high priority. And so it is a -- it's not a -- even as an exercise, it's not a -- an easy process to go through, but we do need some direction from you as to how do you like the staff --

MR. TEMPLE: And the divorce on this one is

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1	that it asks for it in the two and a half percent

5	percent, two two increments before, now we have four.
6	COMM. HUGHS: And the largest challenge is we
7	have no lowest priority.

9	COMM. HUGHS: And so it's incredibly painful,
10	but we have such limited GR that I think that what we've
11	done here is at least distributing the pain points. They
12	still look incredibly painful. I hope that we don't get to
13	this point of having to implement any of these, but I do
14	think it's a fair distribution, so I'm supportive of what
15	you've presented and thank you for the work you put into it.
16	CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: Commissioner Alvarez?
17	COMM. ALVAREZ: Randy, first of all, I want
18	to thank you and your staff for I got so many of these
19	handouts I don't even know which one I it is, Randy, to be
20	quite honest with you.
21	MR. TOWNSEND: The one I handed out just a
22	second ago.
23	COMM. ALVAREZ: I'm just kidding. I'm just
24	kidding, Randy.
25	(Laughter)

COMM. ALVAREZ: Randy, I agree with

Commissioner Hughs. This is a painful, unfortunate exercise
that we're having to conduct, and everyone knows how -- how
I value both apprenticeship and skills development. The
only change I would make here, Randy, and I know this is
going to be somewhat alarming to my apprenticeship partners,
and those that I represent, but I would be willing, rather
than the 1.61118, I'd be willing to cut that in half, which
makes it 805,590, to be cut rather than 56 percent, and add
that to the skills development, which would bring a total
\$14,926,746.

That's my recommendation from -- from here.

Though I think it's painful for -- for apprenticeship as I just indicated the value of it, I also know the value of skills. And since this is -- this is an exercise, I'd be willing to negotiate cutting that in half.

COMM. HUGHS: I mean, I know from an employer perspective I'm going to support that this is a fair distribution and then it's a huge hit to skills and so I thought that it was a fair distribution of the amounts.

CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: I continue to believe that skills is our -- one of our most important programs in the state. I think any further -- any reduction at all for skills really limits our ability to align with what's happening in the marketplace.

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I -- I would propose that we leave these options as presented by staff for now, but I would also suggest that -- I've looked at that language, we've reviewed that language that's in the bill, and I think it's -- it can be interpreted a number of different ways. What we do know is that over time state funds have included these local dollars that we use as match. There's precedent where we continue to increase those percentages and understanding that -- that we have maximized our allotment every year with those varying mixes of what is state versus local, at the end of the day they're all considered state dollars because they're -- they're pulling down these federal funds. think we do have flexibility in terms of the local match part of it. I would ask staff to keep looking at it, look at the OMB circulars to look at some of those other things in terms of what is not very well defined and we have yet to hear from -- from the administration for Children and Families on how they will define this.

So I think whatever action we take today, we continue to look at childcare as an option to modify the use three options that have been presented this morning and -- because I do think we do have the flexibility to do some more things for the childcare.

I think staff is right. Whenever we do that, we -- we lose -- potentially lose a dollar here in form of Verbatim Reporting & Transcription, LLC 281.724.8600 what has been submitted as match, but we continue to have the flexibility to draw down all the federal funds and that minimizes the impact on these other important programs were these to be fully considered moving forward, and that's something that can be part of the discussion with the legislature when these discussions come about and are more earnest and -- and timely at that point in time.

So with that, those are my comments. I would just ask that continue looking at that and I'm comfortable with the -- with the notion that these are not our preferred place in terms of these. We do respect the position of the state, we're very proud of the support we get for our programs, and I think we're willing to be partner and we're certainly very comfortable being partners in terms of these requests and these expectations in terms of the scenarios that are required as a part of our LAR.

MR. TEMPLE: Mr. Chairman, are you wanting us to develop a schedule that would include childcare?

CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: I think looking at the language and just continue to work on that prospectively. I think we can take action on this today and always modify it when we -- as we get more information from our federal partners on this.

I do think at the end of the day it's all about demonstrating your ability to pull down the base, the Verbatim Reporting & Transcription, LLC 281.724.8600

1	base allotment, and when you do that, then you demonstrated

HUGHS: Oh. 12 CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: -- Discussion, 13 Consideration and Possible Action Regarding Jobs and 14 Education Advisory Board Program. And so Emily, can you 15 give us an update. What happened last week? And then we'll go back to our discussion. 16 17 MS. CLODFELTER: Thank you Chairman, thank you Commissioners, Mr. Temple, for the record my name is 18 19 Emily Clodfelter with the Office of Employer Initiatives and 20 this morning I would like to share with you -- oh, and this 21 morning I would like to share with you information and 22 action taken from the JET Advisory Board meeting last week on June 26th. 23 24 If you'll look at the applications total 25 summary document, you will see for round three for FY18, the

current RFA, there were 69 applications rec'd from ISDs and 30 applications -- applications rec'd from IHEs and then total in responsive you have 62 from ISDs and 30 from IHEs, for a total rec'd of 99 applications.

CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: Okay.

MS. CLODFELTER: And so for the advisory board meeting last week, the FYI8 JET RFA, the advisory board reviewed and approved applications and directed staff to move forward with awarding grants with the ability to move down the list with the 16 above threshold as recaptured funds become available during the contracting phase.

Regarding next fiscal year, FY19, the advisory board took action the next application to allocate funding 50 percent for ISDs and 50 percent of IHEs. The advisory board also took action to set the minimum and maximum grant amount for \$40,000 for the minimum and \$300,000 for the maximum. An RFA is tentative scheduled to go out close to the beginning of the next fiscal year with the next advisory board meeting tentatively scheduled for November or December.

Advisory board discussed the need for additional funding during the upcoming legislative session and asked that Commissioners consider this in their budget request. They also asked staff to analyze data from these first three rounds FY16-18, those grants, and to create a

study to present to the advisory board during the next 1 2 advisory board meeting. The advisory board also encouraged outreach 3 efforts between now and the publication of the next 4 5 application and asked staff to include them if they could be 6 of any assistance. 7 Thank you for your time and I'm here to 8 answer any questions. 9 CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: Commissioners, any 10 questions for Emily? No? 11 COMM. HUGHS: No. 12 CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: All right. Thank you, 13 Emily. 14 MS. CLODFELTER: Thank you. 15 COMM. ALVAREZ: I just want to take this opportunity to thank you, Emily. Obviously, regardless of 16 17 where we are around the state, you and your team have done a 18 great job of the JET grant. Everybody knows about it. You 19 guys have done a -- like I said, very good job and -- and --20 in not only sharing this information, but the number of 21 applications that we got reflect the good work that you and 22 your team have done. So, I appreciate that. 23 MS. CLODFELTER: Thank you, Commissioner. 24 CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: Commissioner Hughs. 25 COMM. HUGHS: I move that we approve the

discussed recommendations for the Jet Advisory Boards concerning fiscal year 2018 applicants for community, technical and state colleges and independent school districts as recommended by staff.

COMM. ALVAREZ: I'll second that.

CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: We are unanimous. Thank you, Emily.

And getting back to the discussion on exceptional items, so the -- the advisory board members continue to express their support for additional funding. Clearly, there is a demonstrated need in the number of applicants both last biennium and -- and certainly again during this grant period. We continue to have strong demand for the -- for the -- for funds under the program.

This is another one of our Tri-Agency mentioned items and during the last legislative session, we did submit a request for some additional funding. The request for an additional 2-million per year or 4-million total for the biennium, on top of the 10-million currently in place. Clearly, these investments are -- are very significant investments for these different schools that we visit that have been awarded grants and so, Commissioner Hughs, if you have a proposal in terms of an amount that staff or if you want to bring forward an amount at a future meeting?

COMM. HUGHS: I can look at it next week, but
I'd certainly be willing and supportive of entertaining what
we tried to present last round and hope that we find that
this is a less lean session than the last round and there

certainly think we can justify it across the board.

might be an opportunity here to -- to support this.

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CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: Great.

COMM. HUGHS: Okay. And with that then, I quess last, but not least, there was the proposal that was brought forth on Career Navigators last round and I had asked to increase the funding 100 percent from what was requested, so that these Career Navigators could not only support identifying or exposing students to -- and educating them about trades and other things, but all high demand jobs. And I think we had some agreement on that. It didn't -- it didn't get funded, but in looking at it again, with respect to our funding options, it does appear that maybe now it's something we can look at potentially as a statewide initiative. And so, not necessarily for next week, but I do think that's something that maybe this would be the time to entertain that, even look at a way -- we've heard from the board stakeholder meetings how they felt that they needed the support, even on the internship liaisons and have that person maybe cover both of those roles in some way.

initiative. I don't know that it's the discussion for an exception, but again, this is my opportunity to raise it, so I'm raising it now.

CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: Okay. And okay, I'll Commissioner Alvarez to respond to that. Is there anything else, Commissioner?

COMM. ALVAREZ: So -- I'm sorry, go ahead.

COMM. HUGHS: No, that's it.

COMM. ALVAREZ: So, I agree with Commissioner Hughs on the Workforce Career and Technical educational specialist. What -- excuse me. Whether it's done through an exceptional item or through a skill, great recommendation and certainly got my support. We allocated -- or we asked -- the language would need to be changed. This obviously has a lot of momentum, not only with our stakeholders, but the folks that are across the street from us where Senate Bill 154 was put in place. And as you know, our LMCI data was actually distributed to the ISDs as a result of very similar discussions that we had through Jarvis Johnson's bill last session.

My opportunity to -- excuse me -- the opportunity I have here to express some of the exceptional items as discussed earlier, and not -- in no particular order, but one that I favor and I think is a -- is certainly an exceptional item that I fully support, and that is

expanding the skills expansion and I'm not sure if we want to talk about money, but it's a substantial amount. But skills expansion, and Aaron's team has done a great job in - in promoting that and we -- we spoke about that earlier.

Also, Commissioner Hughs just referenced the Career and Workforce Educational Specialist. I have an amount, but we can -- we can have further discussions on that, but that's certainly an LAR or an exceptional item that I would -- I would fully support.

CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: What's your amount you're thinking?

COMM. ALVAREZ: Oh, I can tell you it's 4-million; 2-million per annum, which is last year we introduced in 2018/2019 all of us agreed to one million each and to increase that to 2/2 instead of 1/1, because we were talking about rural and urban and that is to be excluded from the language which we have here present.

CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: Okay.

COMM. ALVAREZ: If you want to talk about expansion of the skills, I would ask that biennium that we go 10-million; 5-million for 2020 and 5-million for 2021.

And then the last one would be increasing biennium of apprenticeship to go 2-million one year and then -- I mean, 2.5-million for 2020, 2.5 for 2021. And again, all these three I -- in agreement with the -- from my fellow

commissioners that this is right in line with our 60 by 30 charge that we have been charged with. And those would be my -- and those have the amounts.

CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: Well, I was thinking that we'd go 100-million for skills, but --

(Laughter)

COMM. ALVAREZ: Well --

COMM. HUGHS: I'm going to keep going up.

COMM. ALVAREZ: -- my -- mine's pretty close.

CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: No, well thank you,

Commissioners. I appreciate you laying that out for fellow

commissioners to consider, for staff to begin doing some of

the background work on this. I'd like for us to follow up

this discussion next week, not take any action on

exceptional items today, look at the idea of the -- of the

MS. CARLSON: Good morning. Debbie Carlson with the Workforce Division.

Earlier this year, you had a series of meetings with Board Chairs and Executive Directors from all the Workforce areas. From several of these areas you heard concerns over challenges that they face providing services in very rural and remote counties. Last month you invited the Rural Workforce Network to a work session to further discussion the issues they face. In each instance, boards identified several common challenges to providing excellent service delivery in these areas.

Twenty-one boards serve 128 Counties of the smallest civilian labor force. These counties share the common challenges identified. They often are a long way from Workforce Solutions offices, they lack transportation, they don't have internet access necessary to make services available. The Commission could use Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act, WIOA, funds, to help boards address

some of the challenges identified. In addition, Childcare

Development Block Grant, CCDBG, funds, could be used to

provide services to childcare facilities in these counties.

This morning, staff seeks direction on

allocating a total of \$2,654,080. Of this total, 1,990,528 would be WIOA funding and 663,552 in CCDBG funding. The purpose of these funds would be expanding and improving services in the 128 smallest and most rural counties.

The childcare funds would allow boards for childcare providers to strengthen their business operations and increase the overall quality of childcare in these counties.

I'll be happy to answer any questions.

CHAIRMAN ALCANTAR: Okay. Commissioners,
questions, comments?

COMM. HUGHS: I want to congratulate staff and the Chairman for leading the charge on organizing these rural boards and getting that input. Appreciate the meetings that we've had and all the discussions that have taken place so that we make sure we allocate funds appropriately and effectively as intended. And so, congratulations on that hard work. On with that, I move that we approve the discussed allocation of \$2,654,080 to the local Workforce Development boards with WIOA and Childcare Development Block Grant funds for rural service

1	delivery as recommended by staff.
