

What is Texas Industry Recognized Apprenticeship?

Apprenticeship is an employer-driven talent development model that combines on-the-job learning with related classroom instruction. Apprentices earn and learn at the same time. It is a proven training model for businesses to recruit, train, and retain highly skilled workers.

Apprenticeship Tax Refund Pilot Program	TWC grants money to address Texas' immediate industrial workforce needs resulting from the impact of hurricanes, other natural disasters, and overall workforce shortages. This money is to encourage the private sector to develop specialized apprenticeships in Texas, resulting in wages equal to or greater than the mid-level status of and attainment of industry credentials in the related occupation.

89th Regular Legislative Session Changes



- Allows partial reimbursements following milestones for apprentices;
- Development of certification process;
- Development of performance metrics, including completion rates and retention outcomes; and
- Aggregated performance metric data publicly available on Commission's website.

89th Legislative Session

Rule Revision: In Progress

Program	2026 Budget	2027 Budget
Texas Industry Recognized Apprenticeship (TIRA)	\$9,881,054	\$9,881,054
TIRA – Broadband	\$5,000,000	\$5,000,000

Challenge: Initial Legislation delayed reimbursements up to 18-24 months

Solution: Texas Legislature 89 (r) Session amended language to allow for

reimbursements based on milestones.

Training lasting no longer than 26 weeks
