- The core idea is that a customer can walk into any American Job Center (Workforce Solutions Center) and get connected to everything they need.
- The Reality for many customers with disabilities, the system can still feel like a maze of separate agencies, repeated paperwork, and confusing handoffs.

The Challenge

- Separate cultures, processes & data systems
- Customer tells their story multiple times
- Lack of deep, functional integration
- Services are stacked, not blended

Co-location is a start, not the destination

The Vision: True Collaboration

Collaboration is a Strategy, Not a Location.

- Shared Vision: All partners agree on a common definition of success for the customer.
- Integrated Services: A single, streamlined process for the customer.
- **Blended & Braided Funding:** Using multiple funding sources to support one unified plan.
- Shared Data & Outcomes: We measure our collective success, not just our individual program metrics.


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Your Role as a VR Leader
