In addition to basic pay, active duty service members may receive numerous allowances, bonuses and over 60 types of special and incentive pay¹. The following chart includes the most common types of these payments:

- 4. The US Department of Defense (DOD) extra payments to retirees to overcome some or all the offset from retired pay associated with receipt of disability compensation from the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA). Retirees cannot receive benefits simultaneously under both of these programs.

5. §809.44(b)(9) states—Special military pay or allowances, including subsistence allowances, housing allowances, family separation allowances, or special allowances for duty subject to hostile fire or imminent danger.

Additionally PL 108-447 states that any additional payment received under Chapter 5 of Title 37, United States Code, by a member of the US Armed Forces deployed to a designated combat zone shall be excluded from household income for the duration of the member's deployment if the additional pay is the result of deployment to or while serving in a combat zone, and it was not received immediately prior to serving in the combat zone. http://militarypay.defense.gov/Pay/Special-and-Incentive-Pays/Index/
