- 16 PART I. PURPOSE, BACKGROUND, AND AUTHORITY
- 17 The purpose of the proposed Chapter 819 rule change is to align TWC's Chapter 819 Texas
- Workforce Commission Civil Rights Division rules with amendments to Texas Labor Code
- 19 §21.054, pursuant to House Bill (HB) 1074, enacted by the 86th Texas Legislature, Regular
- 20 Session (2019), signed into law effective September 1, 2019.
- 21 PART II. EXPLANATION OF INDIVIDUAL PROVISIONS
- 22 (Note: Minor editorial changes are made that do not change the meaning of the rules and,
- therefore, are not discussed in the Explanation of the Individual Provisions)

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- 25 SUBCHAPTER B. EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY PROVISIONS
- 26 TWC proposes the following amendments to Subchapter B:
- **§819.12. Unlawful Employment Practices**
- 28 Texas Labor Code §21.101 prohibits age discrimination against individuals ages 40 and older.
- 29 Section 21.054 prohibits age discrimination as it relates to on-the-job training programs,
- retraining, apprenticeships, and other training. HB 1074 repealed Texas Labor Code §21.054(b),
- which limited this provision to individuals between the ages of 40 and 56.
- 32 Section 819.12(d) is amended to align with Texas Labor Code, Chapter 21, which prohibits age
- discrimination against individuals ages 40 and older.
- 34 PART III. IMPACT STATEMENTS
- 35 Chris Nelson, Chief Financial Officer, has determined that for each year of the first five years the
- rules will be in effect, the following statements will apply:

- 1 There are no additional estimated costs to the state and to local governments expected as a result
- 2 of enforcing or administering the rules.
- 3 There are no estimated cost reductions to the state and to local governments as a result of
- 4 enforcing or administering the rules.
- 5 There are no estimated losses or increases in revenue to the state or to local governments as a
- 6 result of enforcing or administering the rules.
- 7 There are no foreseeable implications relating to costs or revenue of the state or local
- 8 governments as a result of enforcing or administering the rules.
- 9 There are no anticipated economic costs to individuals required to comply with the rules.
- There is no anticipated adverse economic impact on small businesses, microbusinesses, or rural
- communities as a result of enforcing or administering the rules.
- Based on the analyses required by Texas Government Code, §2001.024, TWC has determined
- that the requirement to repeal or amend a rule, as required by HB 1290, 85th Texas Legislature,
- Regular Session (2017)--to be codified at Texas Government Code, §2001.0045--does not apply
- 15 to this rulemaking.

16 Takings Impact Assessment

- 17 Under Texas Government Code, §2007.002(5), "taking" means a governmental action that
- affects private real property, in whole or in part or temporarily or permanently, in a manner that
- requires the governmental entity to compensate the private real property owner as provided by
- 20 the Fifth and Fourteenth Amendments to the United States Constitution or the Texas
- 21 Constitution, §17 or §19, Article I, or restricts or limits the owner's right to the property that
- 22 would otherwise exist in the absence of the governmental action, and is the producing cause of a
- reduction of at least 25 percent in the market value of the affected private real property,
- determined by comparing the market value of the property as if the governmental action is not in
- 25 effect and the market value of the property determined as if the governmental action is in
- 26 effect. TWC completed a Takings Impact Analysis for the proposed rulemaking action under
- 27 Texas Government Code, §2007.043. The primary purpose of this proposed rulemaking action,
- as discussed elsewhere in this preamble, is to align §819.12(d) with amendments to Texas Labor
- Code, §21.054, pursuant to HB 1074, enacted by the 86th Texas Legislature, Regular Session
- 30 (2019), and signed into law effective September 1, 2019.
- 31 The proposed rulemaking action will not create any additional burden on private real property.
- The proposed rulemaking action will not affect private real property in a manner that would
- 33 require compensation to private real property owners under the United States Constitution or the
- 34 Texas Constitution. The proposal also will not affect private real property in a manner that
- restricts or limits an owner's right to the property that would otherwise exist in the absence of the
- 36 governmental action. Therefore, the proposed rulemaking will not cause a taking under Texas
- 37 Government Code, Chapter 2007.
- 38 Government Growth Impact Statement
- 39 TWC has determined that during the first five years the proposed amendments will be in effect:

- 1 -- the proposed amendments will not create or eliminate a government program;
- 2 --implementation of the proposed amendments will not require the creation or elimination of
- 3 employee positions;
- 4 --implementation of the proposed amendments will not require an increase or decrease in future
- 5 legislative appropriations to TWC;
- 6 -- the proposed amendments will not require an increase or decrease in fees paid to TWC;
- 7 -- the proposed amendments will not create a new regulation;
- 8 -- the proposed amendments will not expand, limit, or eliminate an existing regulation;
- 9 -- the proposed amendments will not change the number of individuals subject to the rules; and
- 10 -- the proposed amendments will not positively or adversely affect the state's economy.
- 11 Economic Impact Statement and Regulatory Flexibility Analysis
- 12 TWC has determined that the proposed rules will not have an adverse economic impact on small
- businesses or rural communities, as the proposed rules place no requirements on small businesses
- 14 or rural communities.
- 15 Mariana Vega, Director of Labor Market and Career Information, has determined that there is no
- significant negative impact upon employment conditions in the state as a result of the rules.
- Bryan Snoddy, Director, Civil Rights Division, has determined that for each year of the first five
- years the rules are in effect, the public benefit anticipated as a result of enforcing the proposed
- rules will be to align TWC's rules with recent amendments to the Texas Labor Code.
- TWC hereby certifies that the proposal has been reviewed by legal counsel and found to be
- within TWC's legal authority to adopt.
