

## Background

On August 27, 2017, Hurricane Harvey made landfall on the Texas coast. In response, the US Department of Labor (DOL) awarded \$35 million in Disaster Dislocated Worker Grant (DWG) funds to expedite disaster relief services in 41 Texas counties that were declared federal disaster areas.

To date, the Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) has awarded grants totaling \$31,666,785 to the eight Local Workforce Development Boards (Boards) whose local workforce development areas (workforce areas) include counties that were approved for federal public and individual assistance. TWC continues to work closely with these workforce areas on Hurricane Harvey rebuilding efforts.

TWC and Boards have been in frequent contact throughout the grant period to determine when additional funds might be needed to continue providing services. When a 70% expenditure threshold is reached, TWC has the option to request additional funds from the Department of Labor. The current grant award has expended 89% of the \$35,000,000 total.

## Issues

Deep East Texas, Southeast Texas, Golden Crescent and Coastal Bend Workforce Development Boards have identified a need for additional DWG funding. The current grant has \$1,024,683 in unobligated funds, and Boards project a need for an estimated \$1,873,000 to extend these grant awards for an additional year through December 2020. These grant funds enable participants to secure temporary employment in two areas including humanitarian assistance and clean-up and recovery activities. To date, 821 Texans have been employed at 162 worksites in support of disaster recovery, and local employers indicate an ongoing and critical need to continue employment for 261 participants at 49 worksites.

In addition to the additional funds needed, TWC asked and received a waiver to allow participants to extend temporary employment for an additional 12 months, but no more than 4,160 hours total. TWC will need to request another waiver to extend temporary employment for an additional 12 months, but no more than 6,240 hours to allow participants to continue the important work of recovery. Some examples of the types of work these participants are doing include construction laborer, public works assistant, case manager, and warehouse administrator.

Additional time, funds, and a waiver request are needed to complete identified disaster relief activities in these communities.

## **Decision Point**

Staff seeks approval on two items:

- Approval for awarding the current unobligated balance of \$1,024,683 for 4 Boards to continue implementing Harvey Disaster DWG-funded strategies;
- Approval to move forward a grant modification request to DOL including:
  - a 12-month Period of Performance modification through December 2020 from DOL;
  - o an additional \$1,000,000 from DOL to support a third year of grant implementation;
  - a waiver of the maximum number of hours worked in temporary disaster relief employment to enable workers to continue support for the recovery of their communities.
