Rate for WIOA Program Year 2019. Good morning.

MR. HERR: Good morning commissioners. For the record, my name is Ethan Herr, Workforce Division.

The Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act dealt with these separate changes to the formula-funded youth program, though significantly increasing the minimum expenditure rate for the out-of-school youth population to 75 percent of all youth formula funds allocated to workforce boards.

The 75 percent expenditure requirement has made it difficult for boards to serve both out of school and in-school youth in ways that best meet each local area's needs, which vary according to population, resources, economy, employment outlook, and other labor market factors.

As a component of the two-year WIOA plan modification, TWC requested that the Secretary of Labor lower the out-of-school youth expenditure requirement through a formal waiver request. The secretary approved TWC's waiver request to reduce the minimum expenditure rate to not less than 50 percent. The waiver authorizes TWC to reduce the 75 percent minimum out-of-school youth expenditure rate through June 30, 2020, which is the end of Program Year 2019.

This morning staff seeks direction on reducing the minimum amount of school youth expenditure rate

1	applicable to boards from 75 percent to 60 percent which
2	would bring the out-of-school youth-expenditure threshold
3	back to pre-WIOA levels.

There was 18 one transferred contract employing 32 individuals, all are 19 paid above minimum wage. 20 Staff recommends approval of all service 21 contracts. 14	Commissioner Alvarez and Mr. Serna. For the record I'm
15	Carline Geiger from Vocational Rehabilitation.
16	Post-secondary education and training to
17	include academic, vocational and technical training leading
18	to a bachelor's or higher degree, associate's degree,
19	certificate, or occupation-specific credential is available
20	to eligible VR customers if needed to achieve their
21	employment goal.
22	Currently these services are purchased from
23	community and technical colleges, universities and
24	proprietary schools. Payment is based on the type of degree
25	or certificate the customer is purchasing pursuing.

VR proposes the following policy revisions to address identified issues: Current rates for tuition and fees have not been updated in several years, and do not align with post-secondary education costs reported by institutions of higher education and published by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board, THECB. It is proposed that the maximum rate be based on the type of institution the customer will attend, and align with the categorization of the institutions of higher education by the THECB, which will be public to your community colleges, public technical state college, public four-year university, and health-related institutions.

In addition, the maximum payment will be the average cost for that institution of higher education as published on the College for All Texans website, plus one standard deviation above the average. This maximum rate will encompass the average cost for 84 percent of the institutions of higher education in Texas and allow the rates to cover a variety of post-secondary programs and degrees that a VR customer may need.

The maximum payment for training at a proprietary or career school would be aligned with the same or similar training offered by public community colleges as published on the College for all Texans website.

The proposed new rates would be inclusive of Verbatim Reporting & Transcription, LLC 281.724.8600

both tuition and fees and are detailed in the discussion paper and chapter in your notebooks. Policy would also be revised to provide maximum payments for books and supplies based on the type of institution the customer will attend.

Revisions will align progress requirements for VR customers enrolled in correspondence and distance-learning courses with the requirements at comparable institutions of higher education.

Revisions will align tuition and fee rates for training provided by paid instructors with the maximum tuition and fee rate for training at a proprietary institution.

Policy revisions will align with 40 Texas

Administrative Code Section 856.45 regarding payment for

academic training at a private college or university in

Texas, or at a college or university outside of Texas, with

the maximum rate for tuition and fees for a comparable

public in-state institution of higher education.

Finally, it is proposed that these maximum payments be reviewed annually and updated as necessary based on the methodology described and following publication by the THECB of the average cost for tuition and fees for each of the institutions of higher education.

These maximum payments, if approved, would be effective on or before -- on or after July 1st of this year

1	for customers starting post-secondary education and
2	training. And the new maximum payments would be applied for
3	subsequent semesters or terms for customers that are
4	currently enrolled in post-secondary education and training
5	prior to July 1st.

The Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act, Section 128, provides that state-wide funds may be used for discretionary employment and training activities.

Historically state-wide funds have been made available through an application or competitive process requiring boards to apply.

administrative burden for boards so they may focus their efforts on managing service delivery. The Texas Administrative Code, section 800.63(i) states that the commission may allocate such proportion of available WIOA alternative funding for state-wide activities as it determines appropriate. Utilizing the distribution methodology that is based on the proportionality of all amounts of WIOA formula funds allocated through the program year, as well as an equal base amount.

Boards have an ongoing need to be responsive to employer partners and community colleges in developing specific training projects, so staff are recommending a distribution to the boards that would allow them to implement one or more initiatives from a menu including; High Demand job training initiative, Texas Industry Partnership, externship for teachers, Women's Entrepreneurship Bootcamp, additional individual training

account funds, or other innovative projects for targeted populations.

Boards would be required to submit a plan for the fund usage to TWC that has been approved by their local Workforce Development Board. TW staff will provide confirmation that any board-approved plan is an allowable use of WIO state-wide funds. Staff will also provide regular updates to commissioners on each board's plans, progress, and use of the funds.

Staff recommends that commissioners consider using available FY 2019 WIOA state-wide reserve funds to provide \$11,785,422 in WIOA alternative funding for state-wide activities consistent with commission rules. Any questions?

CHAIR HUGHS: Commissioner Alvarez?

COMM. ALVAREZ: Yes. I have a comment, and then I'd like to make a motion after that. But here are my comments.

CHAIR HUGHS: Okay.

COMM. ALVAREZ: Regarding line 43 on page 1 through line 8 on page 2; page 1 states, Boards can implement one or more initiatives from the menu. Yet the asterisk footnote indicates that four of the listed menu options are required. Shouldn't the boards have the flexibility to implement some or all of the listed options,

otherwise why list the individual training accounts, funds, 1 2 and other initiative projects as a menu option if there are 3 no opportunities to implement with the monies allotted? 4 Also, shouldn't registered apprenticeship be 5 one of the listed menu options, since it helps to serve 6 under-represented populations, individuals with barriers to 7 employment, and helps employers train and retain skilled 8 I believe it should be one of the listed menu workforce. 9 options. 10 These are just the recommendations coming 11 from me. 12 MS. TROKE: Okay. 13 CHAIR HUGHS: Do you have a response? 14 MS. TROKE: So, for apprenticeship, if Sure. 15 they would like to do other innovative projects for targeted 16 populations, they could surely fit that within that 17 category. 18 As far as requiring one of the four main 19 initiatives; high demand, TIF, externship for teachers or 20 Women's Entrepreneurship Boot Camp, so they could choose one 21 of those, plus any combination of the others. 22 COMM. ALVAREZ: Okay. So that was what the asterisk was 23 MS. TROKE: 24 trying to reflect, but maybe that didn't come across that

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clearly.

1	COMM. ALVAREZ: Perfect.
2	CHAIR HUGHS: So, for example, building or
3	construction; some of our other state initiatives the
4	asterisk would allow them to then fund those other items.
5	MS. TROKE: Yes.
6	COMM. ALVAREZ: Thank you for the hard work
7	you put into this, Jen. You and your team.
8	MS. TROKE: Oh, it was a whole team of
9	people.
10	COMM. ALVAREZ: I know and thank you for
11	that. This is really good.
12	CHAIR HUGHS: Before I ask for a motion, I
13	have another comment. But I don't, like do you have any
14	further comments?
15	COMM. ALVAREZ: No. That's the only comments
16	I have.
17	CHAIR HUGHS: Okay. And it's well noted that
18	apprenticeship, this stream of funding to the extent that
19	can be used for that, certainly would be an option for
20	boards.
21	We know in Texas one size does not fit all,
22	and we have had so many great initiatives through the
23	leadership of both staff bringing us information and then
24	commissioners really hearing from stakeholders and coming up
25	with great ideas that have we've seen the impact that

it's had across the state. But, certainly, having to apply for these different RFPs. And then sometimes not getting them. We've been often faced with boards that have been so disappointed not to be able to take advantage of some of these because it was so competitive. So, I know that this is going to be something that's going to be very well received, and I know Commissioner Alvarez and I are going to be excited to get the updates.

COMM. ALVAREZ: Exactly.

CHAIR HUGHS: And find out from the boards across the state what plans they do submit to us, and then see whether any of them are things that we do want to scale. So, I'm really excited to give them this opportunity and give them this flexibility.

COMM. ALVAREZ: Yeah.

CHAIR HUGHS: And I've heard really good feedback. So, with that, is there a motion?

COMM. ALVAREZ: Yes. So, thank you for the comments, Madam Chair. CHAIR HUGHS: Appreciate it, and 1 2 congratulations to Ms. Williams as the new Director of the Workforce and Board Support. 3 4 AGENDA ITEM NO. 16 5 CHAIR HUGHS: All right, Item 16, 6 Discussion, Consideration and Possible Action Regarding 7 Legislative Proposals by the Texas Workforce Commission to 8 the 86th Legislative Regular Session. 9 MR. McCARTY: Good morning Chair Hughs, 10 Commissioner Alvarez. Tom McCarty with External Relations. 11 You may recognize the familiar face to my 12 right, which is Michael Britt. He's had sleep since last 13 week, so he may look a little different. 14 The 86th Texas Legislature adjourned sine die 15 last Monday, May the 27th. During the session TWC monitored 958 bills and staff across the agency prepared over 1200 16 17 impact cost analyses. This board was invaluable in assisting the Government Relations and Finance Department 18 this session. 19 20 As you can see, this is an agency effort, and 21 not just the effort from GR and Finance, but it's the effort 2.2 from all departments within the agency and divisions. 23 I'd like to thank them for all their work in helping us have 24 a successful session. 25 Also, in the audience is the GR team, and if

they would stand, I'd like to recognize their long hours during the session. We have Kim Barry (ph), Joe Dyer (ph), Christopher Grinning (ph), and Aaron Hand (ph). (Applause) They're not done yet, though. They've got to -- we're going to challenge them to have a report done, that we'd normally have to you all in July, to actually have it to you Monday after the veto period. So they may have another weekend under their belt. We'll see how that plays out. I'd also like to thank those that are called upon to serve as a resource witness on the behalf of the agency pretty much on a regular basis, and sometimes on very short notice. Mr. Serna, Courtney Arbour, Carrie Ballast (ph), Will Kay (ph), Aaron Demerson, Cheryl Fuller (ph), Clay Cole, Chuck Ross, Lee Percell (ph), and Mariana Vega, who I understand is on a beach somewhere in Mexico right now. So --CHAIR HUGHS: Yes. MR. McCARTY: Anyways, some of them are in the audience, but I'd like to also thank them and just, you know, they can stand if they want to. CHAIR HUGHS: If your name was called, will you please stand?

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(Applause)

MR. McCARTY: So, this morning I'll provide you with an overview of TWC's appropriations and Michael's going to highlight the major bills that TWC was monitoring as well as our legislative bills, as well.

With respect to the appropriation's bill for the 2020 and 2021 biennium, HB-1 appropriates TWC with approximately 1-billion all funds.

The legislature also funded all TWC's exceptional items requests for the restoration of 35.1-milion in childcare funding that had been originally removed from the Fiscal Year 2021 appropriations. TWC's request for additional 6-million for the Jobs and Education for Texans Program, and an additional 1.3-million in apprenticeship funding.

The legislature also approved TWC's capital budget request for the eligible training provider and career school systems. TWC's request for an unemployment insurance system replacement and the workforce case management system.

TWC. And the bill includes; a new rider that requires TWC to submit a biennium report on AEL program activities and performance measures, a new rider that requires TWC to contract with an external consultant to conduct a review of the AEL program, and it requires AEL grants and awards to be approved by the commission.

1	The bill also includes a rider that allocates
2	250,000 each year of the biennium to form a collaborative
3	partnership with organizations that, among other specific
4	requirements, are exempt from federal income taxes, composed
5	of individuals who have expertise in workforce training, are
6	located in and serve urban areas of the state, and are
7	accredited by the National Center for Construction Education
8	and Research, and have proven experience in administering
9	training programs or contracting with state agencies.
10	And with that, I'm going to turn it over to
11	Michael and let him go over the legislation.
12	MR. BRITT: Good morning Chair Hughs,
13	Commissioner Alvarez. Again, for the record, Michael Britt,
14	Governmental Relations.

The legislature did pass three of TWC's legislative proposals. Senate Bill 1500 by Senator Zaffirini and sponsored by Representative Vo, which was TWC's legislative proposal related to the removal of the unconstitutional provisions of the Texas Payday Law. The bill was signed by the governor on May 22 and became effective on that day.

Senate Bill 1413, by Senator Zaffirini, and also sponsored by Representative Vo, which is TWC's legislative proposal regarding the consolidation of annual reporting requirements, was signed into law on May 28th, and

the bill is effective on September the 1st.

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Finally, Senate Bill 2296, by Senator Powell and sponsored by Representative Vo, is TWC's legislative proposal related to common paymaster. That bill is awaiting the governor's action.

Now I will highlight a few of the major bills related to TWC that were passed this session.

House Bill 680 by Representative Deshotel. This legislation makes numerous changes to the childcare program, including changes to professional development for childcare providers. Requires TWC to consider the cost and placements available when evaluating whether the state CCDF funds address the childcare needs of each board area. Requires TWC to add to its report on the effectiveness of childcare information on the -- on coordination with TEA to assign PEIMS numbers to children younger than 6, coordination with TEA on quality improvement activities, efforts to increase coordination among subsidized childcare providers, and requires TWC to receive input from TEA, open enrollment charter schools among others as part of its stakeholder input on the program. And, finally, the bill allows for boards to establish contracted slots for subsidized childcare.

House Bill 696 by Representative Blanco codifies the Texas Veterans Leadership Program and Operation

Welcome Home Services for veterans and military service members.

House Bill 700 by Representative Guillen.

This bill adds local Workforce Development Boards to the list of entities eligible to receive Skills Development Fund grants. The bill also requires TWC to complete a study on ways to increase the effectiveness of the Skills Development Fund that makes recommendations on when to increase the effectiveness and expand participation in the program.

Next, we had House Bill 1483, by

Representative Frank. This bill creates a pilot program to

be administered by HHSC with assistance from TWC to assist

eligible families to gain permanent self-sufficiency from

means-tested public benefits, including TANF and SNAP.

House Bill 1949 by Representative Guillen requires TWC to establish a performance-based process for annual awarding of AEL funds to grant recipients. This bill also requires that the commission approve the award of all AEL grant funding.

We had House Bill 2784, by Representative Phelan. This legislation creates the Texas Industry-Recognized Apprenticeship Grant Program to address the industrial workforce needs of the state resulting from Hurricane Harvey.

The bill also creates the Texas Industry-Verbatim Reporting & Transcription, LLC 281.724.8600

Recognized Apprenticeship Fund as a dedicated account in the 1 2 state's General Revenue Fund from which these apprenticeship programs will be funded. Next, we had House Bill 3511, by 5 Representative Van Deaver. This bill creates the Commission 6 on the Texas Workforce of the Future, of which TWC is a 7 member. 8 Senate Bill 619 by Senator Birdwell. This 9 bill sets the Sunset Commission review date for the 10 Purchasing from People with Disabilities Program to the Year 11 2027, which aligns it with TWC's upcoming sunset date. 12 Finally, we had Senate Bill 1055 by Senate 13 Bill Zaffirini. This bill creates a workforce diploma pilot project to be administered by TWC. 14 15 Governor Abbott has until June 16th to sign or 16 veto legislation pass during the 86th legislature, so be at 17 that time we'll know which of these bills do, in fact, 18 become enacted or potentially vetoed. And just in closing, 19 I would like to echo Tom's comments on my, you know, extend 20 my thanks to not only agency staff, but also the GR team, 21 which I am privileged to lead every day, and I can't thank 22 them enough for all their help. So, with that, that concludes my remarks, and I'm happy to answer any questions. 23 CHAIR HUGHS: Commissioner Alvarez? 24 25 COMM. ALVAREZ: Great job, Mike, Tom and your

Thank you for keeping us posted on the daily activity 1 2 of what was going on during session. 3 MR. BRITT: Thank you, sir. COMM. ALVAREZ: So thank you for all of your 4 5 work. 6 CHAIR HUGHS: I, too, want to thank you, and 7 I think everyone in this room should give themselves a big 8 round of applause and give you one for surviving the session 9 and all the great work that was done. 10 (Applause) 11 MR. BRITT: Thank you. 12 CHAIR HUGHS: I think it's important to note 13 for them to entrust us with our exceptional items and the 14 additional funding for these programs really speaks to 15 knowing that we're very good stewards of the funds, and that 16 we make such an impact across the state. And that's really 17 due to all the hard work of everyone in this room and across 18 the state with our boards. 4	there. We kind of covered it a lot for the 16.
5	Okay, so 18, Report and Update by the
6	Executive Director and Staff Regarding Administrative
7	Matters, Including Internal Policies and Procedures,
8	Customer and Board Service Issues, Status of Current or
9	Potential Project Assignments, Organizational Matters and
10	Responsibilities of the Agency's Divisions.
11	MR. SERNA: Good morning.
12	CHAIR HUGHS: Good morning.
13	COMM. ALVAREZ: Good morning.
14	MR. SERNA: Very quickly. One of the things
15	that Tom
16	CHAIR HUGHS: And please state your name for
17	the record.
18	MR. SERNA: Oh, I'm sorry. That's right. Ed
19	Serna.
20	CHAIR HUGHS: But you look very familiar.
21	MR. SERNA: Tom Suggested that I stand when
22	Courtney and the other staff stood, and I thought, "Well I
23	can I can sit well and maybe roll over, but I'm not sure
24	I can stand this time."
25	One thing that Tom pointed out, or Michael,

is Senate Bill 1413, which I would like to point out, was a very significant piece of legislation for this agency, and only -- we were only successful and getting it passed because of Tom McCarty's hard work. And I say that. He did work hard on it, but partially tongue in cheek, because he was our resource witness, and I don't believe I've ever seen somebody prepare to be a resource witness on a bill to just consolidate reports as much as I saw Tom prepare.

So that's what happens when you get a GR person to actually have them sit at a table to testify. They realize everything else that we have to go through. But he and all the GR staff and all the agency staff did fantastic during the session. He did point out that that was the first bill, I believe, that the governor did sign. So, it's was that, the reports consolidation.

A couple of things I want to report to the commission. First of all, in IT, we did have an employee receive an Outstanding IT Service and Support Award at the Texas Digital Summit. One of our IT Security staff, and I'm going to -- I'm not going to pronounce your name right, and I apologize so Sophia in advance, but Sophia Glomuzuna (ph), who works in IT Security received this award.

The award honors those dedicated to public service, recognizing the IT team members who work day-in and day-out providing services to the citizens of Texas and

1 their customers. 2 Sophia's done an outstanding job in that She's championed our internal anti-phishing efforts 3 and has been very instrumental in getting the word out and a 4 5 lot of training out in that area. So, we're going to 6 complement Sophia on her receiving that award. 7 COMM. ALVAREZ: And I think she's here. 8 Right? 9 CHAIR HUGHS: Is she here, do you know? 10 COMM. ALVAREZ: I think she's here. 11 MR. SERNA: Yeah. There she is. All right. 12 (Applause) 13 MR. SERNA: I'm surprised that IT let her out of that secure room that they keep her in. But she's done 14 15 an outstanding job for us. 16 Second thing I wanted to do, was going on 17 upstairs right now, and it's been several weeks, are these different sessions for train the trainer for Work in Texas 18 19 replacement. 20 There have been at least four sessions. 21 think this is the fifth one. We've had four for board 22 trainers that are coming in to get trained and we've had one out are our Mopac (ph) facility for our own staff. 23 24 believe those sessions are going very well.

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And the significance of the session is, one,

25

the individuals that are there -- and I went up to visit with them earlier today. The individuals that are there from the boards take that material, but then in their own way customize it so that it meets the needs of their customers in the board much better than having somebody from TWC or our vendor partner, GeoSolutions, go out and provide generic training to all of our board partners. They can -- they can customize it to the unique employees in the boards that'll help them get this done quicker. Those sessions are going very well.

Staff also continues to work with GSI to get the system tested and completed and implemented as we move forward, and those efforts are going on as well, so I wanted to make sure that, one, that the training that was going on very successfully and, two, the continued efforts of the staff to get that system implemented so we can have our new Work in Texas system in place.

And then the other thing I have is a little bit of not-so-happy news. Alfredo Mique (ph) will be leaving the agency effective this Friday. It's been a long farewell. He told me several weeks ago that he was going to be out in the -- he was going to be leaving. And then he promptly was out for a couple of weeks. He is -- he is kind of leading the TWC nest and going and starting his own business to help other state's agencies, as well as possibly

other agencies here, with their RPI efforts. Hanging out his own shingle.

He joined us about six and a half years ago and has done an outstanding job leading our efforts and really getting us -- really getting us motivated. I don't know if Alfredo is here or not, or if he's upstairs. He's not. He's upstairs trying to get a whole bunch of things done in one week, plus get his office packed up. If you'd been in there and seen his office, it's a little bit of a -- of a shambles right now.

But at any rate, I wanted to -- I wanted to express my appreciation to Alfredo for leading our RPI efforts. Which have made a significant impact on the agency and helped us get recognition state-wide for those efforts.

Those are the only things that I have to report.

CHAIR HUGHS: Commissioner Alvarez I have some things to add, but I don't know if you had anything.

COMM. ALVAREZ: Go ahead. No, ma'am.

CHAIR HUGHS: Okay. Well, with respect to Alfredo, I had the opportunity to ride in the elevator with him this morning, so I can attest that he's here, and I guess packing, and I'm excited to hear that he is moving on to this exciting new adventure, which I believe also includes international clients. But he did make a point of

saying he'll be at future stakeholders as an employer in the State of Texas. And we've seen the benefits of RPI across the agency, so I'm really thankful to him for his service in that area and grateful that we're going to continue the work that he began here and with Jonathan and the team. So, looking forward to continuing to have that type of process where we take that time to figure out how we can really find the most efficiencies in the work that we do. So really appreciate their efforts.

I did want to ask Ed, and if this is a conversation for later, I'm just putting it on record as my opportunity to talk to Commissioner Alvarez about it, or at least mention it to him. In the past we had a state-wide initiative specific to healthcare, and I think that we could potentially dust that off. It'd probably be a different version of it. Because I don't know that it was as successful as it could have been. I also think it was specific to nurses.

But we continue to hear across the state for the ongoing need in the healthcare profession, and some examples of some, you know, health -- Allied Healthcare Industry and Occupations type initiative that we could have could address home health aides, dental lab techs, pharmacy techs, phlebotomists, dental hygienists, cardio techs, radiation techs, respiratory techs, physical therapists,

medical assistants, physician assistants. I think we could have a broader range of high-demand jobs and figuring out how we can put little bit of an extra investment as a state to make sure that our healthcare industries are really getting the extra support that they need to continue to grow.

So, I requested staff to look at that as a potential initiative, and bring it back to us for briefing and for a discussion at a future date. And my staff would be happy to work with you on it, and Commissioner Alvarez, if you all want to also weigh in, in the process, I'd be happy to have that briefing as an ongoing opportunity to maybe consider that in a future docket.
