

## MEETING OF THE TEXAS WORKFORCE COMMISSION

**DECEMBER 1, 2020** 

Tuesday, December 1, 2020 1 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Well, good morning, everyone. 2 3 This meeting is called to order. Mr. Trobman, has anyone signed up for 4 public comment? 5 MR. TROBMAN: Morning, Commissioners. We do have some public commenters this morning. Two of them on the public comment 6 7 session and then one later on for Item Number 9. Public comment session, we have Geneva Rivas and if you could just unmute yourself and introduce 8 yourself and go ahead. I think I did see--9 MS. RIVAS: Hi. 10 11 MR. TROBMAN: There you go. 12 MS. RIVAS: Hello, good morning. 13 MR. TROBMAN: Go ahead. Please introduce yourself 14 and begin. 15 MS. RIVAS: Yes. I apologize. I was just trying to 16 see if we could get a time extension for the overpayment notices that have 17 been sent out to the public who have applied for benefits. And possibly, the 18 previous employers are falsifying documents and tried to hide, amid the chaos 19 that has happened in the business world due to the Covid stuff that has 20 affected everything. 21 MR. TROBMAN: Well, I can note--so we have those 22 comments noted here for the record. I also know that we have our leadership 23 team from the UI division and we have your contact information. We're gonna 24 connect you together after this meeting to attempt to address those specific 25 issues, if that works for you.

MS. RIVAS: Yes, and that's perfect, thank you.

MR. TROBMAN: Great, thank you. We also have Rebecca Meryl. If you can unmute yourself and then--

MS. MERYL: Yes. Thank you, thank you. Good morning. Good morning, Commissioners. Thank you for allowing me the opportunity to come before you. Later today, I believe you're going to be ruling on UI cases on Docket 48 and my husband's case is on that docket. And I'm here today to ask you, as you rule, to please consider the facts in the case. The facts were developed in our appeal that we wrote to the Tribunal. We had our hearing and we tried to draw the facts out there, as well. I was very disappointed when the Tribunal decision came out and it completely failed to address how the facts in the situation fit with the law. There was no discussion of the unique facts of my husband's case. And I won't rehash it all, that would be inappropriate and take too much time. But the facts of the matter are that my husband was let go from a summer position with a school employer but it was not his regular academic year position. And there was just summations made in the Tribunal decision that he had a reasonable assurance of returning to the job. That was not correct, as the facts will show. His summer position was completely different than his academic year position. And so I really believe in looking at the statute and looking at also the precedent manual that you all put out, there's a case, TEC versus Child, Inc., that I referenced in my appeal to the Commission that the decision made by the Tribunal is inconsistent with your precedent and I just really feel like the facts need to be examined. I would encourage you to please take a look at the information, if you haven't yet, before you rule. I really do appreciate the work of the Commission. When I appeared before you all in September and asked if we could please get things moving, your

1 staff was extremely responsive and so thank you for that. I just don't understand how a decision could be made without addressing how these facts 2 are different then the facts--the statute is intended to address. And I 3 4 don't mean to be cryptic but I don't know how much I can go into, right? So 5 I just want to be respectful of your time and of the fact that you do have the case before you. And I'm happy to answer any questions. 6 7 MR. TROBMAN: Thank you, Ms. Meryl. And with that, 8 Commissioners, we will--ready to move on to the docket this morning. 9 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: All right. Thank you, everyone. Good morning, Ms. Miller. 10 11 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Thank you. This brings us to the end of Agenda Item Three through Seven. Let's pause for a few moments to 12 reset for the rest of the meeting. 13 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: All right. Looks like everybody's 14 15 back. Let's move to Agenda Item Eight, Special Consideration, Possible 16 Action Regarding the Acceptance (unintelligible) Contract Year 2020 and 2021 17 Child Care Matching Funds. 18 MR. WEAVER: Good morning, Chairman Daniel, 19 Commissioners, Mr. Serna. For the record, Travis Weaver, Workforce 20 Development Division (unintelligible) local match pledges to secure federal 21 child care funds pursuant to Commission Rule 809.17. This will be a standing 22 agenda item as boards may continue to submit match agreements through January 23 31, 2021. Commissioners, a couple of comments prior to our request. 24 Today's agenda includes 20 match agreements from ten 25 boards, which includes Central Texas, Deep East, Golden Crescent, Gulf Coast,

Lower Ria, North Texas, Panhandle, Permian Basin, South Texas and Tarrant

1 County. Twelve Boards have secured a portion of match with ten securing at least fifty percent of their total. Of the ten, seven boards have secured 2 their match for 2021 and two have exceeded their local match target. To date 3 4 (unintelligible) have secured 22.66 percent of their statewide child care 5 match target compared to 17.70 percent at this time last year. Boards have not notified TWC of any issues securing BCY '21 match at this point. 6 7 One item of note, Permian Basin annually submits six match agreements; however, one of their long term partners was not able to 8 9 participate this year. Due to the increase of \$46,320 made by Midland College from last year's pledge, their board was able to secure their BCY '21 10 11 local match target. We appreciate when other longstanding partners step up 12 to assist our boards with their local match effort. 13 Today, staff requests Commission acceptance of child care pledges for donations, transfers and certifications of expense for BCY 14 15 '21 in the amount of \$7,498,471. 16 Commissioners, this concludes my comments. I'm 17 happy to answer any questions. 18 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Comments or questions? COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Chairman, no comments here. 19 20 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: I'd just like to commend the 21 boards on this work on 22 percent versus 17 last year at the same time in 22 this pandemic. It's commendable. Good work (unintelligible) team out there. 23 MR. WEAVER: Thank you, sir.

    For the record, Allison Wilson, Child Care and Early Learning Division.

    Industry partners that are private employers or corporate foundations have an
    interest in making investments that promote early education and a strong
14
15
    foundation for the future workforce through the creation of a child care
16
    industry partnership program, TWC and the boards can leverage these private
17
    investments with child care and development fund dollars to support public-
18
    private partnerships that improve the quality child care and early learning.
                              Similar to TWC's Texas Industry Partnership Program,
19
20
    a child care industry partnership program would provide a 100 percent match
21
    of local cash contributions donated by industry partners. Through a rolling
22
    application process, boards will be able to submit CCIP proposals and TWC
23
    will provide matching funds to support approved projects.
24
                              TWC will grant both donated and matching funds to
25
    the board for implementation of the proposed activities. As described in the
    discussion papers, successful applications will support the strategic
```

development and expansion of high-quality child care and early learning, excluding direct child care services.

At the state level, TWC can also use these private donations as excess federal match, which may allow TWC to secure unmatched federal funds made available by other states who are unable to meet their state's federal match target.

Staff seeks direction on launching a child care industry partnership program in January with \$5 million in CCDF statewide funds to be made available until funds are depleted. Funding matching grants based on partner cash match donations provided by industry partners as detailed in the discussion paper, we're requiring that donated funds be transferred to TWC and accepted by the Commission in an open posted meeting and subsequently granted to the Board along with matching funds.

Using the privately-donated funds as excess federal match and ensuring that donors understand CCDF regulations for privately-donated funds. If approved, this program will be launched in mid-January, which will provide time for staff to review the program with boards, issue guidance and post the application documentation on the TWC website. And that concludes my remarks. I'm happy to answer any questions you may have.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: All right. Commissioners, if I could, I'm advised that there may be a public comment around this issue. I think this would be a good time to hear public comment. Ms. Wilson, stand by. I believe we have some questions for you.

COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Yes. We have Melanie Rubin. If you could go ahead and unmute yourself and introduce yourself and who you represent.

MS. RUBIN: Thank you, Chairman Daniel,

Commissioners Alvarez and Demerson and Mr. Serna for all you do and for this opportunity to provide input on the proposed child care industry partnership program. I am Melanie Rubin, Director of the Dallas Early Education

Alliance. The Alliance is a collaboration of early education providers, researchers, community leaders, advocates and service providers who are working together to ensure the accessibility of high-quality early education for all Texas children.

As you know, the child care industry is important to Texas and to Texans on three dimensions; to employ a workforce, to enable parents to work and to provide an environment in which children can build a successful foundation, optimize their potential and ultimately contribute to our future labor market.

The Covid-19 pandemic has further highlighted the necessity and fragility of the child care industry. We particularly appreciate the responsiveness of the Texas Workforce Commission to step in and step up to support the professionals, children, families, communities and our economy. TWC's creative thinking and effective management of the subsidized child care program reflect a deep understanding of the newly-presented challenges to an already strained system. We are again impressed and appreciative of the innovative proposed program that will undoubtedly, effectively incentivize both the philanthropic and corporate communities to strategically contribute to sustaining high-quality child care. We appreciate the structure of this program, which allows for local flexibility and the ability to prioritize local needs. The program has been thoughtfully developed to ensure that both the local and the federally-matched dollars are

used in ways that will make a significant difference. All this at a critical time in which the child care providers are hanging on a thread to stay in business. Clearly, the child care industry is essential to the success of our Texas economy. With all the current challenges, programs like this that engage new partners and cleverly-layered funding is essential. We appreciate your focus to ensure that the child care industry not only survives during this challenging time but that Texas parents can go to work knowing that their children have access to high-quality early learning to maximize their potential. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Thank you. All right,
Commissioners. Any comments or questions (inaudible)?

COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Chairman, if I may, I would agree with Ms. Rubin. I want to thank her for her comments and all she does for early child care. I couldn't agree more. I am totally impressed with this initiative. The CCIP program. Great idea, what a--when I read this discussion paper some time back, I was impressed with what we were doing. So I just wanted to thank Ms. Wilson and her team and, of course, Regan Miller and everybody for what they're doing for our young. I would say future workforce but thank you for that. This is a great program and I'm actually looking forward to seeing the results of this program, so thank you. Thank you, Chairman.

COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Chair, I want to agree with Commissioner Alvarez and thank Ms. Rubin for her comments. This program assimilates the TIP program that we had for years and that was started and it was (unintelligible) employer in our Texas community that actually stepped out. He had an opportunity to leverage funds like that Marilyn Smith and a

For the record, 18 my name is Fabiana Ramirez, Program Specialist with Adult Education and 19 Literacy (unintelligible) passed by the 83rd Texas Legislature regular session 20 requires that the TWC report education and employment outcomes for the adult 21 education and literacy program by December 1 of every even number year. 22 Rider 45 of House Bill One passed by the  $86^{\rm th}$  Texas Legislature regular 23 session requires TWC to report also on adult literacy activities and 24 performance measures, as well. Rider 45 further requires that the report, 25 quote, "identify the types of literacy programs conducted by providers and

the measurable outcomes on literacy performed by the program," end quote.

This report (unintelligible) description of the AEL grantees, the types of 1 services provided by grantees and overview of how AEL programs measure the 2 skill advancements of students and the literacy gains made by participants in 3 4 AEL program year 2019 and 2020. 5 Also provided is a summary of the educational and employment outcomes as provided in the performance measures table. At this 6 7 time, staff seeks direction on submission of this report to the Texas Legislature to fulfill the reported requirements under Labor Code Chapter 315 8 9 and House Bills Rider 45 as passed by the  $86^{\text{th}}$  Texas Legislature regular 10 session. Thank you. I'm happy to answer any question you may have. 11 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Comments or questions? 12 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: No. Good report, Fabiana. 13 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Just a quick thing, Mr. 14 Chairman. I want to commend the staff on you guys listening to the legislative body last session and really addressing those concerns in this 15 16 report. I appreciate that being done. And then secondly, you may want (unintelligible) we have the 2020 results and you may look at--comparing that 17 18 to 2019. We may not be hitting the numbers that we had back in 2019 and that 19 may be due to this pandemic.                              MR. COLE: So this is a discussion paper on 2021 Tax
15
    Rates for the 2021 Tax Rate Year. Background. The Commission normally sets
16
    rates in November each year for the upcoming calendar year. Tax rates in the
17
    Texas Unemployment Compensation Act provides the methodology and allowable
18
    flexibility. The Commission has in setting employer tax rates, tax notices
19
    would normally go out on or around December 10 for the 2021 year. The
20
    Commission must compute the replenishment ratio for each calendar year before
21
    the date of the first contribution payment with respect to wages for
22
    employment paid in the year due April 1, 2021. Once computed for the year,
23
    the replenishment ratio may not be adjusted to notify employers by the
24
    statutory deadline. Rates would need to be calculated no later than February
```

25

2021.

In general tax rate issue, the general tax rate is comprised of two factors, the benefit ratio and replenishment ratio. The benefit ratio is designed to recoup effectively charge benefits from experience-rated employers over a three-year period. The replenishment ratio is designed to cover one half of the non-effective charges in the current year. The general tax year is the product of these two ratios. The general tax rate has a maximum rate of six percent amounts over the employer's maximum rate become non-effective charges used in the replenishment ratio and replenishment tax.

The Commission has no authority to adjust the general tax rate. The decision point today is we need the Commission to decide--because the Commission has no authority to adjust the general tax rate, there's still factors that could affect the replenishment ratio to reduce the replenishment ratio for tax year 2021.

There are two current options available regarding the general tax rate and those options are, one, calculate the general tax rate with the current data and statue as scheduled and then two, plan for the calculation of the replenishment ratio in February, 2021 to allow the Commission more time to explore other options that could reduce the replenishment ratio. Published in the replenishment ratio in February would affect the timeline for issuing all tax rates.

And that's my presentation but we need, yeah, the decision on those two points that I outlined. Calculate the general tax rate with the current data, statute as scheduled in December or plan for the calculation of the replenishment ratio in February, 2021 to allow the

Commission more time to explore other options that could reduce the replenishment ratio for Texas employers.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Comments or questions?

COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Chairman, if I may, could I hear if you all have any comments prior to me maybe making any remarks on this particular issue?

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Commissioner Demerson?

COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Sure. I, first of all, want to thank Clay and Chris and Randy, the team, and Ed just grateful that we have such a deep bench, especially Dealing with the situation that's facing us right now. I, as representing the employers, appreciate the fact of allowing (unintelligible) the team has been out talking about payroll tax 101 for some time kind of knowing that we would have an impact to our state in some form or fashion. And so the decisions or the options that the team is bringing forward to us allow the opportunity to take action in that regard. And I'll be supporting our moving towards delaying this so that we can actually—or pushing this back so that we're in a position to give employers even more time and put ourselves in a position where we're looking at all of the available options that are out there for such a (unintelligible) complex situation. So taking the time to do that, I appreciate the team bringing us these options forward.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Yeah, my only comment would be similar in the sense that I think there are still some unexplored options here, some things we need to understand better and I would be in favor of moving this to February.

MS. RAMIREZ: Good morning, Commissioners and Mr. Serna. Again for the record, my name is Fabiana Ramirez, program specialist with Adult Educational Literacy (unintelligible) before you today for your consideration for adoption are final rule amendments to (unintelligible) 800 and Rural Development under Chapter 805. House Bill 1949 and House Bill 3 both enacted by the 86th Texas Legislature regular session require TWC to develop rules. The legislation under House Bill 3 relates to TWC's implementation of a high school equivalency subsidy program with funds transferred from the Texas Education Agency. Legislation passed under House Bill 1949 relates to performance-based funding criteria for adult education and literacy programs.

In an open meeting on September 8, the Commission approved the proposed rules amendment to Chapters 800 and 805 of the Texas Administrative Code to implement this legislation. The proposed rule amendments were published in the September 25 issue of the Texas Register for a 30-day public comment period. TWC did not receive comments on the proposed rules and therefore, their final rules include no changes.

At this time, staff seeks Commissions action regarding the adoption of the Chapter 800 and Chapter 805 rule amendments as included in today's meeting notebook materials. Item 13A and 13B. And as published on the Agency's website. Should the commission adopt these rules, staff requests the ability to make minor, non-substantive changes to the document in order to comply with publication requirements of the Texas Register and the Office of the Secretary of State.

Commissioner Alvarez, Commissioner Demerson and Mr. Serna (unintelligible) date for you. You may recall that WIOA regulations established a very specific requirement for what can count as a pre-employment transition service for students with disabilities. And (unintelligible) earlier this summer, Commissioner Alvarez indicated that he was going to send a letter to our federal oversight agency to express the value of pre-apprenticeship as a service for students with disabilities and encouraged them to allow that service as a pre-employment transition service to students. We did, last week, receive a response to the Commissioner's letter from RSA. They did indicate that we may use the funds for pre-employment transition services to offer pre-apprenticeship to students with disabilities, so long as the activities are designed consistent with the federal regulations and the previously issued guidance from the Department of Labor about what constitutes a quality pre-apprenticeship program. So we are evaluating that information from RSA. We were encouraged by their response because it does open the door to expanding the services we can offer students with disabilities through our program. So we just wanted to make you aware of that and let you know we're looking at their response in detail.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: All right, thank you. Any questions or comments?

COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: I just want to thank Cheryl. She's been working on this for a couple of years now, so Cheryl, thank you and your team for being able to put that together and I look forward to the

results of having more folks with disability go through an apprenticeship program. So thank you for that.

MS. FULLER: Yes, sir.

COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: And I'd like to just say congratulations on moving that forward, Commissioner Alvarez, that's a heck of an initiative. And again, it just provides employers with another option and it serves (unintelligible) community in a big, big way. So another option there. Congratulations on getting it that far.

OMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: So I know we've had an opportunity to talk to folks like Jason Shaw, who's putting together an apprenticeship program with ACC and I know he's been working with Cheryl and her team, so I want to thank the Commissioners for this. I think it's certainly outside the box thinking and so again, Cheryl, thank you for the work that you've done to put this through and make this possible. So thank you. You should be commended for it.
