

## MEETING OF THE TEXAS WORKFORCE COMMISSION

Tuesday, May 20, 2025

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: All right. Good morning, all. This meeting is called to order. Mr. Trobman, has anyone signed up for public comment?

MR. TROBMAN: No, sir.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: The motion passes with the exceptions noted. This brings us to the end of Agenda Items 1 through 8. We'll take a short recess.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Year 2026 WIOA allocations, rapid response distributions, and AEL allocations.

CHRIS NELSON: Good morning, chairman, commissioners, Mr. Serna. For the record, Chris Nelson, chief financial officer. This morning, uh, I have just provided you with an updated allocation packet for your consideration. On Friday after TWC published its allocation packet using WIOA planning ested amoun, estimat, estimate amounts provided by the Department of Labor, they issued the official allotments to the state of Texas. The allocations were recalculated with the official allotment amounts for the WIOA adult and youth programs to meet the 85 percent allocation requirements as set forth in TWC Rule which includes a \$4,169 increase in WIOA adult and a \$554,442 reduction in youth, uh, from the schedules previously provided to you. Staff did not recalculate the WIOA dislocated worker allocation as the amount change was minimal and TWC

allocates more than the required 60 percent to the Workforce Development Boards. Overall, this is about a 10 percent reduction for the state's allotment from 2025. Also included is a rapid response distribution for boards out of the dislocated worker funds. These are for grant agreements that will go into effect July 1, 2025. Also in your, included in your packet is a PY25/FY26 allocation for the adult education program. As of today, TWC has not received an allotment for the adult education program nor has it received a planning estimate. For that reason, staff are bringing forward an allocation for con, commission consideration that includes 100 percent of the 9.5 million of state general revenue appropriated to the AEL program and 100 percent of the 5.8 million of the appropriated TANF funds appropriated to the, uh, adult ed program but staff are only recommending 50, to allocate at this time 50 percent of that PY24/FY25, uh, federal funds until TWC receives an official allotment from the Department of, uh, Education. At that time TWC will recalculate the full allocation and bring that before the commission for approval. Also included in your packet is, is a distribution of 50 percent of the PY24/FY25 integrated English literacy and civics education funds that is distributed at the same proportion to providers that responded to the procurement that went into effect last July. Uh, all of these funds will go into effect July 1, 2025. Uh, that concludes my comments and I'd be happy to answer any questions.

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CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Comments or questions?

COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: Uh, none here.

COMMISSIONER ESPARZA: I got [inaudible].

Chris, thank you so much for your briefing. Uh, just to kind of clarify. We're hoping that, to help the boards out because at the end of this, it's, uh, you know, it's a reduction so it's a tough pill to swallow but I appreciate that we didn't sit and wait on, on, on—we used estimates or [inaudible].

CHRIS NELSON: Right.

COMMISSIONER ESPARZA: Please go over again, are these—are the estimates that we were briefed on let's say last week or the week before, uh, have we—are these the hard numbers that we're [inaudible]?

CHRIS NELSON: So these are the—yes, the WIOA adult dislocated youth are the, uh, uh, hard numbers so we got the official allotment to, to all states got their official allotment, uh, Friday morning, uh, after we had kind of finished our last briefing using the planning estimate numbers we had received from the Department of Labor some time before, uh, so whether it was—maybe it was just they saw this on the commission agenda and decided, well, we might as well release the official numbers so, uh, but yes, these are the hard official numbers for the state of Texas.

COMMISSIONER ESPARZA: OK, good timing. The uh, at least we're not going into the beginning of summer, uh. I

know a lot of boards are, are, they're, they're putting their plans into, into action so I know some of that, some of the funding that they're spending is, is building leases, etc. Uh, the—are we able to—are we able to provide how each of the 10 percent whole reduction was knocked into each of the 28 different boards at a certain, uh, at a certain algorithm [inaudible]?

CHRIS NELSON: So the states—
COMMISSIONER ESPARZA: That we agreed to

CHRIS NELSON: So the state's overall allotment was reduced by approximately 10 percent for each program.

COMMISSIONER ESPARZA: OK.

CHRIS NELSON: That is largely driven by the funding amount which isn't too much different than the prior year but also the change in factor. So for adult and, uh, youth we use the exact same factors that the Department of Labor uses when it, uh, kind of disburses funds to, to all states, uh, and that is on adult and youth it's, there's three parts to each and they are somewhat similar, one, and the 33.33 percent each, disadvantaged adult or youth and then areas of excess unemployment, and areas of substantial unemployment. So those three factors, uh, dictate how much each state gets and then when we get the funding, that's what dict—by county level

dictates how much each board area gets, and so what you saw at, at the, uh, national level with the factor data is, uh, Texas proportionate share of all those factors has gone down relative to everybody else, and relative is the key term because you can see an increase in the raw factor data.

COMMISSIONER ESPARZA: Yeah.

CHRIS NELSON: But if, if other states have a much higher increase [inaudible] for the boards [inaudible] counties, so you can have your area see an increase in raw factor but if other counties, uh, see increases, your, your relative change may be actually less than theirs so—

COMMISSIONER ESPARZA: Right, so not—I did notice in a lot of different board areas or MSAs that, for instance, Permian Basin is going to take about an 18 percent hit, uh, whereas the Capital Area—I'm specifically talking about dislocated workers, the dislocated worker program, uh, places like Capital Area are, are increased at point, 0.3. Uh, I, I definitely want to recommend—I, I, I cont, I want to continue learning about how, how the factors on numbers came, came to play, what boards in different parts of the state can do, uh, if we—I would encourage any of the boards also if they have any questions, I'd, I'd like to be available for, for any of those visits if they, if they contact us or they contact you to ask about how everything was factored in. I'd appreciate getting a heads—up so we can be in on that too.

1	CHRIS NELSON: And we do get questions time
2	to time from boards on the background behind it. Two, a couple
3	things that also play into this is there is a hold harmless and
4	then a stop gain provision so it's-basically it's 80 percent.
5	Every board should get at least 80 percent of what they got
6	before so if any board with the raw factor data is below that,
7	there's a reallocation that does, that brings them up but, of
8	course, you have to take that from some other-some-from the
9	other areas and it just keeps running through that until every
10	board is at the hold harmless provision or the stop gain so that
11	if you—one area got way too much, it, it reallocates that until
12	everybody's within the hold harmless, stop gain so-and I think
13	Permian Basin is one of those areas that was affected by that.
14	COMMISSIONER ESPARZA: Yes, sir. OK. Thanks,
15	Chris. Appreciate you clarifying on that. No further questions.
16	CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Is there a motion?
17	COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: Chairman, I move that
18	we adopt the program year 2025/fiscal year 2026 allocations and
19	distributions for the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act
20	adult education and literacy and rapid response programs as
21	recommended today by staff.
22	COMMISSIONER ESPARZA: I second.
23	CHAIRMAN DANIEL: It's been moved and
24	seconded and the motion carries.

CHRIS NELSON: Thank you.

1 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: This is Agenda Item 10, 2 local Workforce Development Board nominees. 3 PATRICIA MARTINEZ: Good morning, chairman, 4 commissioners, Mr. Serna. Uh, for the record, Patricia Martinez, 5 Workforce Development Division. Today I have for your 6 consideration the Workforce Board nomination for Workforce 7 Solutions Golden Crescent. Staff recommends approval on the 8 presented nominee, and I'm here to answer any questions you may 9 have. 10 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Comments or questions? 11 COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: Uh, none here. 12 COMMISSIONER ESPARZA: No questions. 13 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Is there a motion? 14 COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: Chairman, I move that 15 we approve the local Workforce Development Board member nominee 16 presented today for Workforce Solutions Golden Crescent. 17 COMMISSIONER ESPARZA: I second. 18 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: It's been moved and 19 seconded and the motion carries. Thank you. Legislative report. 20 MICHAEL BRITT: Good morning, Mr. Chairman, 21 commissioners, Mr. Serna. For the record, Michael Britt, 22 governmental relations. Uh, this week TWC is providing resource 23 witness testimony for a, for a couple of legislative hearings. 24 Uh, this morning we have Mary York available as a resource 25 witness in the Senate Committee on Education, uh, K through 16,

on House Bill 322 by Representative Guillen which relates to the use of federal funds-which relates to the use of funds awarded under the JET program. This afternoon, Allison Wilson will serve as a resource witness in the Senate Committee on Health and Human Services on House Bill 4903 by Representative Harris Davila which relates to the establishment of a quad-agency child care initiative. Also yesterday the Texas Senate passed three TWC legislative proposals. House Bill 3698 by Representative Vo which is TWC's legislative proposal related to RESEA, House Bill 3699 also by Representative Vo which is TWC's legislative proposal related to modifying the definition of last work, and House Bill 3700 by Representative Vo which is TWC's legislative proposal related to establishing fraud, waste, and abuse detection and prevention for all TWC programs. These three bills will now be sent to the governor for his consideration. Uh, yesterday Governor Abbott also signed into law Senate Bill 765 which is TWC's legislative proposal related to the confidentiality of fraud detection and prevention methods. And just as a reminder, the 89th Legislative Session will conclude on Monday, June  $2^{nd}$ . This concludes my remarks. Happy to answer any questions.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Any comments or questions?

COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: Uh, none here.

COMMISSIONER ESPARZA: No questions.

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1 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Lot of chatter yesterday 2 around the capital about your, about your wardrobe, about some 3 of your sartorial choices. 4 MICHAEL BRITT: Yes, sir. 5 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: And whether or not you, 6 you had modeled that off of certain executive staff here at TWC. 7 I'm, I'm pleased to see that you, you've almost identically 8 copied the look of Mr. Serna and Mr. Townsend today. Given all 9 the chatter I heard yesterday, I think that was a wise sartorial choice. 10 11 MICHAEL BRITT: Yes, sir. I thought, I 12 thought that was an appropriate choice myself. 13 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Wonderful. Any other 14 comments or questions. None? Thank you, sir. 15 MICHAEL BRITT: Thank you. 16 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: An executive director's 17 report. 18 MR. SERNA: Uh, after that there's nothing 19 for me to report. We do have a STAR award, uh, to present to 20 three of our, uh, employees in IT, uh, Matt Duffy, Joseph 21 Leadley, and Thomas Beckley, and I think that Jerry White, our 22 HR director, he nominated these individuals, will be laying that 23 out. 24 JERRY WHITE: Thank you. Chairman, 25 commissioners, Mr. Serna, uh, for the record, I'm Jerry White,

director of human resources here at TWC. I'm here today as a nominator of three deserving recipients for this quarter's STAR awards. The STAR award program recognizes employees for significant contributions that go beyond their day-to-day responsibilities and help foster a culture of continuous improvement here at TWC. Today's nominees are Matt Duffy, Joseph Leadley, and Thomas Beckley, the three members of the agency's artificial intelligence team. They are being recognized today not only for rolling out AI, an exciting technology that's a rage worldwide but for how they did it, uh, and that's a process that's been based in good, old fashioned customer service. They've taken time learning their customers' process constraints, guiding discussions about AI, how AI can help alleviate them, implementing some fantastic new tools, gathering metrics on how those tools' effectiveness, uh, really work, and then moving on to a long list of other projects. Their work has made it easier to analyze legislation and access questions about many HR topics and streamline computer coding. They have been great ambassadors for this technology by showing our employees how they can be used to augment the work of our teams. They're even working on a tool that creates a podcast, uh, on big, difficult-to-understand topics. Uh, I heard a nine-minute version of our personnel manual last week, uh. Our personnel manual takes a little longer than nine minutes to go through and they have these people talking enthusiastically about it which

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is just a delightful change from what I typically hear so that's great. Uh, they've done it all in way ensuring that all of our agency data is secure and, uh, protected. Their efforts are an investment with rewards for all of us. Matt, Joseph, and Thomas went above and beyond, and their innovative approach has made a significant impact on the agency, empowering staff to work smarter, faster, and with greater efficiency. Please join me in congratulating them for this well-earned award.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: So, uh, these tools are transformative here at TWC and will continue to be so. I appreciate all the effort that goes in them. This is difficult work and the government presents challenges for using artificial intelligence. I appreciate in your whole presentation you didn't say the word Skynet one time so feel like, I feel like these guys are developing good tools, and Commissioner Esparza and I were just discussing during your presentation, this is going to make him a better podcaster because of this competition that he now has from the computer here within. Thanks, Jerry, for coming today and bringing this to us.

COMMISSIONER ESPARZA: Thanks, Jerry.

JERRY WHITE: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Job well done. All right.

Mr. Serna, any other, any other business?

MR. SERNA: No, sir. No other business.
