

## MEETING OF THE TEXAS WORKFORCE COMMISSION

1 Tuesday, August 19, 2025 2 COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: Hey, good morning, 3 everyone. Uh, this meeting is called to order. Mr. Trobman, has 4 anyone signed up for public comment? 5 MR. TROBMAN: No, sir. COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: OK. Let's move on 6 7 then to the policy agenda items for today. This is Agenda Item 8 3, 2025 Program Year Report on Apprenticeships. 9 KERRY BALLAST: Good morning, Commissioner 10 Treviño, Commissioner Esparza, and Mr. Serna. For the record, 11 Kerry Ballast, Workforce Development Division. Texas Labor Code, 12 Section 302.0191, states that the Texas Workforce Commission 13 must report on active registered apprenticeship programs in the 14 state and make recommendations to expand the availability of 15 apprenticeship programs in emerging and high-demand industries 16 and occupations. At this time staff requests approval of the 17 report on available apprenticeships for program year 2025 to be 18 submitted to the Texas Legislature. This concludes my remarks. 19 I'm happy to answer any questions. 20 COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: Uh, Commissioner 21 Esparza, you have any questions or comments? 22 COMMISSIONER ESPARZA: No questions. 23 COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: Uh, I move that we 24 approve the program year 2025 report on available 25 apprenticeships as recommended today by staff.

COMMISSIONER ESPARZA: I second.

COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: Motion carries.

MR. SERNA: Excuse me, Mr. Chairman. Before, before she gets away from that front mic, I would like to point out that, uh, Kerry Ballast is retiring from TWC and state government and today is her last commission meeting. Uh, she's done an outstanding job. It's been my pleasure and honor to work with her and see all the things that she's worked very hard to accomplish. She was telling me the story of when Larry Temple, uh, brought her over just to come and observe a commission meeting, uh, which is a good way to hook somebody in. So I just wanted to make sure that you all were aware that today was her last commission meeting.

COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: I appreciate it, Ed. I know, uh, we were aware but we were told that she didn't want any, uh, big fanfare.

MR. SERNA: There's an advantage to being the executive director.

COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: Since she started, thank you very much, Kerry, and I appreciate working with you and whatever you need in the future, you always have a place to come back to here with me and appreciate all the help and guidance you gave me when we were starting out. So, thank you.

KERRY BALLAST: Thank you.

COMMISSIONER ESPARZA: Same, same Kerry.

Thank you and congratulations and, uh, please don't be, definitely don't be a stranger. Let us know how we can help.

KERRY BALLAST: Thank you so much. Without tears, I hope, I want, this is the most amazing agency and our whole system. It's been an honor to work for you and with you and thank you very much.

MR. SERNA: Sorry, sir.

COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: That's OK. OK, Agenda Item 4, 2025 Report on the Transition from Military Service to Employment.

BOB GEAR: Good morning, Commissioner

Treviño, Commissioner Esparza, Mr. Serna. For the record, I'm

Bob Gear, the director of Texas Veterans Leadership Program,

Workforce Division. Texas Labor Code, Chapter 302.020, requires

the Texas Workforce Commission to submit an annual report on

transition from military service to employment to the governor,

lieutenant governor, and the Texas Legis, Legislature by the

first of September. This year's report includes the, uh, the

normal sections that we have in there, TWC's commitment to serve

veterans, our great workforce partners, unemployment rates, uh,

and the success highlights success several TWC veteran programs.

And of course, we go to the final section which lists those five

transition military MOSs, their industry-based certifications,

and then their related occupations. I'll quickly go down.

1 There's no change from last year, infantry/rifleman, uh, number 2 two is quartermaster/logistics, three is field mechanic. That's 3 all branches, several mechanic levels. Number four is 4 signal/computer systems/information, and number five is enlisted 5 medic/health care specialist/corpsman/aerospace medicine. I had 6 to make sure I got all the branches in there except for Marine 7 Corps because they use Navy corpsman. All right, at this time 8 staff is seeking commissioners' approval on this year's report. 9 I'm happy to answer any questions you may have. 10 COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: Commissioner Esparza, 11 any questions or comments? 12 COMMISSIONER ESPARZA: No, Bob, thanks for 13 uh, getting this report together and, uh, also for supporting, 14 uh, our initiatives to help the trans, military members 15 transition out of, uh, we're continued to remind that, uh, the, 16 what, the 15,000 veterans that enter the workforce every year in 17 Texas, uh, we're utilizing the dislocated worker grants and uh, 18 I appreciate your help in helping me find better ways to get 19 these grants out to uh, to the boards where they're, where 20 they're needed, so, continue to work. You're not going anywhere. 21 BOB GEAR: I'm not going, I got a couple of 22 vears left. 23 COMMISSIONER ESPARZA: We've got a little 24 bit more to do. Thank you, Bob.

BOB GEAR: Thank you, sir.

COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: Thank you, Bob. OK, I move that we approve the annual 2025 report on the Transition from Military Service to Employment as recommended by staff.

COMMISSIONER ESPARZA: I second.

COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: Uh, motion carries.

Thank you, Bob. Agenda Item 5, high school vouchers and distribution plan.

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MAHALIA BALDINI: Good morning, Commissioner Treviño, Commissioner Esparza, and Mr. Serna. For the record, Mahalia Baldini, Workforce Development Division. Texas Education Code 48.302 requires that the Texas Education Agency enter into a memorandum of understanding with the Texas Workforce Commission to transfer funds to subsidize the cost of a high school equivalency exam for individuals who are 21 years of age or older. In anticipation of the fiscal year 26 funds transfer from TEA, staff recommend in, implementing the subsidy program as outlined in TWC rule, Chapter 805, by approving an initial allotment of high school equivalency vouchers to AEL grant recipients as outlined in your notebook materials and approving a plan that allows staff to distribute the remainder of those vouchers in fiscal year 26 to AEL grant recipients as well as allow those grant recipients to develop policies to distribute vouchers to current or former AEL, uh, participants. I appreciate your time this morning and I'm happy to answer any questions you may have.

COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: Commissioner Esparza, any questions or comments?

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COMMISSIONER ESPARZA: No questions.

COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: Uh, Mahalia, I just wanted to say that, uh, this program has a great impact on the state. Staff did a tremendous job this year of finding innovative ways to keep the program running until the funding was allocated. Uh, I would like to thank you and the AEL staff and all the grantees who worked to issue over 10,000 vouchers in the first 11 months of the program year 2025, uh, so that Texans could take their GD, uh, GED exams free of cost so thank you and your staff for all your hard work. Uh, with that I move that we approve the initial allotment of high school equivalency vouchers and the voucher distribution plan as described in the discussion paper and recommended today by staff.

COMMISSIONER ESPARZA: I second.

COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: Uh, the motion carries. Uh, we'll move on to Agenda Item 6, proposed amendments to Chapter 809, Child Care Services.

REED O'BRIEN: Uh, good morning,

Commissioner Treviño, Commissioner Esparza, and Mr. Serna. For
the record, I'm Reed O'Brien with the Office of General Counsel.

Before you today for your consideration for approval, for cons,
excuse me, before you today for your consideration for approval
are proposed rules, uh, amending Chapter 809, Child Care

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   Services. The proposed amendments would clarify and establish in
   rule flexibility for the commission to suspend provisions of
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   Chapter 809 to improve the delivery of child care services and
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   implement the child care waiting list priority requirements
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   enacted by Senate Bill 462, 89th Texas Legislature Regular
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   Session. Staff recommends submitting the proposed rule for
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   publication to the Texas Register for a 30-day public comment
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   period. Staff also recommends the ability to make minor
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   nonsubstantive changes to the document to comply with
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   publication requirements of the Texas Register and the Office of
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   Secretary of State, and this concludes my comments and I'm
   available for any questions.

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   Esparza, any questions or comments?

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                         COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: Uh, then I move that
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   we approve the proposed amendments to 40 Texas Administrative
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   Code, Chapter 809, Child Care Services, for publication for
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   public comment as recommended today by staff.
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                         COMMISSIONER ESPARZA: I second.
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                         COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: Uh, motion carries.
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                         REED O'BRIEN: Thank you.
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                         COMMISSIONER TREVIÑO: That concludes the
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   agenda items. Uh, is there a legislative report today? Uh,
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seeing none back there, is there an executive director's report today?

MR. SERNA: Uh, yes sir, something very quickly. Uh, we received notice from Department of Labor of a grant funding opportunity for state workforce agencies. It's part of the industry-driven skills training initiative. Uh, we intend to apply for the grant. Uh, if we're successful we could be eligible for up to eight million dollars. Uh, the initiative is going to focus on high growth and emergent, emerging industries, uh, such as skill trades and occupation, occupations essential, uh, for advancing artificial intelligence and other technologies that we've been working on, uh, so I think it would be beneficial for us to pursue this. This is just giving you all a heads-up. We'll visit with each office to make sure that we have your, uh, specific comments, uh, recorded or included in what we're focusing on in our grant application but beyond that, this is just a heads-up to let you know that we're going to be pursuing that grant, uh, opportunity. And other than that, I have nothing else, sir.

COMMISSIONER ESPARZA: Does it, does that have a match involved in it or is it—?

MR. SERNA: I'm not aware that it has a match, no, sir.

COMMISSIONER ESPARZA: OK. Get that money.
