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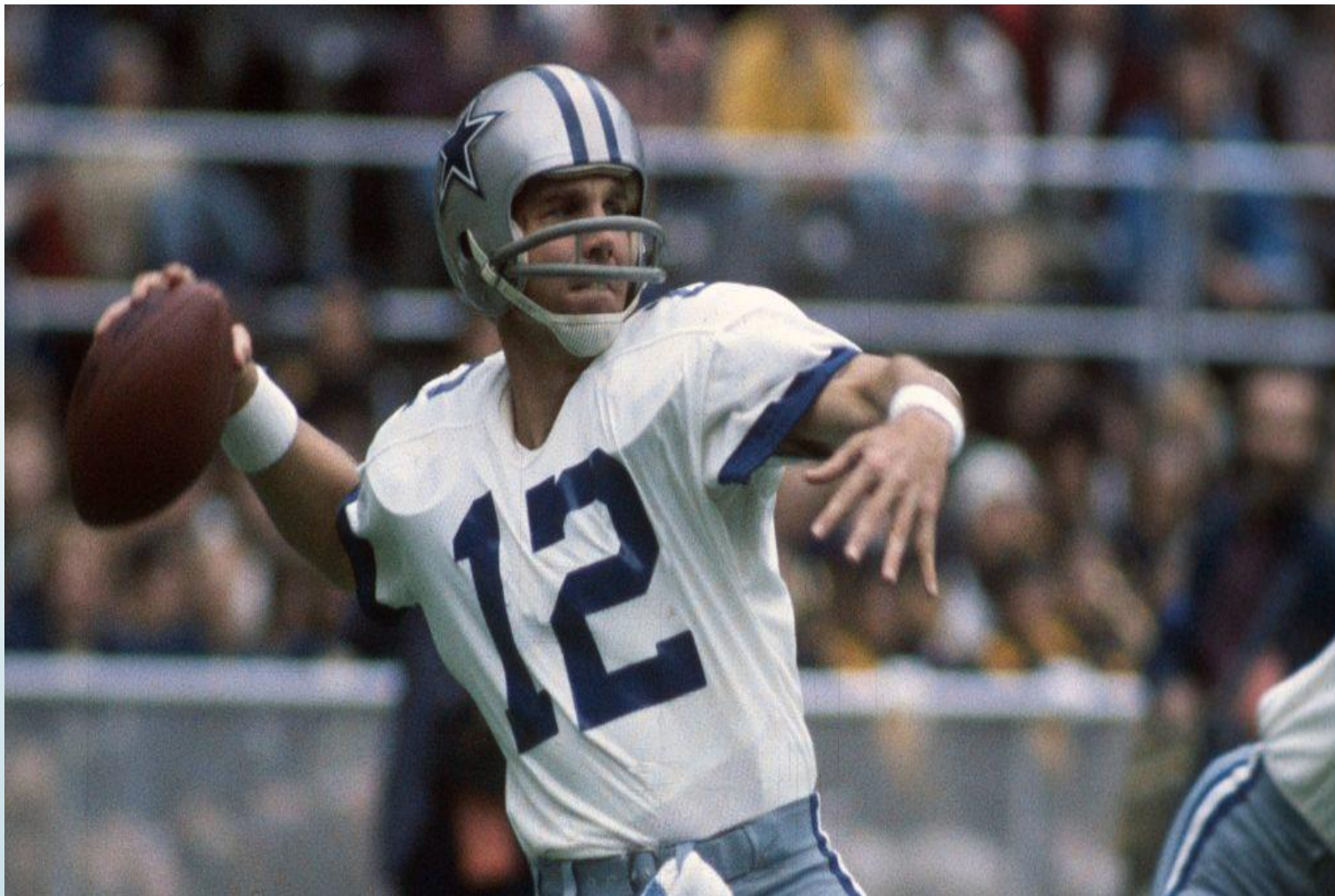

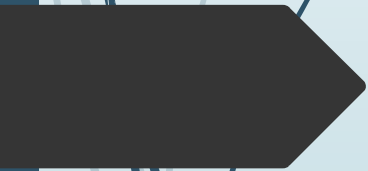

Goal of SNAP E&T


To assist SNAP recipients by improving their ability to:

- obtain regular employment;
- increase their earnings; and
- reduce their dependency on public assistance.

The TPP program promotes this goal.

TPP Program Overview

- Partners use non-federal funds to provide SNAP E&T services & get reimbursed for up to 50% of expenditures.
- Project will expand TPPs in Texas.
- First-year demonstration includes 4 Boards.
- Each year, more Boards will be rolled into the expansion, with the goal of all 28 Boards incorporating TPPs into their SNAP E&T operations by FFY30.

National Initiative

“...[C]hanges made by Congress in the 2018 Farm Bill were meant to strengthen E&T programs and improve SNAP participants’ ability to gain and retain employment. ... [A State agency that administers SNAP E&T] should be designing a SNAP E&T program that meets the needs of participants and is responsive to the communities in which it operates. Designing an E&T program is not a one-time effort. [States] need to continually review and assess evolving community factors—including current labor market needs, provider availability, and service quality—and your target population’s interests and needs.”

Texas' SNAP E&T Program

- HHSC/TWC analyzed the program & identified a need to expand opportunities for SNAP recipients.
- Each year, Texas serves around 1.4% of SNAP recipients in E&T.
- There's a lot of unrealized potential for program growth.
- One way to grow SNAP E&T is to tap into the Food and Nutrition Service's (FNS) 50-50 funding match-based program (TPP.)

What Oregon Did



- Oregon transitioned their SNAP E&T Program to a TPP model in federal fiscal year 2014.
- Went from \$250,000 the first year to \$36 million SNAP E&T investment this year
- 30 contracts & more than 100 service sites across the state
- Portland's Workforce Board alone has 12 TPPs & 30 service sites.
- Consortium of 17 Community Colleges

Limits of Funding

Preliminary SNAP E&T funding allocations for upcoming year:

- Texas 50/50 – \$9,194,500
 - Current match is all state revenue based.
- Oregon 50/50 - \$36,551,572
 - Approximately 90% of match is from non-state revenue sources.

SNAP E&T Funding 100% Funds

100% funds

- Appropriated annually
- Distributed to States based on a formula
- Additional allocations subject to approval/availability:
 - ABAWD pledge funds
 - Additional 100% funds

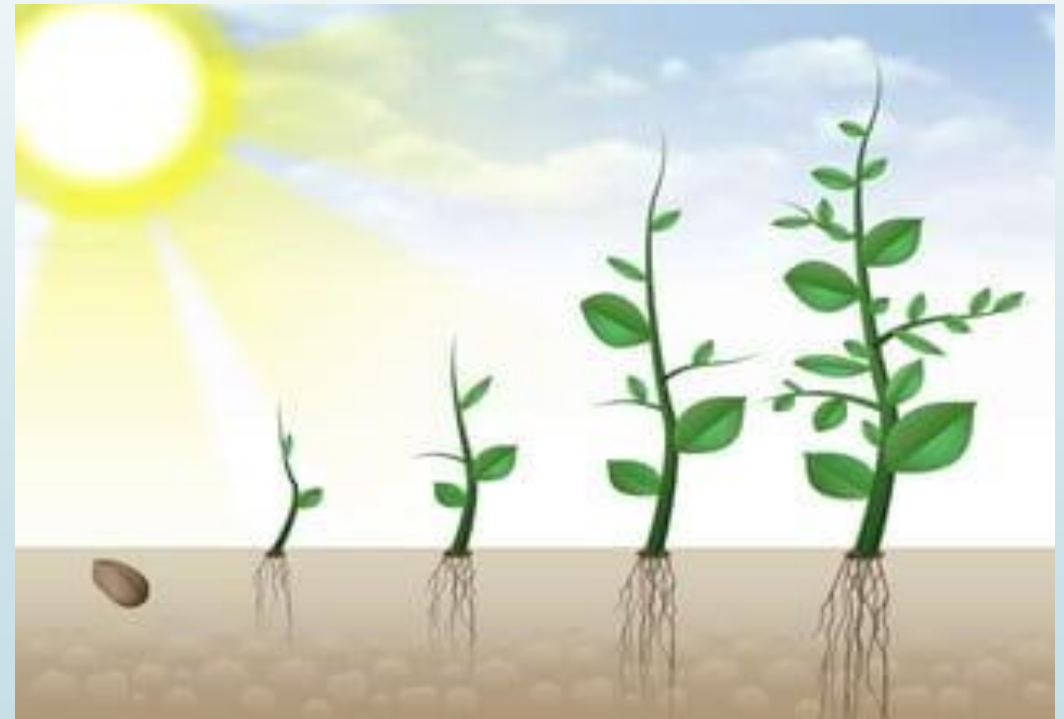
SNAP E&T Funding 50-50 Funds

50% or “50-50” funds

- Costs exceeding those covered by 100% funds
- Support services provided to program participants such as:
 - Transportation costs
- *This list of support services is not all inclusive. Provision of support services is based on local Board policy.*

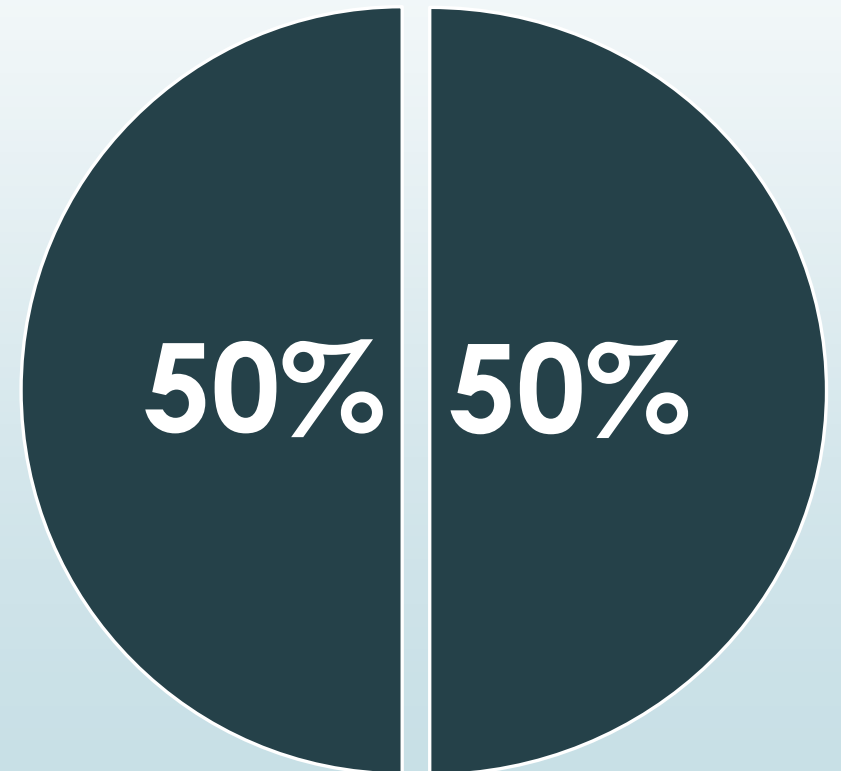
Why tap into 50-50 funds?

- 100% funds are limited.
- No additional allocations for Texas this year
- 50-50 funds are not limited.
- The use of 50-50 funds through TPP expansion is a good way to grow a State's SNAP E&T program.

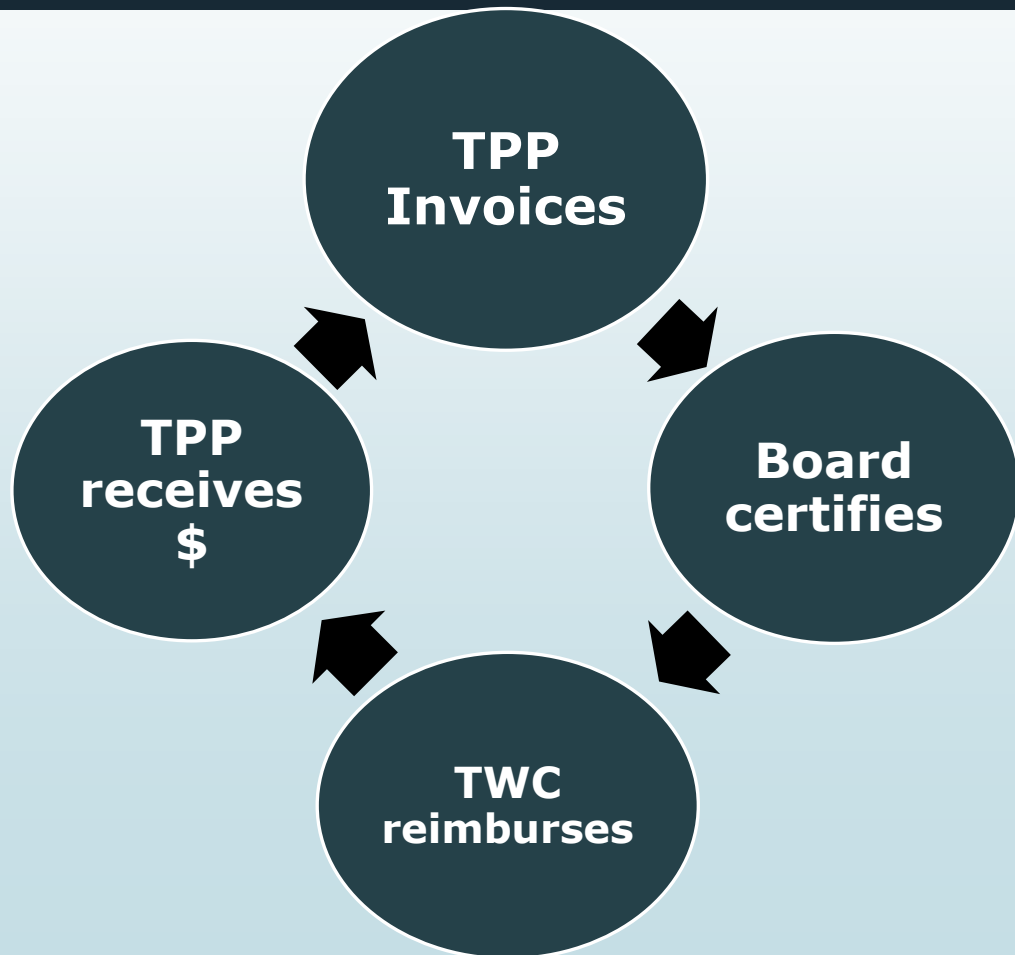


Third-Party Reimbursement (TPR)

- States leverage 50-50 funds through TPPs.
- Boards establish partnerships for provision of services.
- Partners use non-federal funds to provide services & are reimbursed for up to 50% of their expended funds.



Reimbursement Process



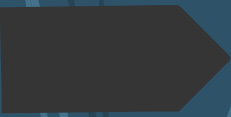
- TPP submits invoice to Board/contractor.
- Board submits a Certification of Expenditures Form to TWC.
- TWC reimburses Board.
- Board reimburses TPP.

Note: We've not yet determined what percentage of the 50% reimbursement Boards may use to cover local administrative and operational costs.

- Expand training and services
 - Tailored industry/employer trainings

- Enhances outreach to target populations and customer bases
- Reimbursements allow organizations (TPPs) to grow their own budgets and programs
- Helps SNAP recipients overcome barriers and achieve self-sufficiency
