

**Adult Education and Literacy
Contracted Measures, Targets and Performance-Based Criteria
for Program Year 2024–2025
Discussion Paper**

Background

On January 21, 2025, the Texas Workforce Commission’s (TWC) three-member Commission (Commission) approved the revised [Adult Education and Literacy \(AEL\) Program Year 2024–2025 allocations](#) aligned to grants awarded under Request for Applications (RFAs) 32024-00017 and 32024-00149.

AEL grants outline the annual performance measures, also known as contracted measures, AEL grant recipients are required to meet each program year. Historically, the Commission has approved the following AEL contracted measures:

- Participant enrollment targets in the following areas:
 - Intensive Services
 - Integrated Education and Training (IET)
 - Popular Services
 - English Literacy and Civics (ELC) IET
 - Total Participants Served
- Measurable Skill Gains (MSGs) as negotiated with the U.S. Department of Education’s Office of Career, Technical, and Adult Education (OCTAE)
- Workforce Innovation Opportunity Act (WIOA) exit-based outcomes as outlined in the General Appropriations Act (GAA) ([HB 1](#), 88th Legislative Session, Regular):
 - Employed/Enrolled Q2 Post-exit
 - Employed/Enrolled Q2–Q4 Post-exit
 - Credential Rate

In July 2024, TWC awarded grants outlining initial PY 2024–2025 enrollment targets based on grant application negotiations and information available at that time. The targets proposed in Table 1 take into consideration:

- Commission-approved allocations
- Commission-approved average cost per target for PY 2024–2025

Issue 1: AEL Contracted Measures

Staff have developed the following recommendations for PY 2024–2025 AEL grant recipient contracted measures for participant enrollment targets, MSGs, and exit-based outcomes.

AEL Enrollment Targets

Through the GAA, the AEL program is charged to serve at a minimum 53,874 participants in PY 2024–2025. This number assumes an average cost per participant of \$1,465.00 for PY 2024–2025 across three tiers of services. Each tier has different cost assumptions and is described below. The average cost per was used to formulate the cost assumptions to determine AEL

enrollment targets for PY 2024–2025. Any unmet targets for PY 2024–2025 will carry forward into PY 2025–2026 as negotiated with grantees and approved by the Commission. The following describes the types of services and the cost per participant assumptions:

Sec. 231—Adult Education Activities

- Popular AEL Services¹ – assumed cost of \$1,276.50 per participant
- Intensive AEL Services² – assumed cost of \$1,581.75 per participant
- IET Services³ – assumed cost of \$2,344.88 per participant

Sec. 243—Integrated English Literacy and Civics Education Program

- ELC Popular Services – assumed cost of \$1,392.55 per participant
- ELC IET Services – assumed cost of \$2,558.05 per participant (reflects the complexities of the model and additional language support required for participants)

Sec 231 Enrollment Targets PY 2024-2025

Table 1 outlines the recommended Sec. 231 AEL enrollment targets for PY 2024–2025, assigning any carryforward targets to the Total Enrollment category and using the Popular Services cost assumption. Enrollment targets are applied to funds budgeted for program expenses⁴.

¹ Popular Services consist of services that (1) improve the ability to read, write, and speak English and perform mathematics or other activities for the attainment of a secondary high school diploma or its recognized equivalent; (2) facilitate transitions to postsecondary education and training; and (3) assist participants in obtaining employment. For ELC grants, these services include working with internationally trained professional (ITPs) with credentials from countries other than the US.

² Intensive Services include workplace literacy activities, post release services for second chance individuals, and services to support ITPs.

³ Integrated Education and Training (IET) services include simultaneous contextualized AEL activities, workforce preparation activities, and workforce training.

⁴ Assumes an applied 7 percent administrative cost limit

Sec. 243 Enrollment Targets PY 2024-2025

Table 2 outlines the recommended AEL enrollment targets for PY 2024–2025 for Sec. 243 grants, assigning any carryforward targets to the Total Enrollment category and using the ELC Popular Services cost assumption. Enrollment targets are applied to funds budgeted for program costs⁶.

Measurable Skill Gains

In summer 2024, TWC negotiated both PY 2024–2025 and PY 2025–2026 MSG targets with OCTAE. The negotiated MSG target for PY 2024–2025 is 39.0 percent, to which TWC is held accountable for federal performance reporting.

Exit-Based Measures

The PY 2024–2025 exit-based measures consider reporting periods that exist outside of the current grant cycle. Because the current grant cycle includes new grantees who are not responsible for previous reporting periods, staff recommend targets not be assigned for PY 2024–2025. This one-year pause will not impact the program’s ability to report the aggregate state and federal performance to the Legislative Budget Board and OCTAE. Target recommendations for these contracted measures will be resumed for PY 2025–2026.

Issue 2: Performance Based Funding Criteria

[Texas Labor Code §315.007](#) requires TWC to set Performance Based Funding (PBF) criteria related to high school equivalency (HSE) enrollment and attainment after exiting the AEL program. The two measures are:

- **25% Enrollment in High School Equivalency (HSE) or Post-Secondary Education (PSE) Program**
 - Denominator: ALL PY AEL participants
 - Numerator: AEL Participants from the denominator who lack a diploma/HSE and who were enrolled in a HSE or PSE program
- **70% HSE/PSE Achievement**
 - Denominator: All PY participants who lack a diploma/HSE who were in an HSE or postsecondary credential during the program year and exited during the program year.
 - Numerator: Exiters from the denominator who achieved an HSE or PSE credential during the program year or by the end of the first quarter in the following program year.

Because the new AEL grant cycle started July 1, 2024, TWC will not be able to determine which grantees meet the exit-based criteria until the first quarter of PY 2025–2026.

Release of Funds

Historically, the payment to grantees who meet the criteria was done through a release of funds held back in their budgets. The new grant terms, however, removed the holdback option. Going forward, AEL staff will determine levels of PBF needed based on grantee performance and will request PBF funding from the statewide initiatives available balance. At this time, staff will also make recommendations regarding corrective actions, if needed.

Decision Point

Staff recommends approval of:

- PY 2024–2025 contracted measures as reflected in Tables 1, 2, 3 and 4; and
- criteria to be used to evaluate grantees in meeting performance described in Texas Labor Code §315.007.
