3 Background

- 4 The Bipartisan Budget Act of 2018 (Act) was enacted on February 9, 2018. The Act included a
- 5 historic funding increase in the Child Care and Development Fund (CCDF) through the Child
- 6 Care and Development Block Grant (CCDBG). The increased funding will support greater
- 7 investments in quality initiatives as well as direct care for eligible families. Because of the Act,
- 8 Texas received an additional \$229.9 million in CCDF funds for child care services.

- CCDF regulations require states to:
- spend at least 8 percent of total Fiscal Year 2018 (FY'18) and FY'19 CCDF expenditures on activities designed to improve the quality of child care services;
- spend 9 percent of total FY'20 and each succeeding FY's CCDF expenditures on activities designed to improve the quality of child care services; and
 - dedicate 3 percent of CCDF expenditures for activities to improve the quality of child care for infants and toddlers.

On June 14, 2018, the Texas Workforce Commission's (TWC) three-member Commission directed that \$8 million of the additional funds be made available for collaborative matching grants, with \$2 million of the overall funding specifically dedicated to improving quality for infant and toddler care.

- 23 Issue
- 24 Based on input from stakeholders and further research surrounding potential infant toddler
- 25 models, additional funding is needed to improve the quality and availability of infant and toddler
- care. The commission could direct \$3 million (\$1 million in additional funding from the funds
- approved on June 14, 2018) to develop a statewide Infant and Toddler Specialist Network
- 28 (ITSN).

- **Decision Points**
- 31 Staff seeks direction on repurposing \$1 million out of the \$8 million in CCDF funding
- 32 previously approved on June 14, 2018 for collaborative matching grants to further support the \$2
- million already approved for improving the quality and availability of infant and toddler care. In
- total, \$3 million in CCDF funds would be used for the development and implementation of a
- 35 statewide system of ITSNs. TWC anticipates making one award with a match requirement of 20
- 36 percent.

- 38 Staff further seeks direction on the use of the remaining \$5 million in previously approved
- 39 CCDF funding for collaborative matching grants to support at least one project for each of the
- strategies listed below. Each project would include a 20 percent match requirement:
- 41 1. Child Care Staff Retention Strategies
- 42 2. Addressing Challenging Behaviors and Reducing Suspensions and Expulsions
- 43 3. Family Child Care Networks
