Policy Concept Chapter 835, Self-Sufficiency Fund Rule Project #2021-06-835 – SB 770, Self-Sufficiency Fund Eligibility

5 Introduction and Background

Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) Chapter 835 Self-Sufficiency Fund rules provide the structure
and administrative procedures for the Self-Sufficiency Fund (SSF) program, administered by TWC. The
Commission adopted the rules in 2003 to establish and operate the SSF program.

The 87th Texas Legislature passed Senate Bill (SB) 770 to expand eligibility for SSF participants by removing the requirement that the participants have dependent children or be on public assistance prior to starting the program. SB 770 amended Texas Labor Code, §309.002(a) to specify eligibility as "individuals who are identified by the commission as being low-income or at risk of becoming dependent on public assistance benefits."

16 The four-year rule review required by Texas Government Code, §2001.039 is due in 2022. Staff will 17 review the rules to ensure the rules align with current program processes and procedures.

19 **Purpose for the Proposed Rule**

The purpose for this proposed rule is to implement SB 770 which amended Texas Labor Code, §309.002(a) to redefine individuals who are eligible for the job training programs provided under the SSF. SB 770 changed the requirements for participants of the grant program; therefore, an

23 administrative rule change is necessary to reflect the change.

25 <u>Rule Revisions Required by Federal Regulation or State Statute</u> 26

27 Issue #1: Implementing SB 770

The eligibility requirements for the SSF program will need to be updated to include individuals who are identified by the Commission as being low-income or at risk of becoming dependent on public assistance benefits. Amendments to §§835.1, 835.2, and 835.11 will update the eligibility requirements for the SSF program.

33 Issue #2: Defining "Low-Income"

34 SB 770 amended Texas Labor Code, §309.004, to provide the Commission with the authority to adopt

35 rules to identify individuals who are low-income or at risk of becoming dependent on public assistance

36 benefits and which of those individuals are eligible to participate in the SSF program Staff identified the 37 need to define "low-income" and include the federal Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF)

- eligibility requirements to define low-income to verify a participant's status. The federal TANF
- requirements define "low-income" as an individual whose family receives any one of the following:
- 40 TANF benefits; Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits; Children's Health
- Insurance Program (CHIP) benefits; subsidized child care through the Child Care and Development
- 42 Fund (CCDF); eligible for or receives subsidized public housing assistance; participates in the US
- 43 Department of Agriculture Food and Nutrition Service's Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for
- 44 Women, Infants and Children (WIC) program; free or reduced-cost school lunch based on income;
- 45 eligible for, or enrolled in, Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act youth services; or family income
- 46 is 200 percent of or below the US Department of Health and Human Services' Poverty Guidelines or the
- 47 US Department of Labor's Lower Living Standard Income Level.

3 **Issue #3: Rule Review of Chapter 835**

4 Texas Government Code, §2001.039 requires that every four years each state agency review and

consider for readoption, revision, or repeal each rule adopted by that agency. Staff will review the rules
in their entirety to ensure the rules align with the SSF program.
