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2	CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Well, good morning, all,
3	this meeting is called to order. Mr. Trobman, has anyone signed
4	up for public comment?
5	MR. TROBMAN: Good morning, Commissioners.
6	We have no registrants for public comment this morning.
7	CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Thank you very much. Good
8	morning, Ms. Miller.
9	MS. MILLER: Good morning, sir.
10	CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Thank you. This brings us
11	to the end of Agenda Items 2 through 7. Let's pause for a few
12	minutes to reset for the rest of the meeting.

14	CHAIRMAN DANIEL: You guys ready?
15	COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Yes, sir.
16	CHAIRMAN DANIEL: The staff doesn't have any
17	to report under Agenda Item 8. Agenda Item 9 is discussion,
18	consideration, and possible action regarding vocational
19	rehabilitation substance use disorders services.
20	MR. VADEN: Good morning, commissioners. For
21	the record, Jason Vaden, Vocational Rehabilitation Division.
22	Currently vocational rehabilitation substance use [inaudible]
23	services are provided for individuals who are eligible for the
24	[inaudible] and who have been clinically diagnosed with a

substance use and meet the requisite criteria to receive such

services. In addition, customers must maintain and document a minimum of 30 days of sobriety before eligibility determination, and be actively participating in treatment or receiving other supports to maintain sobriety. Customers must also continue to meet the required eligibility criteria to continue receiving these services funded by VR. While the 30-day sobriety provision and the continuance of sobriety have been longstanding policies, it's prevented VR from taking advantage of opportunities to fully engage with and assist both potential and existing customers. In accordance with the flexibility provided in federal regulations and after a scan of other state policies, and in review of evidence-based approaches, staff seeks direction on removing the policy requirement for a customer to maintain and document 30 days of sobriety before eligibility determination, and to remove the requirement that services be placed on hold in the event of a relapse. Instead, customers will be expected to recognize their disability and understand the need for services, to participate in treatment in the VR program, and make progress in completing their treatment and achieving goals as established in their employment plan, as set forth in your materials. This approach will align with our partner agencies that serve individuals with substance use disorders, often co-occurring with mental illness and [inaudible] better coordinate services to joint customers.

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1 Commissioners, this concludes my remarks, and I'm happy to 2 answer questions if you have any. 3 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Any questions or comments? 4 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: None here, Chairman. 5 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: None here. CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Do we have a motion? 6 7 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Chairman, I move that 8 we remove the policy requirements for a vocational rehabilitation customer to document 30 days of sobriety to 10 receive VR services, and remove the requirement that services be 11 placed on hold in the event of a relapse. Instead, customers 12 will be expected to recognize their disability and understand 13 the need for services, participate in treatment in the VR 14 program, and make progress in completing their treatment and 15 achieving goals established in their employment plan as 16 presented by staff. 17 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Second that motion. 18 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: So moved and seconded, I 19 think the vote's unanimous. This brings us to Agenda Item 10, 20 discussion, consideration, and possible action regarding new 21 certification and recertification of community rehabilitation 22 programs to participate in the purchasing from people with 23 disabilities state-use program. 24 MR. GARCIA: Good morning, commissioners, 25 Mr. Serna. Juan Garcia with the Voc Rehab program. Texas human

resources code section 122.01(3) requires the Texas Workforce Commission to establish rules for the certification of community rehab programs to participate in the purchasing from people with disabilities program. Concurrently, chapter 806.41 of the Texas administrative code sets requirements for participation in the program and subsequent adherence to those requirements when a CRP has been certified. CRPs must reapply every three years, prior to the expiration on the certificate. PPD staff reviews each completed application and required documentation, and if acceptable makes recommendations to the commission for approval. The PPD program has reviewed applications for the following two CRPs wishing to receive initial certification and eight CRPs wishing to continue participation in the PPD program through recertification. With respect to the new certifications, we have two CRPs--Training, Rehab, and Development Institute from San Antonio, and L&V Enterprise Resources from Houston. With respect to the recertifications, we have eight CRPs: Spindletop from Beaumont, Goodwill Industries of Houston, Redirection Opportunities from Ft. Worth, RG&G Construction Services from Weslaco, Rucon Inc. from Huntsville, San Antonio State Supported Living Center from San Antonio, Second Chances from Humboldt, and Texana Center from Rosenberg. Staff seeks direction regarding approval for the two new CRP certifications and eight recertifications for community rehab programs to participate in

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   the purchase from people with disabilities program. With that,

   we approve the certification and the recertification of the
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   community rehabilitation programs as discussed by staff.

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                         CHAIRMAN DANIEL: It's been moved and
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   seconded, the vote's unanimous. This is Agenda Item 11,
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   discussion, consideration, and possible action regarding
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   temporary suspension of 40 TAC chapter 807, career schools and
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   colleges rule 807.387(a), hearing procedures, due to the COVID-
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   19 pandemic.
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                         MS. BALLAST: Good morning, Chairman Daniel,
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   how's my audio? Perfect, thank you. Good morning, Commissioner
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   Alvarez, Commissioner Demerson, Mr. Serna. For the record, Kerry
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Ballast, Workforce Development Division. Texas education code 132.152 establishes the right of a career school or college to have a hearing to contest administrative penalties assessed by TWC. TAC chapter 807, career schools and colleges rules, specifically rule 807.387(a), states that all hearings shall be conducted in person in Austin, Texas unless the parties agree to a telephonic hearing or request a different location. As a result of the measures put in place to ensure public safety during the COVID-19 pandemic, TWC's commission appeals hearings unit has been unable to accommodate in-person hearing, and this is leaving administrative actions unresolved, and in some cases preventing or delaying students from receiving refunds of tuitions and fees. 40 TAC 800.8 authorizes the commission to suspend the operation of an agency rule if the commission finds a public emergency or imperative public necessity exists, and if the suspension will best serve the public health, safety, or welfare. So with all of that in mind, staff seeks direction on the temporary suspension of 40 TAC 807.387(a), thereby allowing the--suspending the requirement of in-person hearings in Austin. The suspension will allow the commission appeals hearing unit to schedule telephonic hearings and adjudicate appeals in a timely manner. I am available for any questions that you may have, and thank you.

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CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Comments or questions?

COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: None here, Chairman.

1 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: No questions here. Kerry, just one statement. In regards to this action that we're 2 3 taking right now, is this something that we need to make 4 permanent, or at least look at so that if we're ever in a 5 position like this, kind of [inaudible] this so that we don't 6 find ourselves in this position again. 7 MS. BALLAST: Good question, sir. Following 8 later in this year, our career schools and colleges rules will 9 be open for their four-year yearly review. This is a rule now in 10 light of what we've learned about a pandemic and other kinds of 11 unforeseen occurrences like this, we will definitely revisit 12 this rule and go ahead and build in some other ways for us to 13 accommodate hearings. 14 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Sounds good, thank 15 you. 16 MS. BALLAST: Thank you. 17 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Any other questions or 18 comments? 19 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: None here, Chairman. 20 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Do we have a motion? 21 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: I move that we 22 suspend 40 TAC section 807.387(a) until the public emergency has 23 passed and commission appeals hearing unit resumes in-person 24 hearings, as recommended by staff.

COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Second.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: So moved and seconded, vote's unanimous.

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MS. BALLAST: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Let's go to Agenda Item

12, discussion, consideration, and possible action regarding the

statewide initiatives funded with Workforce Innovation and

Opportunity Act, Temporary Assistance for Needy Families, Adult

Education and Literacy, child care, and other state level funds.

MS. NELSON-WERNLI: Good morning, Chair, commissioners, Mr. Serna. Angie Nelson-Wernli, for the record. Today we are requesting additional funding for the Veterans Workforce Outreach Initiative. TWC most recently procured this initiative in 2018 for \$425,000 to enroll hard-to-serve veterans in finding and retaining employment. The intensive case management services address major barriers such as homelessness, substance abuse, physical, mental, or learning disabilities, post-traumatic stress disorder, ex-offender status, recent discharge from military services. This initiative is currently operating in San Antonio, Houston, Dallas/Ft. Worth, and El Paso. We are entering into our third-year [inaudible] periods, and there's been an increase in the cost per participant and support services. In 2018, the grantee implemented the program with seven case managers and planned to serve a [inaudible] 426 participants. Due to turnover and cost increases to hire and retain qualified staff, increases costs for services, including

support services such as commercial drivers license, work equipment, certifications, et cetera, we are requesting additional funding to cover the increases in the cost [sounds like] per. Requesting an additional slight increase in funding and a slight decrease in the original target, we are requesting—we are going to re-procure this initiative in 2022 to address this issue longer-term. We are requesting today to increase the WIOA funding by 60,000, for a total of \$485,000, and slightly reduce the target from the original 426 to 386 to meet the current cost [sounds like] pers. I can answer any questions you have.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Any comments or questions?

COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: I do have a comment,

Chairman. Commissioners, at this time we are more than halfway

through the fiscal year. This program still has about \$100,000

left in its budget this year, and has only enrolled 259

participants to date. I would like for this initiative to play

out for the remainder of the year, and reconsider increasing the

funding for next fiscal year's budget.

MS. NELSON-WERNLI: Sir, this initiative—just wanna note that this initiative is not actually on a fiscal year. The actual grant period, because it's a competitive process, the new grant year is actually supposed to start March 1.

1 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Okay. Can we still wait? 2 3 MS. NELSON-WERNLI: We could enter into the 4 exact same amount. The grant actually ends this Friday. So, we 5 were looking to increase by the 60,000 kind of meeting, you 6 know, halfway there. And like I said, wanting them to serve--7 they served 335 last year, and they are on target for about that 8 amount. So, this would increase the enrollment by 51, if we 9 would increase the 60,000 for this coming year. Or the other 10 option, we could re-amend the cost per, and allow them to fully 11 expend the 425,000. But they would only serve 335 participants. 12 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: They served--Commissioner 13 Demerson, I'm cutting in front of you, I believe. 14 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: And mine'll be real 15 quick. So Angie, the existing contract that they--this ends in 16 March? 17 MS. NELSON-WERNLI: It ends actually Friday, 18 so we're entering in the current renewal. It's a competitive 19 procurement, so we've got five years that we can actually renew, 20 and we've got it on the procurement schedule to re-procure next 21 year, so that we can address and see what types of applications 22 and costs per and services we can get competitively out in the 23 market. 24 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: So we would be 25 increasing 60,000 right now? I mean--

1 MS. NELSON-WERNLI: It would just be for 2 this year, and then we could go back to--and procure the 425 3 next year. 4 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Yeah, I'm trying to 5 wrap my head around 60,000 right now, and it ends Friday. 6 [Inaudible] 7 MR. SERNA: The 60,000 is for the period 8 beginning March 1. 9 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Okay. Okay. 10 MS. NELSON-WERNLI: Yes. 11 MR. SERNA: Yes, sir. 12 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: What we have here is a 13 very incomplete proposal by staff. I've got, like, 15 or 16 14 questions about it, for -- to make a decision that something that 15 happens in six days. And that's just--you can't make a decision 16 from an incomplete sort of proposal here six days before a 17 decision has to be made. I think it's a good program. I think 18 that we do no one justice by making a rash decision on 19 incomplete information six days before the decision needs to be 20 made. We'll vote on it. I'm in agreement with Commissioner 21 Alvarez, we do not need to take action today. We need to do a 22 better job of outlining this proposal, understanding what this 23 means for this. How does this fit into our other veterans 24 proposals, how does it fit in with the veterans network. There

are so many unanswered questions here that I'm not even sure we

can get all get [inaudible]. I'm gonna ask the questions, but

I'm not sure we can get them all answered today. I just--it's-you put us as commissioners in a very precarious position in

making too-quick decisions on incomplete information, when we
talked about all these programs in July, when we were making
budget decisions for the agency, and none of this came up then.

So, I think we need to have a more in-depth conversation. I
think we need more information, lots more information, and I'm
not comfortable moving forward today, either.

COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Chairman, I totally agree with you.

MR. SERNA: Angie--yes, sir, Mr. Chairman, we will bring this item back to the commission with a more thorough analysis. Angie, were the offices briefed prior to today?

MS. NELSON-WERNLI: Yes, they were. They were briefed--trying to get all my days straight. It was actually supposed to be on the last commission meeting. Because of the ice storms and everything that was going on, so we postponed it, but it was briefed for two weeks prior.

MR. SERNA: Okay. We'll do a better job, Mr. Chairman, at briefing the offices as well as formulating the rational for the proposal. It's my understanding, however, that the grantee has indicated because of the increase in costs, they were looking for much more of an increase. We don't believe that

an increase in just money would suffice. But we'll flesh that out more and come back to the commission with a more detailed proposal.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: So, here's my two--thank you for that. Here's my two cents' worth. If--and I don't necessarily believe that this needs to happen. I don't--I wasn't here when this was originally laid out, so I don't know now it was laid out. But here's what I'm gonna say, nonetheless. If we need to somehow adjust some commission action on the number of target [inaudible] enroll participants or the amount of money-those seem like contractual things to me, which makes them operational, which puts them in your purview, Mr. Serna. But if we need to take some action to allow us to modify this contract to perhaps be able to expend more money per veteran that we're assisting, I would likely be happy to do that today. I personally don't think we need to do that. I think that's a decision that we can make on the contracting basis. But I am looking for a little advice here. If that needs to happen so that we can do something for this contract that takes effect March 1 or whenever it is, let's do it. Otherwise, let's bring this back when we can do a much better job of considering it.

MR. SERNA: The grant is currently funded at the agreed-to levels with the agreed-to targets, so we have time to make any kind of adjustments--

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Okay.

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MR. SERNA: --since the year that we're talking about, the grant year is just beginning on Monday. So, we have time--we have plenty of time, as Commissioner Alvarez pointed out, for us to be able to come back and discuss any changes to either the targets or the additional funding to the grant.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Okay.

COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Ms. Nelson, I wanna thank you for the presentation. As you know, all offices are supportive of our veterans. We just wanna make sure that we utilize the funding to its fullest potential. I will tell you that I appreciate the fact that you did meet with the offices regarding this particular agenda item, but I do think that I know that staff here had specifically asked about the need for [sounds like] to increase funds, and if we were going to meet those targets. And so I think that's what brought this agenda item to my attention. We've been doing it for a couple of years now, and I just wanna make sure that all the money that we do allocate is fully used, and before we increase it. And especially if we're asking boards to reevaluate whether money is being used in best suited. So, I appreciate your presentation and your meeting with staff. But yeah, at this time, I just can't take any action.

MS. NELSON-WERNLI: [Inaudible]

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   item, and that's childcare.
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CHAIRMAN DANIEL: I mean, I can read this whole thing, but I've been reading all of them, and it's about childcare, so I'm [inaudible].

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MS. MILLER: All right, good morning, Chairman, commissioners. For the record, Reagan Miller with the Childcare and Early Learning Division. This morning for your consideration is a report to the Administration for Children and Families on Texas' planned use of the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act Fund, or CRRSAA for short. Texas will receive over \$1.1 billion through these onetime CRRSAA funds. ACF issued reporting instructions to states on February 11 on the required plan content which by statute is due no later than February 25. ACF notes that states may not have yet determined and finalized how they plan to spend the CRRSAA funds, and states can make changes to this initial plan. The planned use of funds report is structured based upon the categories that ACF requested states use, and includes information on how TWC may invest these funds to support direct childcare subsidies, grants other than subsidies to stabilize childcare providers, assistance to providers not participating in the subsidy system prior to the pandemic, and other strategies the state is considering. We will continue working with your office on specific implementation details over the coming months, as we refine our planned use of these CRRSAA funds. And I'm happy to answer any questions that you have.

1 | CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Questions or comments?

2 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Chairman, I just

wanna inform Reagan that when I read this discussion paper, it's an excellent discussion paper, Reagan. I love what the funds are gonna be used for. I think our providers are gonna be excited about that, and what we're gonna be able to do. Things that we've never been able to do in the past. So, thank you for that. Thank you for being creative on this.

MS. MILLER: Yes, sir.

COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Along those lines [inaudible] thanks for the briefing you and Alison have given our team last week with [inaudible]. We appreciate that. Even during the snowstorm [inaudible].

MS. MILLER: Yes, sir.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: You know, we've been challenged with a lot, and I would be remiss if I did not take this opportunity to thoroughly [inaudible] Reagan and [inaudible] how thankful I am for their ability to pivot quickly. Washington passed this, the Department of Labor and others involved got this to us 14 days before the statutory due date, and so a lot of the work that's been done here, it's been very quick, it's very thorough. You know, we're blessed here at TWC with a number of great directors in all of our divisions, frankly. I appreciate everybody's flexibility, but Reagan's on the hot seat right now, so we'll just deal with this one. Great

1 work for something that had a 14-day turnaround. We briefed a number of legislative offices about this who've had an interest 3 in it, and so this didn't happen in a vacuum. There's been a lot 4 of work going back and forth on this, and I sincerely appreciate 5 our ability to meet those statutory deadlines and have a work 6 product here that Commissioner Alvarez pointed out as being very solid, very thoughtful, very well thought out, and very--we're 8 very much gonna be able to execute this as we develop that. 9 MS. MILLER: Thank you, Chairman. 10 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Is there a motion on this? 11 Do we need a motion on this? 12 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Chairman, I move that 13 we approve the CRRSA plan as presented by staff. 14 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Second that motion. 15 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: All right, it's been moved 16 and seconded. Vote's unanimous. MR. SERNA: Thank you [inaudible]. 18 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Agenda Item 14 is more 19 than just childcare. It's almost everything dealing with the 20 pandemic. We do have one more item on Agenda Item 14. Yesterday, 21 which was February 22, the governor sent me a letter indicating 22 that he has suspended Texas labor code section 204.048 to the

extent necessary to delay the commission's computation of the

2021 unemployment insurance tax rate. The suspension will remain

in effect until June 20, 2021. Effectively what this does is it

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gives us time to delay setting the annual employer tax rate, which was being driven by 204.048m which is the voluntary contribution provisions that are both in statute and our rule. With the suspension of that requirement, it allows us to spend some more time working on a couple things. These should be of note to both employers and employees. But the setting of the tax rate, there are some statutory changes that are being considered to the general tax rate. This gives the legislature ample time to consider those statutory changes and how those might apply to the COVID-19 disaster. It also gives us time as an agency to really consider all the ramifications of the tax rate, both the statutory self-implementing parts of the tax rate, and the ones on which we have quite a bit of latitude as a commission. The governor took this action, and I think wisely so. It just gives us the added time and the ability to very thoughtfully consider all of the impacts that the tax rate will have. And it keeps us from having to set the tax rate imminently, which would have been in the next couple days, because of one provision that a small percentage of employers actually avail themselves of. So, I think it gives us a better opportunity to make a more fair and a more forward-looking tax rate for all employers. In order to fully implement this action and address this what I believe is a public necessity, we do need to, as a commission, suspend a rule that accompanies that particular section of the labor code. And then we would be able to align our rules with what the

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governor's done here on the statutory suspension. Let me present a motion, and then we can have as much discussion as we need, because it would all be in order. Based on what I just said, I move we suspend 40 TAC section 815.119 until June 20, 2021, pursuant to section 418.016(a) of the Texas government code, and 40 Texas Administrative Code section 800.8 to temporarily suspend the voluntary tax contribution program and enable the agency to delay the tax calculation, so that Texas employers and the state's economy will be better positioned to recover from the ongoing pandemic. Further, the commission directs the Office of General Counsel under this notion to draft an order memorializing the action taken today. That's my motion. COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: And I'm gonna second that motion [inaudible]. COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Chairman and Commissioner, I would agree to that as well. CHAIRMAN DANIEL: If I'm hearing correctly, I believe the vote's unanimous. COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Yes, sir. CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Gentleman, I don't wanna

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Gentleman, I don't wanna cut off any discussion or comments or questions you may have.

I'm certainly happy to answer those that I can. If the vote's unanimous, then we'll say that the vote's unanimous, and ask the general counsel to conform this to how it needs to be conformed.

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1 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: I appreciate your work on this, Chairman, and also Commissioner Demerson on this 2 3 as well. CHAIRMAN DANIEL: And I really appreciate 5 you guys staying up to date on a lot of moving parts, and I'm 6 doing the same. You know, we only meet once a week in open 7 meeting. We don't really get a chance to discuss these things, 8 and rightly so, because that's the way it's set up. But I 9 appreciate the fact that everybody does their homework, and we 10 stay up on these issues. And it seems like we're all having the 11 conversations that we need to be having to solve a lot of 12 problems simultaneously. There are more problems to be solved. I 13 don't pretend that that isn't so. And we'll keep working on it, 14 and you know, things are coming--they come fast and they change 15 often, and I just appreciate everybody's willingness to continue 16 to tackle these in the spirit that we've been tackling them. 17 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: It's the tie, 18 Chairman. 19 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Chairman, I 20 [inaudible]. I like--21 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: It's the tie. 22 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Commissioner Alvarez 23 keeps talking about the tie, but I'd like to thank you for your 24 work in this effort. Early on, Texas employers were calling with 25 a lot of questions and the like, and I know there was a lot of

background work taking place, and this is a good outcome. And so I continue to appreciate the leadership of the governor concerned and his interest in our Texas employers as we proceed forward. So [inaudible] we're getting to where we need to go.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Thank you very much.

Right, if there's nothing else, let's move on to Agenda Item 15.

This is discussion, consideration, and possible action regarding approval of local workforce development board nominees.

MS. WILLIAMS: Hi, good morning, Chairman, commissioners, and Mr. Serna. For the record, Shunta Williams with the Workforce Development Division. And before you for consideration are Workforce Board nominations for Alamo, Cameron County, Deep East Texas, Heart of Texas, and Lower Rio Grande. Staff recommends that all nominees be approved, and I'm here to answer any questions you may have.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Any questions or comments?

COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Chairman, the only thing I wanna say is I really appreciate the hard work that Ms. Williams puts in screening these board members, so I appreciate that, Ms. Williams. Thank you, and for the detailed information that you provide to the office. So, I just wanna say that.

COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Sir, and I may have a question about Workforce Divisions Deep East Texas. I noticed Mr. Eddie Hopkins is on there, and--no, I'm teasing with Eddie, and just the work that all of them are doing. But I agree with

Commissioner Alvarez's words, and we're bringing good members to our workforce solution boards.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: It's rare that

Commissioner Demerson would call out someone by name. That felt

like [inaudible] to me of some sort, so.

COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: He knows him. He knows—he probably owes him or something. But I will tell you that, as you know, Chairman—and I think we've all had this discussion during the state conference when we met with our board chairs and our executive directors, I think we all stress the importance of having the best of the best serve on our board. And so that's why I think about every time this agenda item comes up. You know, it's something that we certainly put a lot of value on, because we do want the best of the best to represent us around the state. So, Ms. Williams, thank you for the hard work that you put into the recommendations. And I know that sometimes we do have questions, and I know that sometimes we do have questions regarding some of the board members. But generally, I appreciate the screening that you do and the briefings that you give to the offices.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Any additional questions or comments? Is there a motion on this item?

COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Chairman, I move that we approve the board nominees for Alamo, Cameron County, Deep East Texas, the Heart of Texas, and Lower Rio Grande Valley.

1 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Second that motion. 2 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: So moved and seconded, 3 vote's unanimous. Thank you. 4 MS. WILLIAMS: Thank you. 5 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Nothing on Agenda Item 16. 6 Gentlemen, we have a real treat today. Michael Britt has made 7 himself available to us to give us a legislative briefing. So, 8 all those questions that I know you've been wanting to ask, this 9 will be our opportunity to ask these of Michael. Michael, the 10 floor is yours. 11 MR. BRITT: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. 12 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Don't say "thank you" so 13 tentatively. Don't say "thank you" so tentatively, just charge 14 right in. 15 MR. BRITT: Good morning, Chairman Daniel, 16 Commissioner Alvarez, Commissioner Demerson, and Mr. Serna. For 17 the record, Michael Britt [inaudible] relations. Yesterday, the 18 U.S. House Budget Committee approved Senate concurrent 19 resolution 5, which is the American Rescue Plan. This measure 20 includes the appropriation titles that will make up the next 21 round of COVID-19 relief. The bill is expected to be considered 22 by the full U.S. House this coming Friday. Last week, Texas 23 House Appropriations Chairman Representative Greg Bonnen 24 announced [inaudible] subcommittees for the 87 Texas 25 Legislature. The House Appropriations Subcommittee on articles

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   6, 7, and 8, which has oversight over the Texas Workforce
   Commission, consists of the following members: Representative
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   Armando Walle as the chair, Representative Cecil Bell Jr. as the
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   vice chair, and Representatives Ed Thompson, Representative,
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   Steve Toth, and Representative Alex Dominguez. Finally,
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   yesterday, Senator Zaffirini filed two bills that are TWC

   legislative proposals. The senator filed senate bill 694, which
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   is TWC's legislative proposal related to the consolidation of
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   the TRF assessor evaluator functions, and senate bill 695, which
   is TWC's legislative proposal related to notice of assessment
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   and methods of service. And that concludes my remarks, and I am
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   now happy to answer all the questions that you gentlemen have.
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                         CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Right, all the questions
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   and comments.
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                         COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: None here, Chairman.
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                         COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: I guess I don't have
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   any for Michael right now. We're good to go.
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                         CHAIRMAN DANIEL: I feel like I might have
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   oversold it, then, if we don't have any [inaudible] comments.
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   Michael, thank you so much.
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                         MR. BRITT: Thank you, gentlemen.
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                         CHAIRMAN DANIEL: All right, Mr. Serna, do
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   we have an executive director's report today?
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1 MR. SERNA: Just one unfortunate bad piece 2 of news. We've lost an employee, one of our customer service 3 representatives in a call center, to COVID-19. 4 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Mm. 5 MR. SERNA: And we have another employee who 6 is not doing very well right now, so we will keep that family in 7 our thoughts and prayers. But I thought you all would wanna know that it is now four employees that we've lost to this virus. 8 9 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Unpleasant news. Thank you 10 for letting us know. I do wanna know, and we do wanna hold up their families. 11 12 MR. SERNA: Yes, sir. That's all I have, 13 sir, unfortunately. 14 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: All right. 15 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Chairman, under this 16 agenda item I do have something that I'd like to state, if 17 that's okay. 18 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Yes, sir. 19 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Back in March, we--20 the waiting week was waived for the pandemic claims, as we all 21 know. Statutorily, we know that the governor has the ability to 22 do this, and I just wanted to make sure that we were aware that 23 back on February 20, 2021, 77 Texas counties were declared major 24 disaster areas, making federal funding available. Those affected

individuals, including disaster unemployment benefits. Shouldn't

we waive the waiting week for the new disaster, which is what we 2 just experienced last week, unemployment insurance claims? 3 Should we consider waiving the work searches for those 4 individuals affected by this? Seventy-seven counties, and I'm 5 understanding that we may even increase the 77 to a few more. So 6 really, just wanted to make a distinction, what was laid out 7 back in March of 2020 with the pandemic, and the waiting week 8 for those individuals that were affected by the storms that we 9 experienced last week. Just wanted some distinction between the 10 two. 11 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Work search has been 12 waived, and it's under consideration for how long that period 13 would be. 14 MR. SERNA: Work search is waived for last 15 week and this week. 16 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: That's correct. 17 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: [Inaudible] continue to 18 look at that to determine--19 MR. SERNA: Yes, sir. 20 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: --what's the right amount 21 of time for that. 22 MR. SERNA: Yes, sir, we will. We will for 23 those 77 counties that were in the president's disaster 24 declaration. And we will also --

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                         MR. SERNA: We'll look at waiting week as
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   well, and see what authority we have. I believe that the
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   governor's order is still in place. [Inaudible] check the

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   order's in place for the pandemic, Ed, or does it have to be a

   different one for the disaster?
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                         MR. SERNA: And that's what I'll find out,
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   sir, for you.
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                          COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Okay. Because I was
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   looking at it [inaudible] --
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                         MR. SERNA: It's for the pandemic. Because
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   the original one was for the pandemic.
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                          COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: That's correct, and
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   section 207.021, we know the executive order allows them. But
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   again, that was the only reason I brought this up at this time,
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   was just to make sure that there was a distinction between the
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   two.
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                         MR. SERNA: Got you.
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                          CHAIRMAN DANIEL: All right, anything
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   additional?
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                          COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: No.
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                          CHAIRMAN DANIEL: The time is--

COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Mr. Chair, I had one order of business in here. I'm gonna show you [inaudible] here. This is an award that comes from the Texas Restaurant Association, and it's a partner award that they gave to the agency and all the work that they're doing. And our [inaudible] commissioners have been in virtual town hall meetings with them a number of times. So there's a staff member that actually made this. And that's COVID, this is the fork, and so they're putting a fork in it from that standpoint. And so—but they really appreciate the partnership of the agency they [inaudible] Courtney, Jen Troke, Mary York are doing with them, and they really appreciate all of those efforts. And then the staff behind the scenes that are working. Governor Abbott, I think

	[inaudible] addressing them on yesterday or today as well. So
2	they're open for business and ready to do a lot of things, but
3	they appreciate the work that's been done by the agency in that
4	regard, and wanted to give us the resilience award as well. So,
5	it's a guy on the team made it, and so he spray-painted the
6	balls, but they're putting a fork in it from that standpoint.
7	So, thank you, guys, and thank the restaurant association for
8	their support.
9	CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Thank you.
10	COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Yeah.
11	CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Any other business? Is
12	there a motion to adjourn?
13	COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: None here, Chairman.
14	CHAIRMAN DANIEL: A motion to adjourn?
15	COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Chairman, I move that
16	we adjourn.

18	motion.
19	CHAIRMAN DANIEL: It's been moved and
20	seconded to adjourn. This commission meeting is adjourned.
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
