CHAIRMAN DANIEL: All right, good morning, everyone. The meeting is called to order. Mr. Trobman? Is anyone signed up for public comment?

MR. TROBMAN: Yes. Good morning,

Commissioners. [unintelligible] general council, we do have a

few, uh, individuals who are here to speak public comment this

morning. Um, when I call your name, go ahead and unmute

yourself, then, uh, state your name, uh, for the record and—and
then go ahead and begin with your comments. First, we have Ms.,

uh, Yvonne Robinson.

YVONNE ROBINSON: Good morning, I'm Yvonne Robinson.

MR. TROBMAN: Good morning. Go ahead and-- and proceed.

YVONNE ROBINSON: I'm speaking today, because I have applied for my unemployment and I have been denied for my, uh, UCTUA and DUA. Um, unfortunately last year when COVID came through, I was under a disaster claim from 2019, storm Imelda here in the Gulf Coast. However, uh, in reading your documentation that you have from the, uh, advisory, the unemployment insurance program letter number, 1620 change one, it states in there, that an individual must self-certify that he or she are unemployed partially, unemployed or unable or unavailable to work, because of COVID-19, related risk issues,

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issued under Section 2102 A3A11, II, excuse me, one Cares Act.
It says under this, an individual that is filing for PUA does
not need to provide proof of employment [unintelligible]. I am
a self, uh, employed contractor -- an independent contractor.
However, it goes on to state that on number six, it says can
[unintelligible] convert an ineligible regular UC claim to a PUA
claim. The answer is -- it says it depends. And it says,
including self-employment individuals that have one of the
COVID-19 related reasons listed in section 2102 A3AII
[unintelligible] Cares Act. Another question, it states here,
number 33, it says, if an individual disqualifies for regular
UC, because of a job separation that occurred prior to the
individuals unemployment, due to COVID-19, he or she is
potential elig--eligible for PUA, the answer is yes.
I was told that my claim was denied because, uh, I was already
receiving a DUA prior and it didn't cover that, uh, again, it
states in here too that, um, anyone who does not qualify for UC
program and who would be able and available to work, if it was
for not one or more of the COVID-19 related reasons listed in
section 2102 of the Cares Act. In addition to that, under the
section UIPL, 16 through 20, it all--and if you look at the
statements steps 5, 7 and 10, that relates to me as an
independent contractor. It also, uh, states also--too, that the
independent contractor who have -- has suspended or severely
limited their customer and work activities, as a direct result
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of COVID-19 Public Health Emergency, may be eligible for PUA benefits, even if they do not squarely fit into that criteria. And it gives the following examples for that. I would just like to know, uh, what do I need to do? I've talked to my senator, John Cornyn, I've been on there with my state representative, Andrew Weber, also I've seen my representative, um, Mr., um, [unintelligible] office in trying to relentlessly get someone to talk to me, listen to me and hear what I have to say, in regards to this. Because for the last year, I have not received anything from the unemployment, and I have been severely impacted, because of it. And the work and being an independent contractor, I just think it's unfair that you get swooped in this and there's no recourse. And again, trying to get through to the system is horrible. You're on hold three or four hours, then it clips you off and you have to try again. Um, I would just like today, for that to be noted on the record so somebody can possibly look at this and possibly assist me and telling me, what do I need to do. I did apply for a, uh, appeal, April, I did not get heard until August. And again, during that time, I kept following, like they told me to, and again, at this time and date, I still filed and I have not received anything from TWC. Thank you.

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MR. TROBMAN: Thank you, Ms. Robinson for your comments. We will be having unemployment insurance, uh, uh, specialist be reaching out to you shortly, thank you.

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ALYSIA LASSITER: Good morning.

MR. TROBMAN: Good morning, please proceed.

ALYSIA LASSITER: Um, first off, I would

MR. TROBMAN: Next we have, uh, Alysia

like to thank the commission for allowing me this time to address the court. My name is Alysia Lassiter and I'm the claimant in -- in the appeal and I'm in favor of the tri, uh, reversing the Tribunal Division. Um, due to COVID-19, [unintelligible] for my eleven and thirteen year old, and the school transition to remote learning at home. The daycare centers also closed for my three and five year old, due to the pandemic. At the present time, my eleven and thirteen year old continue to hybrid learn. My thirteen year old son has some challenges that requires [unintelligible] when he's at school. To ensure his needs are met, he would need constant supervision, motivation, direction and support. This includes during the summer months. The summer camps closed, um, during the pandemic I would like to provide clarification about lack of my as well. family support. Without elaborating into too many details, I will say a few years back, I made a decision to insure the safety of myself and three young children. I left my hometown of Providence Rhode Island. We travelled in the Greyhound, it was a long three days before we got here to Texas. Besides my

sister who arrived before my delivery, I have no other adult or immediate family here. I only know a handful of people and due to COVID concerns, no one would care for my--my kids. During my employment, I endured racial slurs--slurs, excuse me. dealt with an irate quest that resulted in a police call. On three occasions my paycheck bounced, but I remained because I'm a single mom of four and they rely on me. I will always have my children's best interests first. Each shift that I work, put my children in jeopardy. I couldn't continue risking going to jail, risking my children possibly taken from me or keep risking their safety, because of lack of proper, um, excuse me, because of lack of a proper adult supervision. COVID-19 disrupted my child care arrangement that I relied on so that I can provide and work for my family. Unfortunately, due to lack of childcare, my only option was to resign. I provided my job with a notice of resignation, stating COVID concerns. I do have an eleven year old son who has underlying health conditions. He did require hospital--hospitalization, um, when we lived in Rhode Island for bronchiolitis and it did require treatment. did enroll him back into school when it was offered, um, in November and then with--within one month of that, he--I received a call, from the school nurse, and he was ordered to, uh, selfquarantine to prevent any COVID symptoms. He wasn't able to return until, January of this year. In addition to the COVID concerns, I provided my job with the most important factor, and

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that was that I needed to resign due to lack of proper childcare. Although, I was really disappointed with the tribunal decision, I do appreciate talking, um, being able to talk this morning. And the commission, um, taking the time to review my case. I asked that, if you haven't already, to please look at all the supporting documentation that I have sent in. There are so many guidelines and factors that do apply to my family's situation. My hope is that the commission votes to overturn the tribunal decision, um, next week on the fourth and reinstate my benefits under PUA in which I believe I'm eligible for benefits. Finally, I would like to acknowledge that I am responsible for a \$405 overpayment. I never did intend to be fraud or gain anybody, um, the hours at my job were reduced, due to COVID, that's why we ended up applying for the benefits. Um, if offered, that same day, I would pick up any hours, any, um, maybe the manager had to do a supply run or, um, before this, everybody started getting sick, so was there a lot of calls. Um, so I would pickup, maybe, an extra hour or two and unfortunately, it resulted in an overpayment, um, because my job scheduled in TWC schedule differed by a week, um, so when registering for payment, I did input, um, what the hours were posted. Um, I am a dedicated and honest person. I'm just trying to be a good mom, a good person and a good citizen. Ιt has been rough these past few months, um, for me and my family without an income, but I do have faith that everything will

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   workout. I will not keep you long. I once--once again, thank
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   the commission for allowing me this time to speak and present
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   my--my own testimony. Um, may the commission and the courts and
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   all the members have a great day. Y'all stay safe and, um,
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   thank you again.

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   Serna, for the record, Mahalia Baldini, with the WorkForce
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Development Division Adult Education and Literacy. In April 20, 2021 commission meeting, the commission approved both to accept the voluntary deobligation in the amount of \$460,761 from Grayson College and to proportionally reduce the performance targets for that grantee. In last week's meeting, the commission discussed the reallocation of those deobliqated funds to three Adult Education and Literacy Grantees who have met the objective criteria to receive the reallocated funds. commission requested that the reallocation item and associated performance targets be presented in today's meeting. So at this time, staff seeks direction on the following as reflected in your notebook materials. First, to accept the plan to reallocate the \$460,761 of those deobligated funds to AEL Grantees; Austin Community College, Community Action Inc of Central Texas and Southwest Texas Junior College, as shown in table one. Secondly, to increase the program year 2021 performance targets associated with the reallocated funds for those same grantees as shown in table two. Thank you for your time and considerations today and I'm happy to answer any questions.
