2 | CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Good morning, everyone.

This meeting is called to order. Mr. Trobman, has anyone signed up for public comment?

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Thank you, Mr. Trobman.

Good morning, Ms. Miller.

MS. MILLER: Good morning, sir.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Well, thank you. This brings us to the end of Agenda Items 3 through 7. We're gonna stand in recess until we get the rest of the personnel in here for the rest of the meeting, thank you. All right, we're back. This is Agenda Item 8, ending the middle skills gap. This is math family literacy initiative using AEL state leadership funds.

MS. BALDINI: Good morning, Chair Daniel,
Commissioner Alvarez, Commissioner Demerson, and Mr. Nelson,
sitting in for Mr. Serna this morning. For the record, Mahalia
Baldini with the workforce development division, adult education
and literacy. On June 30 of 2021, the commission held a work
session on the statewide initiatives and earmarked \$500,000 in
AEL state leadership funds from budget year 2021 for math family
literacy services for AEL participants and their families. At
this time, staff seeks direction on implementing a math family
literacy initiative that enhances and develops math supports for

1 families in Texas through a request for application in the 2 amount of \$500,000. I'm happy to answer any questions that you 3 may have today. 4 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Comments or questions? 5 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Yes, Chairman. First of all, I wanna congratulate you, Fabiana, for bringing the new 6 7 lady to the office and introducing her to the commissioners this morning. So, congratulations, and welcome aboard. 9 MS. BALDINI: Thank you. 10 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Thank you, Mahalia 11 and staff. I think this is a great proposal and a way to 12 increase math literacy in families. Thank you for the hard work. 13 MS. BALDINI: Thank you, Commissioner. 14 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: No questions. CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Is there a motion? 15 16 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Chairman, I move that 17 we allow staff to issue an RFA for a math family literacy 18 initiative using the parameters described in the amount of \$500,000. 19 20 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Second. 21 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: It's been moved and 22 seconded. 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   Rio Grande, North Texas, and the Rural Capital Area. Staff

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                         MS. WILLIAMS: Thank you.
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1 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Thank you. Legislative 2 report? Yeah. 3 MR. MCCARTY: Good morning, Chairman Daniel, 4 Commissioner Alvarez, Commissioner Demerson. Tom McCarty, 5 customer care division. Last Friday, the U.S. House voted to 6 concur with Senate amendments to H.R. 3684, the Infrastructure 7 Investment and Jobs Act. Included in the measure is a provision 8 to help offset the costs of the bill by terminating the employee 9 retention tax credit. This was due to expire on January 1. It'll 10 now be effective on October 1 of 2021 instead of January of '22. 11 Yesterday, also, Governor Abbott signed senate bill 8 from the 12 third call legislative session. This makes a supplemental 13 appropriation, including appropriating approximately 7.2 billion 14 to be used to retire the title XII advances and replenish the UI 15 trust fund to the statutory floor. This bill is effective 16 immediately, and I'm available for any questions you may have. 17 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Ouestions? Comments? 18 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: None here. 19 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: None. 20 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Thank you very much, sir. 21 MR. MCCARTY: Thank you. 22 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: All right, executive 23 director's report? 24 MR. NELSON: Nothing to report.

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    that, Chairman. Why don't you test him out?
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                         CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Okay.
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                         MR. NELSON: No.
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                          COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: See if he's been
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   doing his homework.
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                         CHAIRMAN DANIEL: All right, on page seven,
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    line 11, what is the number that we would find there?
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                         MR. NELSON: It's always two.
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                          CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Always two? I would have
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   said "eleventy billion." That's what I would have said.
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                          COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Good job, Chris.
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                         COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: You don't wanna ask
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   him about the budget, you wanna ask him about something else. He
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    knows the budget.
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CHAIRMAN DANIEL: That is true. All right, no executive director's report. So, you'll see a camera here. I just wanted to get this next part of the meeting on camera. It's actually a nice announcement that I get to make. This is a proclamation from the Office of the Governor. If you would, I'll just read it. "As we continue to face challenges of an everchanging world, the need for skilled workers to bolster our robust workforce has increased. For generations, registered apprenticeships have helped us meet this demand across the Lone Star State. As new workers look to join the vibrant and growing Texas economy, a registered apprenticeship operates as an earnwhile-you-learn vocational training model. By allowing apprentices the opportunity to earn more while they receive hands-on training for in-demand jobs, this system cultivates a skilled and valuable workforce that gives Texas a competitive advantage in today's global economy, and also supports Texas' continued economic development and provides sustained growth for the future. Ever year, a week in November is dedicated to recognizing the importance of registered apprentices and the companies and organizations that support and participate in these cutting-edge training programs. At this time, I encourage my fellow Texans to learn more about the apprenticeship programs and how they can further our economic development and benefit the hardworking members of the Texas workforce. By supporting apprenticeships and the workers who benefit from them, these

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programs will continue to strengthen the Texas economy as we work to build the Texas of tomorrow. Therefore, I, Greg Abbott, governor of Texas, do hereby proclaim November 15 through the 21, 2021 to be Apprenticeship Week in Texas, and I urge the appropriate recognition whereof." Very nice of the governor to do this, a big week. We have something else big going on next week, I think. We're not having a commission meeting. So, wanted to be sure that we took a chance to recognize apprenticeship week and all that that means for the state of Texas. Commissioner Alvarez has long been a champion of apprenticeships, and I think rightly so. Commissioner Demerson's voiced his support, and I certainly wanna add my sort of fullvoiced support to this. I last week had the opportunity to attend a graduation ceremony at Bombardier Aircraft for their first apprenticeship class. It's a big deal. There were 10 people in that class, and they anticipate graduating about 90 more soon. It puts that business on the map globally, and they credit the work that they've done through our apprenticeship program and Texas State Technical College, TSTC, in the area for what they're doing. I would love to see more employers do exactly what Bombardier has done and make an apprenticeship program specific and unique to their company. We've got a lot of great registered apprenticeship programs in the state. Some train electricians generically, some train other trades generically. But the fact of the matter is is that it is the

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specific employers that are there participating in those programs that ultimately make those programs successful. And so, for us to take a week out of the year and celebrate apprentices and Apprenticeship Week, particularly next week at the annual meeting, and for—I'm kinda new to the game. I know other folks have been working with this a lot longer. But the fact is is I don't think we can deny the success, and I think all of our efforts to increase participation in apprenticeship programs in this state I think will ultimately benefit the state of Texas. So, commissioners, I appreciate you giving me a little bit of time to read that into the record, and I appreciate the governor for designating next week Apprenticeship Week here in Texas.

COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Yes. [applause]

Chairman, if I may add, since we are gonna be busy at the conference next week, we do have the same proclamations that you do, and some have already been sent out. I wanna acknowledge some of the programs that we've done, but before I do that, I think it'd be appropriate for me to simply put on the record that I am so grateful to have folks, great directors, in this agency. But I am very grateful to have folks like Desi Holmes and her team, who does such a great work with the apprenticeship program. As you know, she's got apprenticeship navigators now that are gonna be implemented in various board areas, which is amazing—very similar to the co-located educational specialists. She's expanded the programs into childcare. We were just there,

where those individuals that are attending the childcare apprenticeship programs are receiving up to 33 college credit hours at Tarleton State University. How amazing is that? And then the brew master class that's taking place in Mission, Texas, where two brothers graduated and opened up their own brewery, and a group of veterans are actually doing the same thing, and hopefully will have their graduating class as well. And then just up the street with [sounds like] Ventana glass here in Round Rock--first of its kind. The three that I just referenced are the first of its kind, not just in Texas, but in the country. And in the ability to expand it into IT, I'm very grateful that we got the opportunity and support to allow the department to look at ways that we can expand the apprenticeship model in the IT area. And of course, we're doing that with St. David's, with the healthcare industry. So, I'm very grateful. I did get a chance to present a proclamation to local 68 UA plumbers in Corpus at their annual banquet, and we'll be presenting some at the conference next week in Houston, since some of them will be there. So, I am very grateful. There is so much momentum right now, not just in apprenticeship but preapprenticeship, and I think people not just in Texas but in other parts of the country are certainly looking at what we are doing with the help of Desi Holmes and her team to expand apprenticeship. But most of it has been just--I think a large part of it has been to educate the people and the advantages of

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hiring these individuals and training them. And I do agree with the TSTC graduation that you attended. One of the young ladies that we spoke there to was out of work as a result of the pandemic, is going through the program, and we took her out of poverty. And so, I appreciate the continued support of apprenticeship, and I just wanted to take this opportunity to also thank the governor for the proclamations that he's allowed us to present throughout the state of Texas.

COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: And Mr. Chairman, I think the apprenticeship program provides employers with another choice, another tool to develop their talent pipeline, and we appreciate the support of the governor and your support with Bombardier, and going out there to recognize that talented pipeline.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Just the momentum—
Commissioner Alvarez, I think, mentioned a really good component of this, which is the momentum that so many of these programs have built up. And the opportunity, I think, for TWC to really continue to use that momentum to find more success. And so, Commissioner Alvarez, Commissioner Demerson, I continue to appreciate your support for the things the agency's doing, obviously. But I think there's a lot of work we can do here, and a lot of opportunities for a lot of Texans. And so I'm pleased to be here at this agency at this time, because it's a good time to be working with the Texas Workforce. We have so many things

1	we can do to strengthen that, and I'm glad we're taking
2	advantage of all of those. Is there any other business to come
3	before the commission today?
