## Child Care Development Block Grant (CCDBG) COVID-19 Federal Funding Eighth Tranche of New Initiatives Discussion Paper

## **Background**

The Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) has received increased Child Care and Development Block Grant (CCDBG) funding through several COVID-19 related pieces of federal legislation:

CARES – TWC previously received \$371,663,374 of Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act funding. The majority of these funds were budgeted to support a temporary enhanced reimbursement rate for subsidy child care providers, and to fund a temporary essential worker child care program.

CRRSA – TWC is receiving \$1,135,748,591 in Child Care Development Block Grant (CCDBG) funds from the <u>Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act, 2021</u> (CRRSA). On February 23, 2021, the Commission approved the <u>Planned Use of CRRSA Funds Report outlining possible uses for these funds.</u>

ARPA – TWC will also receive \$4,424,303,632 CCDBG funding through the <u>American Rescue Plan</u> Act (ARPA) as follows:

CCDF Discretionary Funds \$1,703,369,713 CCDF Stabilization Grant Funds \$2,724,368,837

TWC's three-member Commission (Commission) will consider additional investments of these funds. See Attachment 1 for an overview of funding.

## **Issue 1: TEA Support for Prekindergarten Partnership Development- \$2.4 million** On November 2, 2021 the Commission took action on the <u>Fourth Tranche</u>, approving funding for TWC to

support the development of new Prekindergarten (Pre-K) Partnerships, and noting that the Texas Education Agency (TEA) would be considering a complimentary strategy to also support Pre-K Partnership expansion.

The Commission should consider dedicating \$2.4 million for TEA to design a Pre-K Partnership Expansion program, to be conducted in partnership with the Texas A&M University System, and pilot Hub Funding Intermediary model. Through this new model, the Intermediary will help prospective partnerships identify all possible funding sources including Foundation School Program (FSP) funding, early education allotment, and federal and state grants received by Local Education Agencies (LEAs); parent tuition and childcare subsidies received by child care centers. The Intermediary would then facilitate the pass through of a majority of LEA funding – first to the Intermediary, and then on to the child care program. The intent is to provide supplemental financial support to establish partnerships and reduce the administrative burden on LEAs, with the Intermediary handling child care program recruitment, contract development, and reporting.

The long-term role of the Hub Funding Intermediary is to provide continued assistance with financial and reporting logistics for Pre-K Partnership classrooms and LEAs. It is expected that the Intermediary will retain a portion of the FSP funding to cover operational costs, while providing the majority of those funds to child care centers for use in supporting high-quality Pre-K instruction.

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## **Decision Point**

Staff recommends that the Commission approve \$2.4 million for TEA to pilot the Hub Funding Intermediary model in support the development of new Pre-K Partnership classrooms.
