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Vocational Rehabilitation Rate Changes for Benefits Counseling Services Discussion Paper

4 Background

- 5 According to 29 USC §722(b)(2) and 34 CFR §361.45(c)(3), when the Vocational Rehabilitation
- 6 (VR) program develops the individualized plan for employment (IPE), VR staff must ensure that
- 7 benefits counseling services are offered or provided to all eligible customers who receive a
- 8 Social Security Administration (SSA) disability benefit from Title II (Social Security Disability
- 9 Insurance, Childhood Disability Beneficiary/Disabled Adult Child, or Disabled Widow/Widower
- 10 Beneficiary) or Title XVI (Supplemental Security Income Childhood or Adult Disabled/Blind) of
- 11 the Social Security Act (42 USC §401).
- 12 Benefits counseling services are key to successfully transitioning VR customers receiving SSA
- 13 disability benefits into competitive integrated employment. Benefits counseling helps customers
- 14 understand how to manage publicly funded benefits while employed. Research shows that VR
- 15 customers often pursue living wage positions when the fear and misunderstanding of how
- 16 employment affects their benefits has been eliminated through benefits counseling.
- 17 The SSA grant that funded Work Incentive Planning and Assistance (WIPA) programs was
- 18 implemented in 2000 as part of the Ticket to Work and Work Incentive Improvements Act of
- 19 1999. In 2012, SSA discontinued the WIPA program, and the Texas Department of Assistive and
- 20 Rehabilitative Services (DARS), the legacy agency for the VR program, began paying fees to the
- 21 previously SSA-funded WIPA programs to ensure that benefits counseling services would
- 22 continue to be available to VR customers. The WIPA grant funding was restored in July 2013,
- 23 and DARS continued to pay fees for benefits counseling services to ensure that quality services
- 24 were being provided to customers in a timely manner. Since 2012, many VR agencies across the
- 25 nation have continued to participate in a fee-for-service structure for benefits counseling
- 26 services.

27 Issue

- 28 Currently, benefits counseling services are provided by SSA grant-funded WIPA programs. The
- 29 original rates for benefits counseling services used the arithmetic mean model, which is based on
- 30 the rates that state VR agencies were paying for benefits counseling services at that time. Rates
- 31 have not increased since they were established and do not reflect the current value of this service.
- 32 Approximately one quarter of all VR customers served annually receive a disability benefit from
- 33 SSA. Currently, there are more than 13,000 VR customers with active IPEs who also receive a
- 34 disability benefit from SSA.
- 35 It is vital that TWC's Vocational Rehabilitation Division (TWC-VRD) have a more robust
- 36 provider network in order to deliver timely benefits counseling services to customers. Currently,

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- 37 Texas has only two WIPA programs that provide fee-for-service benefits counseling to VR
- 38 customers. In order to provide timely benefits counseling services to VR customers, additional
- 39 vendors are needed, and compensation must be competitive and appropriate.
- 40 Currently, TWC-VRD purchases ten basic benefits counseling services. Staff is proposing rate
- 41 increases for seven of the services and is proposing one new benefits counseling service for
- 42 veterans.

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- 43 The arithmetic mean model was again used as the methodology for establishing the proposed
- 44 rates. Data was gathered from 17 state VR agencies that pay for benefits counseling services.

45 **Recommendations**

- 46 Staff recommends an increase in rates for the following benefits counseling services:
- 47 Benefits Information and Referral
 - ➢ Currently \$50
 - Proposed increase to \$100
- Benefits Information and Referral, Benefits Summary and Analysis/Work Incentive Plan
 (BS&A/WIP):
 - ➢ Currently \$275
 - Proposed increase to \$550
- Revision to BS&A/WIP including Veterans:
 - ➤ Currently \$100
 - Proposed increase to \$300
 - Plan to Achieve Self-Support:
 - ➢ Currently \$200
 - Proposed increase to \$450
- 60 Property Essential to Self-Support:
 - Currently \$75
 - Proposed increase to \$100
 - Student Earned Income Exclusion:
 - ➤ Currently \$50
 - Proposed increase to \$100
- 66 Medicaid Buy-In:
 - ➤ Currently \$100
 - Proposed increase to \$250
- 69 Veteran's BS&A/WIP:
- 70 \succ New service
 - Proposed rate of \$1,000
