Board Contract Year 2023 Texas Rising Star Assessor Funding Discussion Paper

1 Background

- 2 The 87th Texas Legislature enacted <u>HB 1792</u>, which directs the Texas Workforce Commission
- 3 (TWC) to procure a single entity to oversee all Texas Rising Star assessors. TWC is currently in
- 4 the procurement process, with a goal of a single entity being selected in the Spring of 2023, and
- 5 under contract in May 2023.
- 6
- 7 TWC will provide the new entity with a start-up period, for the new entity to transition the Texas
- 8 Rising Star assessor functions. Pending the full transition of these services, TWC will continue to
- 9 fund Local Workforce Development Boards (Boards) to oversee and implement assessment
- 10 services.
- 11
- 12 TWC's three-member Commission has previously approved funding in the Statewide Initiatives
- 13 budget (<u>Summary of Statewide Initiatives</u>, Track 76053) to support the new centralized assessor
- 14 function. A total of \$5,889,265 was approved (\$850,000 in Fiscal Year 2022 (FY'22) and
- \$5,039,265 in FY'23), and none of these funds have yet to be expended.

17 **Issue:**

- 18 Additional funding is needed to support the costs for Boards to oversee and support Texas Rising
- 19 Star assessments for a portion of Board Contract Year 2023 (BCY'23), from October 1, 2022,
- 20 through August 31, 2023, as well as support the costs for the new centralized entity during the
- 21 transition period.
- 22
- 23 Attached is a Board distribution for BCY'23, totaling \$6,358,560, to continue supporting
- 24 Boards' oversight of Texas Rising Star assessors, through August 31, 2023. Staff also estimates
- 25 up to an additional \$1.5 million may be necessary for the new centralized entity, during the
- remainder of FY'23, through August 31, 2023. This brings the total estimated amount for FY'23
- 27 Texas Rising Star assessor costs to \$7,858,560.
- 28
- The Commission previously approved \$5,889,265. Based on the new estimated FY'23 cost of
- 30 \$7,858,560, an additional \$1,969,295 is needed.

32 **Decision Point**

- 33 Staff recommends that the Commission approve an additional \$2 million to support Texas Rising
- 34 Star assessor services in BCY'23 for Boards, and in FY'23 for the new centralized assessor
- 35 entity.
