CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Motion passes with the exceptions noted. Thank you. Let's take a short break.

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CHAIRMAN DANIEL: All right. This is Agenda

Item 8, Chapter 800 Allocations and Chapter 805, Deobligation

and Reallocation of the AEL Funds.

MAHALIA BALDINI: Good afternoon, Chairman Daniel, Commissioner Alvarez, Commissioner Demerson, and Mr. Serna. For the record, Mahalia Baldini with the Workforce Development Division. On March 22^{nd} , the commission approved the policy concept on potential amendments to the Texas Workforce Commission rules, Chapter 800 and Chapter 805. The policy concept was posted online for a three-week public comment period and no comments were received. Chapter 800 proposed rules provide the commission flexibility when deobligating adult education and literacy statewide funds and consider an adult education and literacy grant recipient's performance in the reallocation of those deobligated funds. Chapter 805 proposed rules provide modifications to the AEL requirements and provide updated terms and conditions. Additionally, TWC reviewed the Chapter 805 as part of the proposed rules in accordance with the Texas Government Code. Today, staff seeks approval on the proposed amendments to Chapter 800 and 805 for publication in the Texas Register for a 30-day comment period. I'm happy to answer any questions that you may have.

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CHRIS NELSON: Good afternoon, chairman, commissioners, Mr. Serna. For the record, Chris Nelson, chief financial officer. Last week the LBB published the LAR instructions for state agencies including the required submission date for each agency. TWC's LAR submission date is August 26, 2022. As part of our overall LAR submission, I have two items for your consideration this afternoon that would be part of the complete LAR approval I will bring in August. The first is a staff recommendation to expand the Older Individuals who are Blind program or OIB by using \$4,000,000 in additional SSABR funds in 2023 up to 5,000,000 in 2024, and up to 6,000,000 in 2025 including submitting this request to increase TWC's FTE cap in 2024 and 2025 for the additional FTEs needed for the expansion. That concludes my remarks for that item and I'd be happy to answer any questions. CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Any comments or questions

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CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Any comments or questions on that item?

COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: None here, chairman.

COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: None.

CHRIS NELSON: OK. The next item is a staff recommendation of statewide initiatives for the 2023 operating budget and 2024-2025 LAR. This includes statewide initiatives for the child care, TANF, WIOA, employment services, and adult

ed programs. On page 7 of 8, we have clustered youth and veterans initiatives to group those initiatives by the target populations regardless of the program that funds the initiative. That concludes my remarks for that item, and I'd be happy to answer any questions.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Any comments or questions?

COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: This was 11b? Was

that the-

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: That's my understanding.

COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: At this point I don't have any comments.

COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Nothing here.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: So I have some comments.

Just general comments regarding statewide initiatives funded by both WIOA and TANF, and then I'm going to have four requests at the end. I've noticed for some of the programs, staff is recommending either maintaining or increased funding in situations where the historical performance of the program doesn't seem to support the recommendation. I think we need to do a little more work on that. I don't think that fiscal years '20 and '21 are years we should be using to set budgets. They're very unique and I just don't think it's a good practice to set budgets based on solely those years but I think there's other historical evidence that we can use to fund initiatives at historically supportable amounts, and we need to think about

contingencies for years when certain programs show increased demand. Also, in looking at it I've noted that some of our programs seem very similar in nature which I wonder if that doesn't lead to some variability in the program's success. I think we need to postpone action on any of today's budget items but I would like for staff to prepare a policy concept paper to address each of the following issues, and we'll take action on these at a subsequent commission meeting. First, to fully investigate the program performance of the High-Demand Job Training and the Texas Industry Partnership programs and the feasibility of combining these two programs into one line item including establishing a supportable funding level. Two, to fully investigate the program performance of the Governor's Summer Merit Program and Camp Code, and to take a look at the feasibility of combining these two programs into one line item including establishing a supportable funding level which may in fact be an increased funding level for those two programs. Three, fully investigate a plan for the WIOA and TANF statewide programs designated as youth initiatives in our documents to identify historical financial performance, establish supportable funding levels based on that performance, and to create an annual youth initiatives reserve fund to cover unanticipated surges in program participation, and, fourth, to establish a plan to track performance for all statewide programs funded from WIOA and TANF sources with a specific focus on numerical

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performance program outcomes and the return on investment. I see you writing notes. I'll give you this at the end so you can—I wrote it down and read it so we can be sure we're all on the same page. Other than that, I don't have any additional comments. If there are other comments, I would sure like to hear them now.

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COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: I have comments. Since you stated Camp Code, I'm going to go ahead and get my comments on the record for my support for Camp Code and leave it where it is, and actually taking staff's recommendation of leaving it at \$1,000,000. I am in favor of Camp Code initiative as conceived, and with the funding recommended by staff, there is no doubt that this initiative provides vital opportunities for today's young people to learn and develop a skillset that will be a fundamental requirement in a large segment of the future labor market. The in-person component of this program was affected by the pandemic over the last few years as you just referenced, very unique. Previously the commission had to agree to increase the funding on one occasion due to the unexpected demand. That was back in 2020 when we asked the commissioners to come back for \$2,000,000 extra money. Additionally, we've had more qualified applicants for the initiative than funding available. I expect interest in participation will only increase

as the pandemic concerns recede. Camp Code is one of the rare

instances in which the agency can directly focus on improving

barebones hard skills of future Texas workers. We should not dilute its effectiveness by trying to combine it with other initiatives that have related but still very different goals and a much broader focus. The narrow focus or real-world skills increasingly necessary in our labor force is what gives this initiative its strength and gives our agency the chance to stay relevant in preparing workers for their evolving demands they will face as they enter tomorrow's workforce. Those are my comments regarding that. If we are going to be looking, reevaluating some of the programs, I'd also like to put on the record then for staff to come to my office and share with me the current status of what we've used in funding when it comes to this blanket—what is it we call it—I can't think of the word I'm trying to get—

COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Are you talking about any of the programs?

COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Yeah, something that we have in place already. I was planning to move forward on the recommendation staff made but after hearing the very unique and historical evidence of some of these programs, I understand about consolidating so I'll be looking at some of these other programs and making my recommendations as well as to what we should be consolidating. That's all I have at this point.

COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Based on the comment, I appreciate the chairman mentioning to the staff to

1 bring forth a report. We're not taking any action today on these 2 items, and, Commissioner Alvarez, thank you for the briefing and 3 update on the items that we just mentioned. 4 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: If there are no other 5 comments, is there a motion? 6 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Let me see what I've 7 got. Well, I guess my motion would be that we bring back the 8 recommendations made today from the dais at a later date after 9 discussing these changes or possibly updates with staff. 10 CHRIS NELSON: Would that include the OIB 11 expansion or just for the statewide initiatives that you're 12 looking to bring back? 13 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: It wouldn't include 14 it in my opinion, no. 15 CHRIS NELSON: Just to clarify, since 16 there's two specific budget-17 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: I'm thinking those 18 are two separate items if I'm not mistaken. 19 CHRIS NELSON: That's correct. That's why 20 I'm just clarifying. The request to bring back, is that specific to statewide initiatives discussion? Make sure I understand what 21 22 the request is. 23 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: My intent today was to 24 vote out this package that you brought as it was and then have

1 you bring these four items to a subsequent commission meeting. 2 That's not certainly Commissioner Alvarez's motion. 3 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: No. 4 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Commissioner 5 Alvarez, your motion was to move forward but your question was 6 if we were considering the OIB, was it OIB? 7 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Yes. 8 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Information, and I 9 think the answer was basically they are two separate items from 10 that standpoint. 11 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: That's correct. 12 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: So you're in a 13 position that—can we hear your motion knowing that fact? 14 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Yes, so I am looking 15 through my language. 16 MR. SERNA: Mr. Chairman, can I just point 17 something out? 18 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Mr. Serna. 19 MR. SERNA: Chris, the approval of these two 20 agenda items assists us in putting together the budget that's 21 got to come back to the commission for approval so anything that 22 we put in these policy concept papers can then be considered and 23 programs combined or not. 24 CHRIS NELSON: Correct.

MR. SERNA: At the time of budget approval so this approval of if the commission chooses to approve items 11a and 11b, it doesn't restrict the commission to these as laid out. It helps us put the operating budget and the LAR together that we will bring back to the commission in August for any final changes.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Yes, so we have three things going on at one time. We've got this OIB proposal which is a good proposal and we should do that. That's my opinion. The second thing that we have going on is the FY23 budget which we need to take action on, and then the third thing that's going on is we're looking at '24 and '25 projections for the LAR. This document does—well, there's two documents. The OIB is a standalone issue. The other document is essentially the '23 fiscal year budget, and it kind of sets the stage for the '24 and '25 fiscal years in the LAR. So this is why we need to take action today. I think Workforce Division probably needs some certainty on their '23 budget so they can move out with that, and I think as we think about '24 and '25, we need some things to think about.

CHRIS NELSON: Right, and I think in addition to this agenda item, as we bring the operating budget and the LAR to the commission for approval, make other changes to funding, combining programs or whatever you want to do, this

just gives us clarification for how we move forward to prepare those documents.

COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: I'm going to take a recess. Chairman, I'm back.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: All right.

COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Sorry for the inconvenience. So I do have—I just want to make it clear, I do have the motion for as referenced earlier the expansion of OIB program. I have the motion for that, and then I also have the motion for our approving the budget for 2023. Am I correct as proposed by staff?

CHRIS NELSON: 2023 operating budget and the 24-25 LAR for the statewide initiatives component of it.

COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: But that's going to come back, right? The LAR? The recommendations that we're making from here?

CHRIS NELSON: If that's what your wish is, yeah, we can bring that back.

COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: I can make the motion for 11a which is the expansion of the OIB program which we're asking for today. I can also make the motion for the statewide initiatives operating budget for 2023, right? What we're talking about bringing back at a later date is the LAR for 2024-2025. Those were the three that were discussed, right? Chairman?

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CHAIRMAN DANIEL: I think what Chris is saying is is that today we—stop me as soon as I start speaking before you in an inappropriate way.

COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Yes, sir.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Chris would like today to pass fiscal year 23 budget. Chris would also like to pass the WIOA and TANF and all the statewide funds parts for the 24-25 LAR request. What Chris is delicately dancing around is is he's not going to dictate to us our ability to change our mind at a later date if we want to.

CHRIS NELSON: That's correct, and based off your request of additional papers, there could very likely be— even if you approve the '23 through '25 statewide initiatives packet as presented, when we bring that back, especially for 24-25 with the overall statewide initiatives packet, there will probably have to be additional items considered based off of the discussion papers that have been requested already as far as consolidating and things so there will be other adjustments if possible if that's what's being asked.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: And also too, commissioner, we've not even begun to consider the potential for exceptional items or other things that may be in our LAR so there will be a series of votes taken on the LAR.

CHRIS NELSON: Correct, because the LAR is such a huge packet in a sense, we've purposedly tried to break

it up into bite-size chunks instead of bringing \$2,000,000,000 worth of items in one commission meeting.

COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: OK.

COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Commissioner

Alvarez, before you make the motion, I also want to be clear so concerning fiscal years '24 and '25, we will have opportunities to impact that statewide initiatives [inaudible].

CHRIS NELSON: That's correct. As I stated in my opening comments, our submission date is August 26th so probably the week or two before that date I will bring the entire LAR packet based off anything you had previously approved that you will say, you know, yes, that's basically the LAR package you would like to submit. Typically when I say it includes items previously approved such as the OIB expansion or statewide initiatives or anything like that.

COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: OK.

make it clear. I don't want something to go unnoticed. I mean we've got things that are being said here, and people tend to look at every word that we say. I just want to make sure that before we make any changes, that those are brought to the attention of the three offices, all right? That's all I'm asking.

Alvarez, before you look at making a motion I also—again, being clear on my side, have initiatives, discussion papers that I want to bring forward, and I want to make sure that I am afforded the opportunity to bring those forward. If that's not today, then making sure we do it before the August timeframe is fine. Texas Interns Unite! National intern date conference, also looking at Texas Industry recognized apprenticeship program type opportunities, and then a virtual employer's best practice training webinar for veterans, foster youth, and folks with disabilities so those are initiatives that I want to bring out centered around statewide initiatives for '24 and '25, and I want to make sure that I have the opportunity to do that.

COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Chairman, thank you for affording me the opportunity to meet with staff regarding this. Again, I just want to make it clear. I'm going to go ahead and read the motion and will ask everybody to listen to it but I ask that the staff come to our offices, give us updates with any changes or any revisions or any recommendations, all right?

First one, chairman, Agenda Item 11a, expansion on OIB program, I move that we approve the expansion of the Independent Living Services For Older Individuals who are Blind program in 2023 through 2025 as recommended by staff and described in the discussion paper.

COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Second.

1 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: It's been moved and seconded. We're unanimous. 2 3 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: And then the other 4 ones I guess are the two combined, and again, correct me if I'm 5 wrong. I move that we approve fiscal year 2023 operating budget 6 and 2024-2025 legislative appropriations request for statewide 7 initiatives as recommended by staff and any revisions that we made from the dais today, or recommendations. 8 9 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: I second. 10 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: It's been moved and 11 seconded. We're unanimous. I don't show anything under Agenda 12 Items 12 through 15. There's no legislative report today. Is 13 there an executive director's report today? 14 MR.
