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   Good morning, Ms. Miller.

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                         CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Thank you. We're going to
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   take a short recess.
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                         CHAIRMAN DANIEL: All right, we're back.
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   Agenda Item 8 has been postponed to a future meeting. Agenda
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   Item 9 has been postponed to a future meeting. This is Agenda
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   Item 10, high school equivalency vouchers.
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                         MAHALIA BALDINI: Good morning, Chairman
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   Daniel, Commissioner Alvarez, Commissioner Demerson, and Mr.
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   Serna. For the record, Mahalia Baldini with the Workforce
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   Development Division. The Texas Education Code 48.302 requires
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   the Texas Education Agency enter into a memorandum of
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   understanding with the Texas Workforce Commission to transfer
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   funds to subsidize the cost of a high school equivalency exam
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   for individuals that are 21 years of age or older. Currently the
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   interagency contract enables TEA to transfer $750,000 to the
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   Texas Workforce Commission each fiscal year of the 22-23
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   biennium for the purpose of subsidizing high school equivalency
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1 exams. At this time staff seeks direction on implementing the 2 subsidy program as outlined in your notebook materials by 3 approving an initial allotment of high school equivalency 4 vouchers to AEL grant recipients as outlined in your notebook 5 materials, and approving a plan that allows staff to distribute 6 the remaining vouchers in this fiscal year to grant recipients 7 to allow them to develop policies and distribute those vouchers 8 to individuals who are not current or former AEL participants. 9 I'm happy to answer any questions that you may have. 10 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Comments or questions? 11 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: None here, chairman. 12 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: None. 13 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Is there a motion? 14 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Chairman, I move that 15 we approve the implementation of the proposed high school 16 equivalency subsidy program authorized under Texas Education 17 Code 48.302 as recommended by staff and described in the 18 discussion paper. 19 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Second. 20 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: It's been moved and 21 seconded. The motion carries. This is Agenda Item 11, 2022 22 annual report on the transition from military service to 23 employment. 24 BOB GEAR: Good morning, Chairman Daniel,

Commissioner Alvarez, Commissioner Demerson, Mr. Serna. For the

record, I'm Bob Gear, director of Texas Veterans Leadership Program for the Workforce Commission. Texas Labor Code Chapter 302.020 requires the Texas Workforce Commission to submit an annual report on the transition from military service to employment to the Texas Legislature by 1 September. This year's report includes the following sections. Overview of the legislative requirements, overview of the Texas Workforce Commission on community partners, an updated veteran unemployment table which goes from May of 21 through April 22, all different categories of veterans and then nonveteran counterparts rolled up into a 12-month rolling average. Also it highlights all the updated programs under the Texas Workforce Commission, and there are several updates that are very-that show the amount of effort being put towards transition service members. Finally, the final section lists the five most common transition military occupational specialties, industry-based certifications that align with the military occupational specialties and their civilian occupations. So for 2021, number one is infantryman, rifleman, Army Marine Corps, I don't think that will ever change. Number two is automated logistics specialist, material management, logistics supply specialist, basic maintenance management specialist, logistics officer, and acquisition. We try to incorporate all the different branches in all the different pieces of that particular MOS specialty coder rating. Number three is health care specialist, hospital

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1 corpsman, aerospace medical service. Number four is wheeled 2 vehicle mechanic, mission generator vehicular equipment 3 maintenance helper, construction mechanic. Number five is 4 computer network support specialist, communications, computer 5 systems programming, information systems technician. Staff is 6 seeking commission's approval of this year's annual report for 7 submission to the Texas Legislature, and I'm happy to answer any 8 questions you may have. 9 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Comments or questions? 10 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Chairman, I'd just 11 like to say I just want to take this opportunity to thank Bob 12 for all the work you do, Mr. Gear, to serve our veterans and 13 make sure that they're all trained and ready for the workforce 14 so thank you for all you do. 15 BOB GEAR: Thank you, Commissioner Alvarez. 16 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Same sentiments 17 here. I continue to appreciate the work that you guys are doing 18 for our Texas veterans. 19 BOB GEAR: Thank you, Commissioner Demerson. 20 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Is there a motion? 21 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Chairman, I move that 22 we approve and submit the 2022 report on the transition from

military service to employment as recommended.

COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Second.

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ROBERT GONZALEZ: Good morning, Chairman Daniel, Commissioner Alvarez, Commissioner Demerson, and Mr. Serna. For the record, I'm Robert Gonzalez of the Civil Rights Division. Commissioners, before you today for consideration and approval are proposed rule amendments for Chapter 819. In an open meeting on February 8, 2022, the commission approved the policy concept regarding the amendments to Chapter 819 rules. The policy concept was posted to TWC's website. The proposed amendments to Chapter 819 will implement House Bill 21 and Senate Bill 45 relating to the statute of limitations for filing sexual harassment complaints against an employer and prohibition of sexual harassment in the workplace. Also, Texas Government Code requires that every four years each state agency review and consider for readoption, revision, and repeal each rule adopted by that agency. TWC reviewed the chapter as part of the proposed rule in accordance with statute requirement. Staff recommends submitting the proposed rule for publication in the Texas Register for a 30-day public comment period. Staff also requests the ability to make minor nonsubstantive changes to the document in order to comply with publication requirements of the Texas Register and Office of the Secretary of State. I'm available to answer any questions.

Staff recommends submitting the proposed rule for publication in the Texas Register for a 30-day public comment period. Staff also requests the ability to make minor nonsubstantive changes to the document in order to comply with publication requirements of the Texas Register and Office of the Secretary of State. 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CHRIS NELSON: Good morning, chairman, commissioners. For the record, Chris Nelson, chief financial officer. This morning staff are requesting approval for the remaining FY23 program allocations in the amount of \$74,481,190 for TANF Choices, \$14,301,879 for SNAP E&T, \$26,394,769 for employment services, and \$1,100,025,229 for child care consistent with TWC rules, Chapter 800 on allocations. Also included are distributions for \$254,000 for migrant seasonal farmworker outreach services, \$1,221,151 in smaller workforce area funding, and a \$120,732,655 supplemental distribution for supplemental child care funds. While TANF and SNAP allocations are consistent with FY22, employment services did see an approximate 7.4 percent increase in the grant, and that is reflected in this allocation. Child care is increased as part of our continued spend-down plan of increased child care funds over the last several years, and also reflects a supplemental distribution funded with COVID funds from previously approved tranche 4. That concludes my remarks and I'd be happy to answer any questions.

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CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Comments or questions?

COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Chairman, the only thing I'd like to say is I'm glad to see that staff and our boards are still focusing on that migrant seasonal farmworker distribution so I appreciate what the boards are doing to facilitate the needs of our seasonal farmworkers.

1 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: I have no questions 2 or comments. 3 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: I would just point out for 4 the record that this is actually some very complicated kind of 5 budget things that we're working on. Chris makes this easy. In 6 order to get myself in the right frame for learning about these 7 budget items and understanding how they impact the agency, I've 8 asked Chris to name the meeting request to my schedule budget 9 fun with Chris, and I've found that it's made a lot more difference in how well I understand. 10 11 CHRIS NELSON: Just to clarify, that's 12 budget fun or fund? 13 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: No D, budget fun, f, u, n. 14 Fun with a capital F [inaudible] but it has been very useful. 15 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: He has shrunk in age 16 but that's-with all the work you've been doing. Good job, buddy. 17 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Is there a motion? 18 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Yes, chairman, and I 19 also want to say the same thing. He's done a really good job of 20 providing information to each of our offices regarding what 21 we're working on, especially on these agenda items. I move that 22 we adopt the fiscal year 2023 allocations and funding 23 distributions for TANF Choices, SNAP employment and training, 24 employment services, child care, small board funding 25 distributions, and migrant seasonal farmworker distributions for

1 local Workforce Development Boards using the methodology laid 2 out by staff, and instruct the executive director to administer 3 these block grant allocations in the most feasible and 4 economical manner and within all guidelines prescribed by 5 General Appropriations Act, the legislature, the Texas Labor 6 Code, and TWC rules. 7 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Before I second it, 8 will name the BFWC, budget fun with Chris. CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Budget fun with Chris. 10 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: BFWC. I second that 11 motion. 12 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: It's been moved and 13 seconded. The motion carries. 14 CHRIS NELSON: Thank you. 15 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: This is Agenda Item 16, 16 WIOA statewide reserve. 17 SANDRA WILSON: Good morning, Chair Daniel, 18 commissioners, Mr. Serna. WIOA adult and dislocated 21 worker funds provide individualized career and training services 22 throughout the state. Boards do operate with two years' worth of 23 funding. The boards identified in the table in the discussion 24 paper have expended 90 percent or more of their second-year WIOA 25 funding and have confirmed a demand for training that will
