2 | CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Good morning, everyone.

This meeting is called to order. Mr. Trobman, has anyone signed up for public comment?

MR. TROBMAN: No, sir.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Thank you very much. Good morning, Ms. Gonzales.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: The motion passes with the exceptions noted. We'll take a short break.

MS. GONZALES: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: This is Agenda Item 8, Acknowledgement of Gifts and Donations.

SHANA KELLY: Oh, technology is not my strong suit. Good thing law is. My name is Shana Kelly. I am assistant general counsel in the Office of General Counsel, and I'm here to talk to you about the gifts and donations from the last quarter. As you are aware, state law requires any, state law allows TWC to accept donations of money, services, or property that further the lawful objectives of the Workforce Commission as long as it's not a prohibited donation such as from a regulated party or someone who is under certain kinds of investigation. You have a list. Further, for gifts and donations over \$500, the name of the donor, the amount, and the item must be entered into the public record. That is what we are doing here today. In the last quarter we received 10 different, 10

2	different employees went on 10 different trips paid for by five
3	outside parties, and we also received a donation of one
4	assistive technology device from a business here in Austin. All
5	of these donations were presented for inquiry and initial
6	acceptance to Executive Director Serna, and all of the details
7	have been provided into the packet that was provided to you and
8	entered into public record. That's all I have, but do you guys
9	have any questions for me?
10	CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Any comments or questions?
11	COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: None here, chairman.
12	COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: None here.
13	SHANA KELLY: Well, thank you so much.

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   given to Executive Director Serna, does he get to keep all of
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   the gifts?

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   be a violation of another state law.

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CHAIRMAN DANIEL: This is Agenda Item 9, AEL Outcomes Report to the Texas Legislature for State Fiscal Year 2022.

MAHALIA BALDINI: Good morning, Chairman Daniel, Commissioner Alvarez, Commissioner Demerson, and Mr. Serna. For the record, Mahalia Baldini, Workforce Development Division. For your consideration this morning I'm bringing forward the Adult Education and Outcomes Report as outlined in Texas Labor Code 315.002, which requires the Texas Workforce Commission to report educational and employment outcomes for the Adult Education and Literacy program by December 1st of every even-numbered year to the Texas Legislature. Your notebook materials outline performance-related data on AEL enrollment as well as the educational and employment outcomes of AEL participants. It also outlines the current adult education and literacy grantees across the state, and the required stateapproved testing instruments used to measure literacy, numeracy, and language gains for the purpose of federal and state reporting. This concludes my remarks and I'm happy to answer any questions you have about the contents of the report.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Any comments or questions?

COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: None here, chairman.

COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: None here.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Is there a motion?

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COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: I move that we approve the Adult Education and Literacy Outcomes Report for Fiscal Year 2022 for submission to the Texas Legislature as discussed by staff.

COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: I second.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: It's been moved and seconded. We're unanimous.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Thank you. Agenda Item 10, Final Rules, Chapter 819, Civil Rights Division, Relating to Sexual Harassment Complaints.

ROBERT GONZALEZ: Good morning, Chairman

Daniel, Commissioner Alvarez, Commissioner Demerson, and Mr.

Serna. For the record, I'm Robert Gonzalez with the Civil Rights

Division. Commissioners, before you today for your consideration

and adoption are final rule amendments to Chapter 819, Texas

Administrative Code. In an open meeting on August 9, 2022, the

commission approved proposed amendments to TWC's Chapter 819

rules, House Bill 21 and Senate Bill 45 relating to the statute

of limitations for filing a sexual harassment complaint against

an employer and prohibition of sexual harassment in the

workplace. The proposed rule amendments were published in the

August 26, 2022, issue of the Texas Register for a 30-day public

comment period. Public comments were received. Staff reviewed

and responded to comments. No changes were made to the proposed

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   rule. Additionally, staff conducted a four-year review of
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   Chapter 819 in accordance with Texas Government Code 2001.039,
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   and determined that the initial reasons for adopting the chapter
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   still exist and this chapter is still needed. Staff recommends
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   adopting the amendments to Chapter 819. Should the commission
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   adopt these rules, staff requests the ability to make minor
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   nonsubstantive changes to the document in order to comply with
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   the publication requirements of the Texas Register and the
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   Office of the Secretary of State. This concludes my presentation
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   and I'm available to answer any questions you may have. Thank
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   you.

Good morning, 18 chairman, commissioners, and Mr. Serna. For the record, Cherie 19 Dudley with Workforce Development. 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   sitting back there, the one at the far right and the far left
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   are not apprentices. You may not remember seeing them but
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   they're not apprentices so.
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                         HEATHER HALL: Good morning, Chairman
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   Daniel, Commissioner Alvarez, Commissioner Demerson, and Mr.
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Serna. For the record, my name is Heather Hall and I'm the CIO for TWC. It's good to be back with you again. As our agency celebrates National Apprenticeship Week, I'm happy to be joined today by three of our 10 software engineer apprentices, Rachel Hunter, Andreas Vasquez, and Eddie Fehrenbach [SP]. As you know, IT has worked with our amazing Workforce and HR divisions to create, post, and fill 10 programmer positions as software engineer apprentices. We've hired our apprentices from across the state so the other seven are watching remotely today. This talented team of employees has a variety of backgrounds, and they have a passion for technology. In our two-year apprenticeship program TWC has committed to provide training and meaningful work assignments for them while they earn while they learn. They have already started coding and making changes to some of our critical systems, and they're working on defects for our IT systems. Several of them are also participating on our new rapid application team and learning to code with a low-code tool. Rachel, Andreas, and Eddie are attending the apprenticeship event at noon today, and I also wanted to mention that Dorothy Fallin is in the audience as well. She's our enterprise architect. She's also serving as the coach for this apprenticeship team. Dorothy has taken this team under her wing, and she is meeting with them every week, sharing information, and answering questions, and providing them guidance. I'm happy to mention also that yesterday Dorothy received an award at the

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IT leadership government technology forum in part for her work with the apprenticeship team. We also had another team member, Greg Miller, he's one of our infrastructure managers, he also received award at that event for his work on cloud infrastructure. So just wanted to welcome the three apprentices and, thank you for your ongoing support of our new program. I'm happy to answer any questions.

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CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Any questions or comments? COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Congratulations, Dr. Hall. How exciting. Yesterday we had an opportunity to kick off National Apprenticeship Week or as we like to call it, Texas Apprenticeship Week, at Raytheon, and during my comments I mentioned how we were expanding apprenticeship programs through state agencies and what a perfect example of what you've laid out and the folks that you've hired. Dorothy, I know comes from The University of Texas with experience working with interns so that you know she's got some experience in that, and so we're very excited in what you've done. We know that we'll have an opportunity with Les and Jerry White, and what an example that TWC is setting forth by activating and actually putting something forward when it comes to apprentices. I mean who better to do it than the agency that's leading the charge on TWC apprentices. I'd also like to take this opportunity to thank, you know, Desi. I've done it multiple times, you know. Everywhere we go people continue to talk about and rave about

the great things that this agency is doing when it comes to innovation, innovative things, thinking outside the box, how we're, you know, in parts of Texas and explaining to them the various services that this agency provides, it's just another tool that we provide employers to be successful so thank you, congratulations to the agency but Dr. Hall, thank you to you for, you know, coming through with this vision that you had, and we discussed it at state conference last year at a table so thank you for that. I just wanted to congratulate you and your team for doing this so thank you.

COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: It seems like

Commissioner Alvarez has echoed everything that I would say as well so Dr. Hall, thank you for your leadership. This is trailblazing, your leadership as well allowing it to happen.

It's something that we should share with other agencies as we talk about the labor shortage. I represent the employers in the state and the Workforce Commission is an employer in the state, and you're finding a way to take care of that situation through this program. I often say that apprenticeships offer employers another tool in the toolbox, and if it works for them that's great. If it doesn't that's great as well but it offers them an opportunity and you're taking advantage of it. It takes leadership and so thank you, Dr. Hall, for what you're doing, your team, and, Ed, thank you for what you've done in that regard.

HEATHER HALL: Thank you, sir.

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CHAIRMAN DANIEL: You know, I would just say I really have always appreciated innovative solutions to things. I mean I think when people hear the term legacy computing systems, it sort of creates this Hallmark movie picture of what we're dealing with. I mean here we have to speak languages ranging from Fortran to Python, and then we're working on nocode options for advancing the agencies that we deal with. Literally hundreds of vendors and there's so much activity going on out there, and at the same time the state has a chronic shortage of IT professionals that keep showing up on our top 10 list of most advertised jobs, and that's going to hit us too and so finding someone with the enthusiasm to learn what for the most part are dead languages with terms of hardware and software that it runs even into the more innovative things, I think that's just a daily difficult task. I appreciate this innovative solution. I don't think turning it off and turning it back on was going to get us kind of the computer personnel that we were looking for here, and so I think there's a lot to be said for finding an innovative staffing solution, and I think for you guys that are participating in this internship program, this apprenticeship program rather, you know, I think you're sort of getting I think the best of both worlds in the sense that you can learn, you can go to class and learn everything that you need to learn but you'll remember it a lot better when you're

actually in there doing it, and I think it really creates an opportunity for success for you for the long term which I hope is all at TWC but I'm realistic about the fact of what goes on in the world. I think for us it's twofold. We're excited to have you here working with us, doing the things that need to be done but I think I'm equally excited for us to have this apprenticeship program that can be a model for other agencies or perhaps we become the training provider for a lot of other agencies. There's so many different ways it could go. We don't know what's going to happen but it's going to be good, so I appreciate you taking the time to come in here today, share this with us. I look at the opportunities that are ahead of us and I look at all the things that are happening in your shop, and I just-again, I can't say enough. Finding innovative solutions is the only way we're going to solve the problems, and I appreciate you taking a risk on this. I think it's going to pay off for you handsomely.

HEATHER HALL: Thank you, sir.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: All right, is there any other order of business to come before the commission?

COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: I was just impressed with our executive director's rapper skills when he said that they're in the house. He's glad to see them in the house rather

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than at the house. I thought that was pretty unique of Ed so
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   that's it, Mr. Chairman.
